# NEW YEAR BALMAN SONG AND DANCE FESTIVAL

On New Year's Day, I was fortunate enough to be invited to attend, at the Overseas League, an evening of Balkan music, song and dance, featuring dances and songs of Albania, Bulgaria, Greece, Rumania, Turkey and Yugoslavis.

Of all European folklore, none is so vivid, rich and exciting as that of the Balkans, and the summit of their popular artistic creation is in music and dance. In this corner of Europe, folklore pulses with life and vigour and is not merely a frail survival of past and barely recognisable florids as is too often the case with folk song and dance in the West. In much of Jugoslavia, Rumania and Bulgaria, the villages still hold their regular weekend dances, autdoors in summer, in barns or large sheds in winter, at which the local reportary of collective dances is displayed. These dance occasions which go under the name of Oro in Macedonia, Hora in Rumania, Horo in Bulgaria - are all dirivatives of the Greek "khoros" (from which comes our "Chorus") - are vital to the life of the comminities since they provide a prime opportunity for the villagers to meet and exchange news and gossip; they are also the best occasions for beginning courtshaps!

The dence tunes of much of the Balkan erea, like the song tunes, often seem to our ears strongly Oriental in flavour. If this is so, it should not be imagined that it is necessarily due to the influence of the Turks who were masters of much of this territory for several centuries. Indeed, resistance to the Turkish culture was strong and furious in many parts - notably in Bulgaria. The oriental colouring comes rather from the fact that the Balkans stand at the crossroads between Europe and Asia, and so quite naturally their music has characteristics that belong to both worlds. This is noticeable in the voice production, in the scales and ornamentation of the tunes, and particularly in the piquant rhythms that seem so complex to our ears, though in fact they are rarely as intricate as the rhythms of the Oriental proper. These seemingly complicated rhythmic patterns were commented on and illustrated as the various numbers of the programme were introduced.

The performers in this presentation were the "Dunay" Balkan Instrumental Group, which was formed last year under the auspices of the International Folk Music Centre to play all types of Balkan folk music, and by using both traditional and modern instruments the group reproduces typical Balkan sounds and rhythms; and the dancing was by the Society for Freindship with Bulgaria, who demonstrated the different rhythmic patterns of the dance, and also the different regional costumes. At the end of the programme the audience had the opportunity of showing how much of the idiom they had absorbed by joining in some of the dances.

A very colourful and exciting evening, from which one came away wanting more - a true measure of enjoyment.

Clifford Beck has quite a point about Saturday night dencing and 'follow up' publicity for new people, although I expect it will be difficult to find anyone willing to take on the job - it's usually the same old people who do all the work and they are probably overloaded as usual. I disagree about 'being independant of the SIFD' - after all who usually does the work and foots the bills? Even his idea of these dances is published by kind permission of the SIFD NEWS!

Re Kathleen Munroe James' letter. I am determined, in spite of my husband's protests. to state emphatically that he was nowhere near the stage at all during the Commonwealth Institute Show. Indeed, it was well nigh impossible to get near the stage once the performance had started as there was no 'pass'door. I, myself, had to run through the rain in order to get backstage ready for the second half. As Peter was sitting in the audience taking notes I cannot help thinking that the lighting assistant was 'mistaken' to put it politely!

As for the pignist - a fulltime professional - she explained quite reasonably that for sound and appearance reasons concert grands always have the curve towards the audience and the straight side away.

Peter offered his assistance only after he discovered that Kathkeen had no Stage Manager . It must be extremely difficult to produce a show with different groups coming on with no previous rehearsal on the same stage. This makes it even more essential to have a tough Stage Manager, with at least one assistant, who can put the 'Fear of God'into anyone who goes back-stage without permission.

Up to date, I have produced eight full-length shows (twelve by the end of this year) and I have had, and will have, my share of criticism - some of it unfair of course but on the whole people who do criticize do so in order to help us. They are really interested in seeing us perform well and not just as an embarrassing bunch of amateurs which the audience came along to see as a sort of charitable duty.

# A Selection of Surspann Folk Dances. Books 1.2. and 3.

These are the Society's books now published at 7/6 by Pergamon Press. Books 1 and 2 are available and book 3, which has been in the publishers hands for some months now, should be available at the end of February

Since we handed publication and distribution to Pergamon Press, there have been reports that the books are difficult to obtain and I have been looking into the problem. Foyles now have a small number in stock and more on order. The Books can be ordered through an 'NY BOOKSEALER and delivery time is two to three weeks; however, in an attempt to reduce selivery time, I would suggest that we either buy at Foyles or (for people not in Central London) order the books through branches of W.H. Smith. Host people can reach a "Smith's" and if they receive many orders they will stock the books at Head Office, (until then Smiths may take 4 - 5 weeks), as all their orders have to go through their head office). Trade orders or orders for large quantities should be ordered direct from the Book Sales Department, Parguna Press, Headlington Hibl Hall, Oxford,.

Robert Man all a Co. Ith. will probably supply books most quickly by post but posting and packing charges will, of course, be made. (Maxwells is an Oxford bookshop, which stocks Fergamon's books.

I hope this will adly everyone to obtain the books. Unfortunately we cannot expect every bookshop to STOCK the books as the demand is retricted, but we do expect every bookshop to be prepared to ORDER the books on request. Please let me know if you still have difficulty in obtaining the books, or if there is undue delay, giving full details of the order, bookseller etc. and do not forget the discount offer!

# BARN DANC , LEAS CLIFF HALL, FOLKESTONE. 14th. Jan, 1966

The value of the infusion of a few foreign dances into an English programme was notably evident at the Grand Barn Dance for Folkestone International Folkelore Festival held at the Leas Cliff Hall on the 14th January. Two Israeli chain dances, needing no partners, Jager Marsch and Datchko Kolo, constituted a Continental interlude and were greeted with spon taneous enthusiasm even by the inveterate English dancers.

Unfortunately, the night proved, weather wise, to be the worst of the winter. The Press which reported nearby villages cut off and hundreds of vehicles abandoned in the snow, nevertheless rightly confirmed that conditions failed to dempen the enthusiasm of folk dancers. A big and important ball at the Grand Hotel was cancelled, and in claiming a victory thereby over "Ballroom" the Barn Dance also made a profit.

ar. Francis Hawkins coped admirably with an attendance of over 100 in this great and glamourus hall and fortunately the St. George's Folk Dance Band is local so that they were not in danger of being snowed up. The evening proves that a hall like this, which is inaccessible during the summer for folk dancing, except the Folklore Festival, can well be used in winter for such an activity. There is no Folklore Festival until next year, but the Swedish Pole will be raised and there will be a barn dance in Folkestone on the 25th June 1966.

#### The Folk Dances of the Ukraine.


The Ukrainian Folk Dances have their roots in the past, in pagen times, when they were part of the cult. Girls and boy's dances accompanied by song. Later, warlike movements were included, and survive to this day in the fiery Cossack dances. A great number of it the dances are seasonal and show, as do the Russian Horovod dances, the life of the village,.

For the Beginning of Spring dences the girls go singing from hut to hut and meet the boys on the village green, where they sing and dence until it is time for the 'Going Home' song. These Spring dances are soft and lyrical, and the girls often carry flowers and garlands.

Summer dances have names like "Green Sound", and "Little Hare"; an Autumn dance is called "The Young Man Goes To Town", and a winter dance is the "Snowstorm". In this the movement is quick like a whirlwind, with a very distinct rhythm. "Kosachok, or "Little Cossack" is a widely known men's dance, often done with spears of swords. Other dances show "The Barrel-maker", "The Bootmaker", "The Tailor", or "The Salt Merchants".

In the Mountains of Transkarpathia the dances are different from those of the plain. They have special movements, such as jumping steps, spirels and the rotating of couples around each other. A very well known dance is the men's "Arkan", which goes back hundreds of years. But the best known and most videly performed dance of all Ukrainian dances is the "Hopak". This is a very flexible sance, originally improved by one boy only, but now mostly performed by the whole group or company. In this the boys try to surpass each other in showing off their skill and steps to the girls, who in their turn come in with special steps and figures to give the boys time to get their breath back.
