MARGERY OLIVE LATHAM

An apt name for one who was always ready with an olive branch should others be in dispute, listening to both sides of a problem and offering wise counsel. It is said that the busiest people are those who always find time to do more and this was certainly true of Margery. Although constantly in so many activities, she always found time to accept a fresh challenge and take on yet more commitments; explain patiently to others however tedious this might be; consider the other person's point of view and respect it; show a genuine interest in all things and all people, and offer a kindly helping hand to friend and stranger alike.

Always considering others before herself, though never in a demeaning way.

It is very hard to imagine the Society without Margery; She has always been part of it, quite unstinting in her efforts, ready to help and advise on any aspect of folk dancing, organising dances and demonstrations, and always putting the intersts of the Society and of her dancing friends before her own interests, and sometimes her health.

We shall never know all that she did - so much was quietly done behind the scenes, andit was her preparation and background work which have ensured that so many of our ventures have been successful.

Thirty years of activity are difficult suddenly to put into perspective. In Many ways the history and progress of the Society over the years have become inseparable from her. Even before the Society was formed were the monthly daces at Cecil Sharp House and the Sunday afternoons of dancing at the International Youth Centre at Pont Street. The inauguzal meeting of the Society was held in Mbomsbury Square late in 1946 with Margery as a founder member. As demonstrations secretary, she started the Advanced class and then gradually took over the regular Wednesday classes at Carlyle School from Eva and Mary who were our first teachers. Then when it became increasingly difficult for us to pay our way on our own, it was Margery who made arrangements for the sponsorship of the L.C.C. which has continued in modified form up to the present day.

We have been through difficult times, with clashes of personalities in the early days, but Margery wasnever a party to these and her conciliatory influece enabled us to weather the storms. New problems started to emerge with the development of specialist groups and the tendency towards fragmentation of our activities, and again Margery was the greatest unifying influence among us, bringing together as she did so many different styles of dancing in her International class. Her demonstration team, often assembled with great difficulty, gave enjoyment to many - both participants and spectators - and was one of our main shop windows on to the world. It was Margery who looked at ways in which we could co-operate with other bodies which could help us to develop, and her long association with the Central Council of Physical Recreation has resulted in many worthwhile ventures.

A list of Margery's activities is impressive, indeed. She has been a committee member since 1951 when she first became demonstartions secretary and - with due respect to her predessors - it will seem to many that she has always held that office, as Chairman of the Society, as the initiator of our day courses, and as an active participant in all our Summer Schools. Recently she was a member of the sub-committee which put forward proposals for a regional branch structure for the Society. We can do our best to replace her in these fields - not an easy task- but where we shall never replace her is in her work behind the scenes which we shall learn about only when we suffer because it is no longer being done.

We owe our Society, as we know it to-day, in large measure to Margery. What she would wish most of all is that we should carry of from strength to strength and all of us who are grateful for what she has done must pay our tribute by ensuring that we each play our part in building on the foundat ions which she has laid. That would be her wish and we must see that it is fulfilled.

We shall miss her counsel and guidance - she will no longer just be there to consult - but more than all we shall miss a sincere friend.
