CHAIRMAN WISHES ALL MEMBERS A HAPPY NEW YEAR

At the Annual General Meeting held in November, there was only one motion on the Agenda, as follows:-

That Item 43 be deleted from the Articles of Association of the S.I.F.D. as it has been found not to be practicable, and that, instead, classes will cease to be called "S.I.F.D. Classes" and will in future be treated as Affiliated Classes/Groups and, as such, will come under Rule 42 of the Articles of Association, with the addition of the following clause:

(h) the teacher of each affiliated group/class must be a member of the S.I.F.D. and be approved by the Committee, such approval to be reviewed annually.

Proposer: Les Avery Seconder: Lily Southgate

The purpose of putting this motion was to clear up the anomalies which exist regarding S.I.F.D. Classes. Under the Articles of Association, S.I.F.D. classes which existed before 1967 are governed by no rules at all and the Committee presumably has no control over them, whereas S.I.F.D. classes formed since 1967 come under Article 43 and should be governed by the rules contained therein. However, as these rules have never been adhered to, the proposer of the motion suggested that they should be considered impracticable and deleted from the Constitution and that, instead, all classes should come under the same heading as Affiliated Groups, except that the teachers of the classes should be approved by the Committee.

The proposer and seconder felt that this would simplify things. It would mean there would be an end to the continuing argument of whether or not all class members should be made to join the Society, and there would be no need to pressurize classes into adhering to all the other requirements of Article 43 - which have never been put into practice anyway. However when the motion was put to the vote it was defeated, which means that Article 43 stands. Therefore, a second motion was put forward that as Article 43 was going to stand, and therefore be enforced, the word "future" should be deleted so that all classes, whether formed before 1967 or later, should come under the same rules. This motion was carried.

The effect of all this is that now <u>all</u> classes wishing to be known as S.I.F.D. classes must abide by the following minimum conditions:

- 1) All members of the class must be members of the S.I.F.D.
- 2) All groups/classes possessing communal property (i.e. payments for demonstrations, costumes made by group members or purchased from group funds etc.) can opt to be:
 - (a) administered by Society Officers, cr,
 - (b) administered by the group leader and an elected group Committee, to consist of at least Treasurer, Secretary, and one other.

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Where (b) is preferred:

- The group leader/teacher is to have complete freedom of action in all artistic matters relating to group functions, but any decisions resulting in payments from group funds must be approved by the group Committee. All cheques to be signed by the group leader and countersigned by the Treasurer.
- 4) A register of members to be kept by the Secretary. A meeting to be held annually of bona fide members to receive a statement of accounts, and to elect a Committee by such method as approved by the group.
- 5) In the case of dispute between the leader and the group Committee, a meeting to be held with them and the Society Committee to attempt to reach agreement. If this fails, the decision to be taken by a General Meeting of the group.
- 6) The Society Committee to call at least one meeting each year to be attended by them and all group representatives to discuss matters of mutual interest.

It is regrettable that Les Avery's motion was defeated and the above Article allowed to stand, as it appears that there are now no true S.I.F.D. classes, as none of the classes in the current list can be said to be abiding in full to the rules. It is also regrettable that more of the class teachers did not attend the A.G.M. so that we could have heard their views on a subject which affects them all directly.

A suggestion was put to the Chairman by Lesley Vale that a letter be sent by the Committee to each class leader setting out the rules contained in Article 43; and a further suggestion was put by Eleanor McMeiken that a meeting of all class/group leaders should be called so that they could put their opinions. The Chairman promised to put both these suggestions to the Committee.

A further proposal was then put from the floor by George Sweetland asking the Committee to set up a Sub-Committee to discuss ways and means of organizing classes which are to come under the heading of "S.I.F.D. classes" and to set up a more workable set of rules. This motion was carried and the Committee have undertaken to set up such a Sub-Committee and present a concrete set of propositions at a General Meeting to be called within six months.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Miss Southgate,

In response to Will Green's letter in the November issue, I am writing to advise you of the existence of an International Folk Dance Group at Stanmore. I hesitate to use the word 'class' after reading all that is being written on this subject.

The Group meets at 7.45 p.m. on Tuesday evenings during term time at Stanburn School, Abercorn Road, Stanmore - a few minutes walk from Canons Park Bakerloo line station. We are a section of Canons Park Community Association and are run by a Committee on club lines rather than as a class. We have been meeting regularly for about a year and average attendance has now reached about 25 (and still growing, we hope). The nucleus of the Group came from classes run in the Watford area by the late Kathleen Monroe-James and we follow mainly the SIFD repertoire.

Other than the Chiltern Safari (where our 100% turnout in costume may have made some impact), we have as a group so far had little contact with the Society. However, some of our individual members are members of the SIFD and participate in such functions as C.S.H. Dances and the much to be commended One-Day Courses. I hope and expect we shall become more closely associated with the Society in the future. At our next Committee meeting we shall consider becoming affiliated but information, at least in written form, on the responsibilities and privileges of affiliation seems to be a bit scarce.

On the subject of classes and 100% membership of the SIFD, may I offer this view from a comparative outsider. The Society should be a body which those interested in international folk dancing would wish to join of their own volition; after all, those members who do not attend 'official' classes are in this category. It should not be a body which one must join before the interest has developed. I believe the Society offers enough attractions and benefits to win its members freely without membership being a precondition in taking up dancing. Generally, I fully endorse the sentiments expressed by Will Green in the November NEWS.

RECAPDING ALUNELUL

Alunelul is the name of a dance family from Oltenia, thoroughly performed in straight lines, with basket-weave position behind, characterized by a sequence of some two-steps moving forward and backward, and a second sequence of a combination of crossing (grapevine like) steps on the spot, combined sometimes with a sequence with stamps, clicks, and hopping steps.

The Alunelul family is very large. There are, perhaps, hundreds and hundreds of Alunelul dances. They are not called simply 'Alunelul' but with a distinction as Alunelul Batut (stamping), Alunelul Sucit (twisting), Alunelul Amestecat (mixed), Alunelul Schimbat (changed), Alunelul de Briu (on belt), Alunelul Inainte (forward), Alunelul Infundat (with drone), Alunelul Batrinesc (old), and so on. All these are variants of the same family. In a village of South Oltenia you can still find maybe at least 3 or 4 Alunelul dances. Oltenian villages have a large repertoire of dances (or, at least, had). I remember in the village of Orodel (South Oltenia), where we researched in 1951, we listed 116 dances. Five years later they had already lost 40 - the old generation passed away and took their treasures with them. In the case of nearby villages just a few miles apart, the variants of the dances differ. This is of value for all dance variants. For instance, Alunelul Schimbat from Studina is different from Alunelul Schimbat from Urzica, two villages located in the same area.

But what about the old wellknown Alunelul? Its origin, and its pattern, in a closed circle with hands on shoulders, is practised all over the country, in all regions in the same way, and has even been exported since late last century, or this century, abroad to England, U.S.A., and all places where Romanian immigrants settled. In Romania this Alunelul was one of the dances which was introduced by the teachers into elementary schools and subsequently spread to the country, being incorporated in the villagers' repertoires. The melody is charming and the text of the song indicates positively that this dance belongs to the children's dances.

It seems to me that there is a distinction between "versions" and "variants". The simple Alunelul cannot have another version, and other Aluneluls are variants. Here our friend Vyts Eeliajus writes me that "the 'simple' Alunelul in the U.S.A. right now does have versions, and they are not so 'simple' either".

The Alunelul Batut was collected by my husband in 1956 in the village of Bistret from South Oltenia and published in 1958 and introduced to the amateur groups in Romania. In the book it is listed as Alunelul Batut from Bistret. The names of the lads who danced it are also printed in that book. (Gh.Popescu-Judet, Jocuri populare oltenesti, vol.II, Bucharest 1958, pp. 47-52).

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RECORDS, BOOKS, TAPES

Over 250 modest people didn't feel that their opinions on our publishing activities were going to be useful to us, so they didn't return their Enquiry Form to me. However, from the 45 replies received came useful information and ideas. Several people made the brilliant suggestion (some even sardonically) that we should advertize in the SIFD NEWS. The fact that this was done with clockwork regularity for years, right up until the supply situation became difficult, seems to have been overlooked.

Most people specified Books as being most wanted, then records, and, almost in a tie, Tapes and Cassettes. Only six people didn't know we published, but nine didn't know of the 10% discount for members.

Various interesting places for advertisements were suggested and some of these have now been followed up. A few people suggested places where advertisements have already appeared. All these ideas have been submitted to the Committee for consideration.

Quite a few people asked for lists, and with the printers' co-operation you should have them by the time you read this.

Thank you for your help. It has been useful.

If you do wish to order records, tapes, etc. we must ask you to have a little patience as a mishap has meant sending hundreds of faulty recordings back to the producers. Orders are being met as soon as possible and Frances Horrocks, who handles the orders, is doing her best in difficult circumstances.

SUNDAY DEMONSTRATIONS

Another rather special demonstration is planned for the February Dance at Cecil Sharp House. We shall be visited by members of the Balalaika Dance Group. Those of you who know this group will need no second invitation, and we can look forward to an excellent show.
