TRIP TO SPAIN, APRIL 12-27, 1958 ... EASTER FAIR IN SEVILLE.

Iberian Group are organising a trip to Spain at Easter-time next year to attend the world-famous Easter Fair in Seville. All nationalities flock to Spain at this time in order to attend one of the world's gayest festivals of dance and music, etc. The trip will cost approximately £40 per head, including fares and hotel expenses, which, considering the distance, is extremely reasonable. The journey will be as follows:-

Outward: Flying to Perpignan in the South of France, where a coach will meet us. On then to Seville, via Barcelona, Valencia and Granada.

After several days in Seville, the journey -

Homeward: via, Cordoba, Toledo, Saragossa and Madrid to Perpignan, where the 'plane will pick us up and return us to London.

There will be room for 33 people, and all those interested should place a deposit of £5 with me as soon as possible. If we do not have sufficient numbers non-Society members will be asked to fill up the vacancies. The trip is open to all dancers, whether belonging to the Iberian Group or not.

In order to raise funds to help towards the cost of the trip to Seville, Iberian Group are putting on a Dance at Christmas-time, which is being organised by George Sweetland, and a Festival of Iberian Dances and Music at the French Institute, Queensbury Place, South Kensington, S.W.7, on February 1, 8.0 - 10.0 p.m.

If any Society member interested in the trip to Spain wishes to come along and help with this Show, they will be welcome. All dancers taking part in the show who wish to go to Spain will share any profits we may make. This will be put towards their fares.

Tickets for the French Institute show can be obtained from most Iberian Group members, George Sweetland in particular, at prices ranging from 2/6 to 7/6.

We hope that all members, even if not personally interested in going to Spain, will support us in our efforts. After all, perhaps, the following year a party of pretty young Senoritas and Senors will pop over here for a look at our Society in return!
