THE CHAIRMAN WRITES

Well, the Billingham Dance Course was a great success, and indeed, with the dancers and teachers from nine separate countries taking part, what else could one expect? On top of this, there was the opportunity to watch their performances both at midday and in the evenings so that some aspects of their differing styles could be absorbed.

The Ukrainian Group came to us first and taught a long and very enjoyable Hopak for girls called "La Moisson". (They were a refugee group from Strasbourg). Then we were taught by the French Oceanique Group, whose different style in dancing Bourrees was most interesting and a joy to acquire. They gave us La Pica Talon, Le Bal Vieux, Bourree de Confolens (their home village), Bourree des Rats, La Gigoullette, Pelele - and I even learnt a bit of history when they told me that Les Rats comes from Limousin from the Chateau de Chalus where King Richard the Lion Heart died.

The Israelis gave us Mayim, Mayim, Kuma Echa, Erev Bah, Rov Berahot, Kadik Katamar, Nigun Atik. Their leader showed great sympathy to the English people learning his country's dances and his lecture (reproduced elsewhere in the NEWS) was very instructive indeed.

The American Square dancing on Tuesday morning was a joy, followed by the Spanish on Tuesday afternoon who taught Manchegas and Jota de Lorca (Jota Lorquina).

By now our senses were becoming dulled; we were learning more slowly and our impressions of previous dances were becoming blurred. It occurred to me that for an organization such as the S.I.F.D. to derive maximum benefit from such a Course it would have been advisable to send a team of three people, allotting each person three countries only to specialize in and to bring back to London to teach properly to our classes and at social dances.

However, to proceed, on Wednesday came the dancers from the Congo, a session about which we had all expressed some reservations or doubts as to our ability to learn anything. We were wrong. The group leader taught admirably and the class interest was great, so great that we tried hard to fit in an extra Congo session to consolidate the dance being taught, "Hamba", but most unfortunately the group's schedule was so tight that it could not be done.

The Sicilians who came on Thursday provided two Tarantellas choreographed by their leader. Very good show items, gay and noisy; in fact this class was a romp. After the Sicilians we had the Basque, whose leader was very wilful and spent too much time showing us some fast dances and boys' dances which had little value to the Course since they were too difficult to acquire in one session. However, the enjoyment was great and some of the students succeeded in learning one of the dances quite well indeed.

Finally came the Jugoslavs on Friday morning and gave us Buvcansko (a women's dance) followed by Crnogorka and Pravoto. This was a very good class indeed and many students wished it had been arranged earlier in the week when they would have had more time to practise.

At the end of the Course everyone agreed as to its great value to the international folk dancer and requested the Billingham authorities to please run another Course next year, and I believe they will.

We learnt many dances, some were set dances and some choreographed for a stage presentation, but, as I said in last month's NEWS, how else can one give a representation of a live dance such as Waltz, Polka, Tarantella, Hopak, etc., without deciding upon a pattern and a sequence of steps? Now we must see how many of these dances can be absorbed into the S.I.F.D. repertoire. Some may fall by the wayside but I am confident that many will be liked by our members and will become regular request items at our Socials. You will have a chance to learn them at our classes, which is better than picking them up at Socials, so do please make a point of joining whatever class you favour immediately.

I have received quite a few applicants for the French Group which I hope to see meeting regularly on Thursdays, between 8.00 and 10.00 at Pimlico School, Lupus Street, and will introduce them to the dances taught by Oceanique at the very first meeting. The other dances will be taught on subsequent Thursdays. I hope too that we shall make our first contact with a French Group on the same date and that we can later on arrange a weekend in France followed by an exchange visit of French dancers. As you know, I have always stressed the importance of maintaining the correct national style by keeping in close touch with the nationals concerned, as does Ken Ward with the Balkan and Betty Harvey with the Polish. The reputation of the S.I.F.D. has been built on these lines, from Dr. Cyriax (Swedish) and Eily Eistraat (Estonian) through a succession of leaders from many countries over the years, Austria, France, Hungary, Spain to name but a few, and I trust we shall continue.

You will be reminded elsewhere in the NEWS that an Annual General Meeting is now due (15th November) and that names will be wanted for your new Committee. If you know of anyone willing to work behind the scenes to help in organizing the many services we try to provide, then please do approach them with the request that they consider nomination for Committee for the year ahead. It is our Silver Jubilee Year from January 1971, and we hope to make it a memorable one.

THE ISRAELI FOLK DANCE

(Extract from a lecture given at Billingham).

Like the State of Israel, the Israeli dance is very young, but its roots are deep in old tradition and folklore. We know that the Prophetess Miriam performed a dance of victory after the crossing of the Red Sea; King David danced before the Ark; all the people danced at the harvest festival; but we do not know how they danced. The written word of the Holy Bible alone formed the basis for the rhythm of our new dance, as they formed the basis for the revival of Hebrew in its modern form.

Other sources of the new Israeli folk dance are the dances of the Jews of the Diaspora who have immigrated to Israel - the Yemenites, Hassidim, Jews of Buchara, and others. Dances of the people who have lived in this country for many years - the Arabs, Druses, and Circassians - have also had their influence on our dance lore. In addition to these, there are the dances of every new wave of immigrants brought from their countries of origin, especially from the Balkans and Eastern Europe. From all these sources an entirely new creation, the Israeli Folk Dance has sprung, which reflects the wonderful character of our population and country, and the spirit of the "Sabra", the young Israeli born.

The Youth and Sports Department is very active in fostering the Israeli folk dance, not only to preserve tradition and folklore, but also to provide healthy recreation for young and old. Folk dancing in Israel is alive. Anyone can see this from the many festive occasions, and especially in the evening of Independence Day in Haifa, when thousands of young people pass by in a big dance parade and tens of thousands throng the streets performing folk dances and singing till the early hours of the morning.

The dances are based on old and new tradition, some being influenced by the spirit of the Bible, some by the dances of the Ingathering of the Exiles into Israel, and others by the dynamic and gay atmosphere of the kibbutz life. The costumes portray a development of new folklore traditions. They are simple modern costumes of plain colours with some embroidery. The colours - browns, oranges, and yellows - symbolise the harvest and the soil. The loose sleeves and open necklines are eminently suitable for use in a hot country.

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HUNGARIAN NEWS

Alan McLean, teacher of the Hungarian Class, has just returned from several weeks travelling in Hungary, Poland and Czechoslovakia, and has collected a lot of new material for his Hungarian class at Millbank School on Friday evenings. He has learnt six new, quite complicated, Hungarian choreographies - girls' dances, shepherds' dances, Transylvanian, and couple dances - and in all now knows 19 complete choreographies, so there is plenty of scope for members wishing to take up Hungarian dancing. If enough enthusiasm is shown for Alan's Friday Class, he will be very pleased to open a second, or even a third, weekly class. Hungarian dancing is very lively, gay, great fun to do, and the costumes are very colourful.

Alan tells me that this summer Hungary held its first ever International Folk Dance Festival at Pecs in which 22 Hungarian groups and 12 foreign ensembles took part. He is hoping to bring to London next summer the leading amateur Hungarian folkdance group to perform for two weeks here. The name of the group is "BIHARI JANOS", from Budapest. Details will be given when available.

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WATFORD INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCERS. People have said to us, "When are you going to hold another dance at Letchmore Heath, in that hall with the real village atmosphere?". So at last we have arranged a dance for Friday, 16th October from 7.45 p.m., in the Memorial Hall, Letchmore Heath, near Watford, Herts. It is a mile or two from exit 5 off M.1. Cliff Beck is providing the music for us, and we hope Narendra Kotiyan will be adding some rhythm on his drums. As well as these two, we have some other special guest artistes to entertain while we rest from dancing. The tickets are 5s. 6d for one person, or if two come along together they can have a double ticket for 10s. Od. Please come in costume if you can. Last, but not least, there will be refreshments available.

FACTS & FIGURES

While addressing envelopes for the SIFD NEWS recently, I thought it would be interesting to note a few facts and figures, especially so near the end of the membership year. I hope the statistically-minded among you will find them interesting.

For the month of July we sent out 283 news-sheets. They go to 294 individuals and 12 groups. There are only 25 narried couples in the Society (which seems a very low figure to me) and 2 of these couples receive a news-sheet each. We send 14 copies overseas, including 1 group but no married couples.

Within the British Isles we are quite widespread. We send 5 to Scotland, 5 to Wales and 3 to Ireland. Excluding these areas and London, we have members in 27 other counties. However, 9 of these counties have only 1 member and another 10 counties have 5 or less. I must congratulate these lone members for continuing to join, and just hope they can persuade someone to keep them company in the forthcoming year. The greatest number of members, naturally enough, is in London (107) and the Home Counties (83). The figures for London are made up from addresses with a London postal number and include 36 males and 61 females, 6 couples and 4 groups.

We list 15 classes and 6 teachers, the Flamenco class on Thursday not yet having a teacher's name against it. (Ed. Note: This has since been remedied; Felisa Victoria is the teacher). As some of these classes (e.g. Polish and Yugoslavian) have a beginners! class followed by an advanced one, I shall count these as one class instead of two as listed for my present purpose. This then gives us a total of 11 classes per week. Members for London and the Home Counties total 190, which gives us 17 to 18 people per class. These figures are not strictly accurate of course as some Home Counties members in Kent live as far afield as Folkestone and could not be expected to join a class, but they do give us a rough estimate. On this basis, therefore, every class should be able to stay open comfortably, and yet we know this doesn't happen. Some are very near the bread line and some are thriving. Taking class figures into account, therefore, it is obvious that a lot of class members are not Society members, as they should be. If they were, our membership numbers would be way over the 300 mark, not wavering just below. As classes are just beginning again, I do hope our 6 (7) teachers will bear this in mind and be firm about Society membership. If the dancers are really keen to dance, they will pay that little extra. The onus, I feel, falls on those 6 (7) teachers. I don't think it is too much to ask in return for all the pleasure derived. Also, bodies that enforce their regulations are usually held in greater respect than those that don't.

I found it quite fascinating compiling these figures. I hope you will enjoy reading them. To all those embarking on a new session this winter - happy dancing. Baby-sitters willing, I hope to join you now and again.
