FOLK DANCE AND THE C.S.E. EXAMINATION

The Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing is the largest of all the dance organizations, for it covers dance in its many forms, both social and theatre. The various branches include Ballet, Modern, Ballroom, Historical, National etc. The National Dance Branch has been in existence for over twenty years and has done much to promote an interest in this subject, both at the traditional folk dance level and also for adaptation for stage and theatre use. Teachers', students' and children's examinations have grown in popularity and now are held not only in this country but as far afield as Canada and New Zealand. Whether one agrees with the principle of examinations is debatable but what the Branch has achieved is to bring an interest and enjoyment in Folk Dance to a much wider public.

Some of the members of this Branch teach in educational schools and a special form of examination is adopted for this field of work. With the introduction of G.C.E. "O" level Ballet into the school curriculum, the educational authorities now take a more liberal view towards dance and movement. Quite recently the Spurnley Hey Comprehensive School at Rotherham took the C.S.E. examination (Mode III) in National Dance. This is the first examination of its kind to be held in the North of England and Yorkshire. It shows a great understanding on the part of the West Yorkshire Education Authority, the Headnaster of the school, and Miss Audrey Robinson, the teacher of the girls. For the examination the girls made projects, part of which was the making of a peasant costume. The theory and the written paper was based on the countries from which the dances for demonstration had been chosen. The type of costume, footwear, embroidery, geographical outline, music and instruments were all studied.

It would be rewarding to see the development of folk dance at this level in many more schools. Of all the dance subjects, folk dance has so much to offer in the field of education, blending geography, history, music and art so well together, and also contributing so much to the development of the individual.

Those who work in schools will be familiar with the C.S.E. and the various Modes. To present a new subject it is important to prepare a clearly worked out syllabus which has to be submitted to the local Board for approval. The presentation needs care and thought but is well worth the effort. One looks forward to hearing of an S.I.F.D. member who has followed this idea.

EXTRACTS FROM THE CHAIRMAN'S REPORT, 1972

1972, Woodvale's fifth year, contained two important events for the Group. Firstly we moved into more modern premises in Borough Green Village Hall, and the second, undoubtedly the event of the year, was the visit of the Association Folklorique Chaalonnaise to us in October. The highlight of 1973 will be our return visit to Chalons at Easter. We expect that there will be 30 of us going, including Wilf Horrocks and his family. In France we expect to perform English dances, and suitable patterns for English costumes are being sought.

Woodvale performed at "SEE HOW THEY DANCE" at Chatham Central Hall last February, where we did a selection of German dances. The Group also participated in the Society's Folk Safari in Kent last summer, when about 70 dancers performed in the open at Biggin Hill, Tunbridge Wells, Tonbridge Castle and Meopham. Domonstrations included the Round Table 'Spectacular' at Detling Showground, (a joint venture with the SIFD), Darby and Joan Club at Stonepitts Manor, and Borough Green W.I. Demonstrations booked for next year so far are for the Rotary Club Ladies Night at the Greenways Country Club, Chiddingstone W.I. and Tonbridge W.I.

Some of our members have attended several SIFD dances on Sunday nights, including the Reunion Dance in October and a special dance for the French Group at the Dance Centre.

Woodvale's two six-monthly dances at the Village Hall were very successful as usual, the October one, of course, coinciding with the French visit. The next dance is booked for April 14th, the Saturday before Easter weekend.

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I feel I must congratulate the SIFD Committee on the success of the New Year's Eve Dance - personally I thought it was the best dance they have held for a long time - thanks to all who did the work.

How interesting it was to hear the Bolivian musicians, I thought they were terrific. It is a coincidence that they appeared at this dance as Ian had a record of the Incas for Christnas, this means so much more to us now we have seen and examined the type of instruments used on the record.

Although it is now rather late, on behalf of all members of Woodvale, I wish one and all a very happy New Year.
