She came regularly to the CSH dances with her husband Nils, an original Folk Dancer from Sweden whose advice was always invaluable, and only stopped coming when they moved to Harrow. I am sure she would like a card from her old friends and I will, of course, convey your good wishes when I go to visit her.

DANCE ALPHABET

(Further extracts from "Dictionary of the Dance" by W. G. Raffe)

DAGGER DANCE (Georgia, Caucasus)

A man's solo dance performed to the accompaniment of balalaika, or nowadays probably accordion. Wearing the dark blue tunic and fur cap of the Caucasus, and holding the dagger between his teeth, the man dances round in a circle, arms crossed over chest. The tempo and intensity of the dance gradually increase, until, with arms still crossed, the dancer jerks his head, flinging the dagger through the air until it sticks quivering in the gound. The dance is then continued in reverse, the performer plucking up the dagger and resuming the dance.

DIABALADA BOLIVIANA (Bolivia, South America)

Traditional Spanish-American dance and "Morality Play" done in dance-mime before Ash Wednesday, at the mining town of Orura, principally by local citizens. The main form is a processional dance with "devil marches". The way is "cleared" by a condor dancer and bear dancer; Lucifer and Satan lead, elaborately attired. There follows a "devildance" (based on the forgotten figures of the tango), after which comes the play. The allegorical legend shows Lucifer against Michael; the Seven Vices and the Seven Virtues; together with a local Indian Goddess, here turned into the "devil's wife", with the name of Chine Supaye. The dramatic form is a simple contest, obviously devised by some eager padre among the first invaders. Great delight is taken in the evolutions of the Diabalada groups of devils, attired in great masks and costumes bright with glittering glass. The masks closely resemble those to be seen in Tibetan monastery dances, but the dancers here wear white tights instead of long red robes, while Lucifer and Satan vaguely recall the Spanish toreador dress, with its heavy red plush cloak, and a trident instead of banderillas. Youths of the town, unable to afford carnival gaiety, disguise themselves in hoods as "pepinos" (clowns), singing and making quips. They are the last traces of the once-dreaded Familiars of the Holy Inquisition. As well as at Oruro, 12,000 feet up on the Andes range, there are similar dance-plays at La Paz, as a Cemetery Carnival where the Butchers' Guild play the parts of "devils". This carnival dates only from 1578, when the town was first settled by Spanish invaders.
