TREASURER'S REPORT

This is a summary of the report I had prepared for the Half-Yearly General Meeting, unfortunately not sufficient members attended to form a quorum.

The balances at 30th June total £866.14, which is approximately £250 more than at the start of the Society's year on September 1st last, quite a satisfactory increase, particularly as we have increased our activities this year.

Our Sunday dances are being well attended this year and consequently are much more enjoyable. Cecil Sharp dances because of high cost of Hall and musicians is not quite paying its way, but the Dance Centre dances are showing a small profit which counteracts Cecil Sharp loss.

Generally the financial position is satisfactory and I am confident I will still be able to show increased balances at the year end.

AM I MAD? Or is it you??

The subs are up.

Some months ago it was agreed by a General Meeting that the annual membership subscription should be increased by 50%.

At the end of August all subscriptions will fall due, and all except existing Life Members will be asked for more than before. It is interesting to note that not a single murmur against this rise has come to my ears. Good. I agree. The benefits of membership are so abundant that I can't understand why many more people, including frequent visitors to the Sunday Social Dances, don't join.

After all, the highest membership subscription, that for London members, is still only £1.50. And what do you get for it?

London members pay the highest because they can get most. But all members are well provided for. The SIFD NEWS itself is worth at least 75p, and the existence of the Society is a benefit to all because it makes possible the publication of books and records, the visits of foreign teachers, the organisation of weekend social events and of summer shools and the like, not to mention occasional extra events. £1.50 is a modest sum in view of all this.

Yet even more: whenever a member takes part in any of these activities the charges are always lower for members than outsiders. Members can almost make a profit by taking part in these activities AND in addition get a free bulletin.

London members can get price concessions on social dances alone totalling £1.80 - pretty good for a sub. of £1.50

Any member going to the Swansea course can get a price reduction which may be MORE than the annual subscription in one fell swoop. Interfolk must be an organisation of madnen to give its nembers more than it takes. Yet it seems that as this is true, then dancers who don't join are even more mad than we are.

THE EISTEDDFOD

Folk dancing, music, convivial company, glorious weather - the 25th Llangollen Musical Eisteddfod, 6 - 11th July, 1971. I was sorry I could only spend two days there, to see the opening Fiesta on Tuesday, hear some of the singing on Wednesday morning and watch the competition for Folk Dance Parties on Wednesday afternoon.

Just one cloud on the horizon, there were three English teams wanting to take part in the competition and only two teams were permitted to dance in the afternoon. I was very disappointed to see Harrow Green Folk Dance Group eliminated in the Preliminary Test on Wednesday morning. I thought they danced well (but I admit to being biased) and it was a pity that their lovely costumes were not seen by the enormous audience in the marquee instead of by a few stalwart supporters. However, it was encouraging to hear, when the Competition was judged that H.G. had earned 82 marks. This placed them 10th out of 19 teams and, considering the standard of the opposition and the amount of experience that most of those teams had had, that's something to be proud of. I hope that Harrow Green will carry their banner to the Eistedfod again next year and plant it firmly in the flowers on the stage in the marquee.

Dear Sylvia,

I am delighted to be able to report that our first ever experimental Children's social dance at Millbank School was a great success and a good time was had by all.

At the advertised starting time, approximately half the children were present and raring to go, the other half being trapped in various queues of cars around the district. However, within a 2 hr. or so, seventy or more children were present (which included a few boys), most of whom were of Primary School age. A large number of them had come in National costumes, so that the whole effect was a sheer delight.

Having spent the minimum amount of time on a few basic steps, the following two hours seemed to fly past with a wide variety of first the simpler circle and couple dances and later the more difficult and faster dances of about fourteen different countries. The children did pause for a few minutes to imbibe some suitable liquid refreshment, but otherwise for the whole period, there were no "wallflowers".

There were just the right number of "elders" dotted around to help to organise affairs and we are very grateful to Cliff for his accompaniment during the session. We also made use of the Society's and other records.

We came across one small problem which was the fact that many of the children had done a considerable amount of dancing before and mow many dances whereas others were quite new to the game. So it does look as if in the future we should use 2 halls and divide the children into beginners and more advanced, so that they can make greater progress.

As a result of the success of this dance, we do propose to hold another dance in October, possibly at Millbank again - the date will be given in the September "Newssheet". We also intend to run a pre-Christmas special dance for the children - details will be given later.

On behalf of the Society, I would like to thank all those who brought their own Group along to make this a success and so worthwhile. It would be a great help for the future if all leaders of children's groups would please let either Will Green, Elaine Lofthouse or me know the names of all dances known by their children, so that we can draw up an exact programme in advance for the dances.

There is no doubt that the potentiality among senior and junior schoolchildren is tremendous and has never really been tapped. Very many thousands of children regularly practice some form of English or European dancing within their school curriculum — it just requires us to organize suitable inter-school dances for them in suitable areas and to enlist them into our junior membership. I feel that we should follow the pattern of the Y.H.A. and have a Junior membership for those at Primary schools and charge them say 12½p or 25p for their annual membership and have a Juvenile membership of say 25p or 50p (for those at Senior schools and up to 21 yrs of age) for their annual fee. They should of course have their own distinctive badge.

As a matter of general interest, being connected with every junior and senior school in Hammersmith, we are going to run a series of junior and senior inter-school social dances during the winter months for Hammersmith children only. There seems to be a fair amount of enthusiasm among the teachers themselves for this and the Inspectorate have been approached for their final blessing who also seem to approve of the idea. There should be no shortage of children for these dances - it just remains to choose the most suitable venue and time. When we are ready to commence operations, I hope that a few volunteer members will be around to help to make these dances a great success, which I am sure they will be.

LADO

I approached this article with some considerable temerity, due to my admitted lack of technical knowledge. Nevertheless I felt, as a comparatively new member of the Society, I should at least attempt a contribution if only for the benefit of those readers who were not privileged to see the Yugoslavian dance group LADO in concert at Sadlers Wells recently.

Notwithstanding the fact that my occupation has inevitably brought me into contact with a number of notable folk dance groups from the Balkans, I am still constantly overawed by the spontaneity and enthusiasm they bring to these shores. LADO, of course, are a world famous group noted almost as much for their music as their dancing. I remember, some years ago in Yugoslavia, buying one of their records and being absolutely bowled over by it. Their gaiety and charm is infectious.

On this, their second visit to England, the Company comprised fifty-five dancers, singers and musicians and their performances were deliciously alive and colourful. The footwork was cleanly executed and more subtle than many groups I have seen from the Balkans even in what appeared, at times, to be technically quite difficult steps. A point which is frequently overlooked by dance groups - the stage positioning of the performance - was, in this case, handled imaginatively. The programme was quite varied and emphasised the heterogeneous nature of the Croatian culture with middle-eastern influences apparent one moment and Slavonic, Hungarian and even Austrian (a bi-product of the Austro-Hungarian Empire?) characteristics at other times - no doubt Ken Ward found plenty of material here! The girls had strident voices which, if they sounded strained at times, were nevertheless extremely arresting and, at times, quite poignant. The dancers' costumes were superb and provided the main talking point in the foyer during the interval and at the end of the show.

It was a great pity that the theatre had nowhere near a capacity audience on the evening I was present. And, another tragedy! Why wasn't the lighting more imaginative? Certainly producers have to be careful with the use of 'colours' in case they detract from the costumes, but that doesn't mean they should restrict themselves to flat, monotonous white floods all the time.

However this was a minor fault in an otherwise faultless show. Thank you LADC. Come again soon!

The Romanian dance course is to be taught by Madame Eugenie Popescu Judetz.

Madame Judetz is Ballet Master and choreographer of the Romanian Folk Ensemble PERINITZA. She has been a professional dancer and teacher of Romanian Folk Dance since 1945, when she started as a performer in the Mational Theatre Ballet of Bucharest. She subsequently performed with the Opera Theatre, doing solo and character parts. She taught Romanian Dance in the High School of Arts and in the Folk Ensemble of Bucharest. With her husband she took 1st Prize in the International Folk Dance Competition in Prague. She later became affiliated with the Romanian Folk Lore Institute as a researcher of folk dance. Since 1954 she has been the choreographer of PERINITZA and has toured with that company through France, Yugoslavia, Russia, Germany, Israel, Italy, Turkey, Brazil, etc.

Folk dancing in Romania is a favourite recreation. There are about 10,000 amateur groups (practically one for each village) performing an infinite number of dances and variations. Approximately 2/3 of the dances are line and circle dances. Tempos are lively and the steps vivid and colourful, characterized by foot stamping in syncopated rhythms. From the vast array of material available, Nme. Judetz has selected those dances which are most distinctly representative of each region and which she feels will be most interesting to the International folk-dancer.

Harrow Green in the land of the Cymri

The final paragraph in the story of our efforts to enter a team in the 1971 Llangollen Eisteddfod was written when the adjudicators judged us to be the least competent of the three teams in the morning preliminary, and as only two were allowed to appear on the Eisteddfod, it was the end of the line as far as we were concerned. Some of us were honestly surprised as both teams presented rapper sword and although they were of a high standard we felt our different programme would tell in our favour. We were somewhat dejected by this failure, as our attempt was the culmination of eighteen months of preparation, and we had coped with so many problems, including finding a new home at a moments notice, and the sudden inability of our violinist to come to Wales, only five days before, with the consequent panic to find a substitute.

But after the Competition proper, and the adjudications were announced we were all utterly amazed to hear our name mentioned. So that there was an epilogue to our tale, and we found that we had been awarded 82 marks, placing us 11th out of 21 teams competing, without actually appearing on stage, which seemed very odd! The traditional English folk instruments are the pipe and tabor, and the violin, but the accordeon has no place in true tradition. The second dance was somewhat uneven in execution.

A few convivial drinks in the nearest hostelry and a little dancing in the road outside, International this time, completed a most pleasant day. We shall try again next year if all goes well and who knows, we may even get in the Competition proper.
