As members will have read in the August News-sheet, a system based upon that of proportional representation is being used in the election of Officers and Committee Members, thus avoiding the waste of votes where one person is nominated for two or more positions on the Committee and is successful in election to one. INSTRUCTIONS TO VOTERS.

(1)Do NOT put ticks or crosses after the candidates of your choice. (2) Indicate the order of your preference for all the candidates for all positions by placing the apporpriate number after their name in the space provided, i.e. 1 for the first 2 for the second and so on.

(3)Although the names of the candidates for the Position of Secretary also appear in the list of candidates for the Committee, voters MUST also state the order of their preference for these two candidates when considering the list of candidates for the Committee. This is necessary because only one of the candidates for the position of Secretary can be successful in election and the unsuccessful candidate will be elegible for election to the Committee.

(4) Ballot papers will be VOID uhless they are signed.

With regret we learn that supposedly respectable business organisations are using folk fance festivals as the sugar coating to the bitter pill of their advertising. Unfortunately the Society was unwittingly involved in one of these "festivals" but in future greater care will be taken to established their purpose before the Society provides a demonstration team. That folk dancing is used in such a way, clearly shows that these

high powered advertisers consider folk dancing a great public attraction, and accordingly we should not loose this opportunity of bringing ourselves to the general public's attention.

FROM OUR CHAIRMAN DAVID RUTTER. From NAMUR in Belgium comes the news that David Rutter has contacted folk-dancers in Namur. Two dances have been noted in detail for the steps and music the names of which are;— (1) Le Braule du Bouquet (The swing of the Bouquet) (2) Danse des 7 Sauts (Dance of the 7 Jumps). The first one is a 4 couple-dance in a long set with each man carrying a bouquet. There are 6 figures and these are repeated to give each couple a turn for the last figure. The dance originated in France and was danced at the Court of Louis XIV. The costume is fairly simple being in the peasant style 17th 18th Century origin from France. The second dance is the final dance for the village festivals in which everyone joins. It was originally a dance with seven reverences or bows as done by the aristocracy but the peasants eventually turned it into jumps. It resembles a kolo in music and is punctuated by the 1 jump, 2 jumps... etc; up to 7, then that is the end of the festivities.

These are I believe the first two from Belgium and will be a welcome addition to our collection.
