There will be a Folk Music Festival at Cecil Sharp House on the 16th & 17th October. Among other events there will be ceilidhs at 20.00 on the Saturday and at 18.00 on the Sunday, at which there till be performances by those selected by the panel from the sessions of the same day. A leaflet with further information can te obtained from Cecil Sharp House.

There will be an Art and Photographic Exhibition at Cecil Sharp House from 9th Oct. to 6th November. The exhibits will mostly be concerned with folk subjects (dance, song, customs etc.,).

Two performances will be presented by the Society under the title of 'Folk Weave'. The first will be held at Rutherford School, Marylebone on Saturday 20th November at 15.00 and the second at the Commonwealth Institute on Friday 26th November at 20.00. Tickets for the latter will be 5/- and 7/6.

I hope you have all rejoined by now. Don't forget - Classes commence on the 27th September.

Our DancesVII BALALAIKA DANCE GROUP

Our Gipsy Dance was taught to us by a Russian teacher, Anatol Smirnoff. In the beginning it was a boy and girl dance, but at that time the boys did not care for it, and so it became a girls' dance, done by either one or two. Gipsy dancing is of course more international than Russian, but it can have a distinctly Russian flavour, as the Moiseyev Group showed in their programme. It would be interesting to see whether for instance Spanish gipsies could join in this dance, or Russian ones into a Spanish routine.

To dance any gipsy dance one must feel free, abandoned, and in turns deeply melancholy or axuberant, with very quick changed of mood. The rhythm is very subtle and tricky, and it is surprising what difference it makes when the dance is done with tambourines instead of just clapping hands. The music for this is "Two Guitars", a Russian tune specially arranged for this dance, starting very slowly and building up to a fast climax.
