At last our new badges are to hand and I hope to have them on sale at the next Cecil Sharp House Dance. The bronze badges will be available to all members at a cost of 25p. The silver badge is to denote dance ability and will be given, with a certificate, to all members who satisfy the Committee as to their ability to dance five or more dances of any one country in an authentic style. (The required number will vary slightly according to the type of dance but all dances must be in our repertoire). The gold badge is the SIFD Teacher's Badge which will be given, with a certificate, to all who have gained five "silvers" and who have satisfied the Committee as to their teaching ability. In practice, only one silver badge will be given but particulars of the countries will be entered on the certificate and five such entries will be required before a "gold" can be applied for. There is also an enamelled badge which will be given, at the discretion of the Committee, to those whom the Society wishes to honour (visiting teachers for instance) and will also be donated to members who, in the opinion of the Committee, have acquired a specialist knowledge in the dances of any one country and have the ability to teach them.

It is my hope that these badges and the concepts that go with them will provide the foundations on which to build a national structure in international folk dancing with the SIFD at the centre. We, the SIFD, are concerned with International folk dancing. We have a repertoire of dances which are commonly danced by native dancers as well as by "international" dancers, not only in England but on the continent and in America. You have a Committee which keeps a jealous eye on authenticity and we have many serious dancers who insist that the Committee does just this. All of our dances have been learnt originally from a national expert - that being the policy we have maintained since 1947. Many of you have met and learnt directly from these experts and you know what a high standard of dancing they have always insisted upon. It was from these people, Dr. Cyriax, Aily Eistrat, Jeanine Mourraine, Pierre Panis, Peter Dnostrovik, Uncle Jablonski, Nils Mattson, John Armstrong, Thora Jaques, Olga Leromska, Barbara Slawinska, Jan Creplinski, Heinz & Ilse, Elzina & Nilcea, Josef Walczak, Josef Poraczi, John Ungar, Doina, Hugh Thurston, Pierre Goron, Lucile Armstrong, Robert Harrold, Alan Stark, Peter Warwick, George Orloff, Ken Ward, Annie Berard, Magda Ossko, Purificacion, Zbigy, Eugenia Popescu-Judetz, Margaret Colato, Shoshanna Klein, Anat, Jacob & Judith Barkan, Peter Oakley, that we learnt authenticity, and I hope that the badges will assist us in maintaining the high standard of dancing and the reputation which the above-mentioned illustrious band helped us to achieve. badges will not be given away with a pound of tea; they will have to be earned, but I do assure you that there is a great satisfaction to be gained in that learning which allows you to dance in the style and manner of the nations whose dances you are performing.

The purpose of the One-Day Courses which I inaugurated last year and which have been held once a month ever since, is to allow you to practise the dances taught by those early teachers in the manner in which they were originally danced under those teachers' watchful eyes, and to eradicate

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some of the inaccuracies which inevitably creep in when one picks up a dence by copying someone else on the floor. The person you are copying may not know the dance or may be fooling around just at the moment, and you may well pass on that version, possibly embellished, to other learners which (while not detracting from their enjoyment) will over the years give us a single style (English) for all our dances regardless of the country of origin.

In March, thanks to the enthusiasm of the members, there were two classes for you to choose from but the Committee's policy, is, in the main, to hold only one Course and where possible to arrange it for the second Saturday in the month. We consider that the first weekend should be held free for the Sunday Cecil Sharp House Social Dance, the second for a Saturday Day Course, the third Saturday for the Children's Dance with the Trevelyan Hall Social Dance on the Sunday, and the fourth weekend left free.

Recently, I have been thinking about our dance instruction books, and one of the drawbacks in the notated music in the books is that we have given melody, or top line piano music, only. This has often created problems for accompanists who find it difficult to create their own base or harmony. To overcome this I am considering the possibility of publishing, in one book, all the dances from the instruction manuals complete with harmonisation base (or plain left-hand, as you may call it). I have no idea of what the cost may be but undoubtedly the more that are printed, the cheaper they will be, so to enable me to gauge the market I would be glad if everyone with an interest in the scheme will give his/her name either to me or to one of the Committee within the next four weeks. The music will cover all the dances in our instruction books.

I am still enjoying life in Grimsby and by the end of the summer I hope to start a group here. If I find sufficient support I will apply to the Committee for the group to be accepted as a branch and then, who knows, maybe this time next year I shall be in a position to invite you all to a Dance up here. One of the nicest things that has happened to me this month was to receive a letter from Jean Willson, wishing me luck in my new environment and inviting me to join her and Ian for a weekend in Harrogate where they are now living. Like me, they have had to give up their association in the South to 'follow the job' to the North. There is a loneliness that develops when this happens but also a greater awareness of one's friends and also a looking forward to making new friends in a new environment.

#### THE CHAIRMAN WRITES AGAIN ....

Congratulations to Sylvia for producing an excellent March NEWS in Lily's absence, and my apologies for sending my contribution to Lily's address in error. I should like to add the following to my previous notes.

First, our next Saturday Day-Course will be held at Hugh Myddelton School on 12th April, 10.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. The subject is Austrian dancing, in particular those dances taught by Anton Novac and by Heinz & Ilse Striegal, and will include the Corinthian Landler as well as all Austrian dances in our books. In view of my remarks on the previous page regarding accent on authenticity of style, I hope that M.C.s and teachers will take advantage of this Course to check their own style and knowledge of the dances.

Aspirants to a silver badge and certificate are also recommended to attend as many Day Courses as they can. In May, we propose holding another Course in Spanish Regional dances as a prelude to the inauguration of a regular Spanish Regional class next autumn. Everyone interested in joining the proposed new class should try to attend the May meeting since we shall need your views when deciding on which evening of the week to arrange it and at which Institute.

Secondly, at the last A.G.M. the question of the status of classes was raised, i.e. "What is meant by an SIFD class?" or "When is a class an SIFD class?". As proposed at the meeting, we have formed a sub-Committee to consider the question and to report their findings and recommendations.

As I said in a previous issue of SIFD NEWS, when we first formed the Society the Committee booked and paid for school halls in which to hold classes and different teachers were invited to take different evenings. These were SIFD classes. When we transferred to holding classes in Evening Institutes a different system developed. The class now became the prerogative of the teacher and, over the years, new classes were recommended and inaugurated to serve the needs of those wishing to specialize - much the same as in the proposed new Spanish Regional class next autumn. The new classes accepted less direction from the Committee and many non-members appeared in the classes since we did not insist on membership of the SIFD before joining the class. (The original classes were for members only but members were allowed to bring guests to one or, at the most, two evenings after which the guest had to join if he/she wished to continue.) The enthusiastic joined the SIFD but others were content to be evening institute members only. No great harm in this; we were carrying folkdancing to the suburbs, introducing many people to the pleasures of international folkdancing and welcoming those who wished to join the SIFD. But, on what grounds could I designate a class as an SIFD class? Because the original dancers, before the class went over to the Evening Institute, were all SIFD members? Because the teacher was an SIFD teacher? That is the question the sub-Committee is to investigate. It also has to reconcile the differences between fact and the status quo, and the SIFD Constitution which states (circa 1970) "No new class shall be considered an SIFD class without it maintains 100% membership of the SIFD".

#### FOLKESTONE INTERNATIONAL FOLKLORE FESTIVAL

Just a few lines about the festival as at this moment, because I know some readers are interested.

Although we are not actually expecting any Pakistanis, we are in fact expecting about 200 folkdancers and musicians to come ashore in Kent on 21st June for the eighth Folkestone International Folklore Festival. Many of these will never have crossed the Channel before, an awesome undertaking for all Continentals. Quite bemused, just as we feel in similar circumstances when we perform abroad, they will all line up outside the Civic Centre for the 7 p.m. procession to the Opening by the Mayor. This first performance, never yet rained off, is happily this year the only evening one to be held in the open. Each subsequent evening, except Tuesday, concerts will be held at 20.00 hours in the Leas Cliff Hall, up to the Grand Farewell Barn Dance on the Friday. There will nevertheless be a number of other folklore events and exhibitions going on, as the Official Programme, obtainable in May from Folkestone Official Information Centre, will show.

This year, Folkestone District National Dance Group took a team of 27, including a good English injection, four good musicians and handbell ringers, to perform in Sweden. Other members of the group visited folk dancers in Belgium, France, Czechoslovakia and Poland, and a Folkestone girl is soon to be married to one of the Group who came from Moulins to our Festival.

Since 1959, widening contact with Continental groups has increased their confidence in our interest in their folklore. Thus, so far this year we have found that twice as many Groups as we can take have applied to come from overseas countries. Just a problem for the Production Committee, but nothing like that facing the one dealing with accommodation. However, it will all come out in the wash, not in the Channel!

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# TOO MUCH DONKEY WORK - NOT ENOUGH DONKEYS

The SIFD is not a profit-making organization, but all of us who take part in SIFD activities do make a kind of profit. We take more money as a Society than we spend, at the moment, which makes it possible to run Dances at a loss, and to send you a magazine packed with information regularly, despite rising costs. We run Courses for only 50p. Every activity is subsidised. How DO we do it? I'll tell you. It is by the sweat and toil of a few dedicated people who work at the tasks which save and make money. I think it just isn't fair to leave so much work to so few people, when we all get the benefit.

Take the NEWS itself. Lily Southgate gathers material, selects and types it all out, and prepares the envelopes. Kelsey Blundell types the stencils, usually FOURTEEN of them, and then Lily and Silvia Fulton spend several hours churning out 320 copies - nearly five thousand sheets of paper. A day or two later, with the help of one other person, or occasionally two, Lily and Sylvia put these five thousand pages in order, pin them, and post them. I say it isn't fair to leave this work regularly to the same few people. We need more donkeys to help the three or four we have in the stable at present. Do please let me have your name, address, and telephone number if you live within easy distance of London and are willing to give just one evening a month to help out (usually between the 25th and 30th) and I can then give Lily a list of people whom she could call on when needed. We don't want to work willing donkeys to death - dedication should not mean deadication. Or do you think we should have the NEWS printed and sent out professionally? irregularly? unreliably? expensively?

There's another thing. There is an ENORMOUS job done by Frances Horrocks, her husband Wilf, and their three tiddlers. They sell our books and records, at a profit to us, of course. Easy? Not just a matter of taking orders and sending them cut. Who do you think sticks the labels on the cases for the records? Who puts the instruction sheets in order and folds them? Who sticks labels on cassettes and cases? Packs them up? Who deals with enquiries, complaints? and who... well, is it you? We still have over 2,000 records and 500 cassettes to be done. We need a few people who could either get together or even work at home to do some of this work. Easy work; no skill; no pay; just cheap Dances and Courses - and fun.

#### ISRAELI DAY OF DANCE

Four teachers were involved; four musicians gave their services. Members came from as far away as Cirencester, Portsmouth, Ipswich, Eastbourne, Sheffield & Switzerland! Heather Pratt, from Eastbourne, has written the following letter to the SIFD NEWS:-

Dear Interfolk,

On behalf of the country members I would like to congratulate Fiona Howarth and her team on a splendid day of Israeli dancing. Obviously much thought, time, and effort had been put into the preparation of the day's events. It was well worth travelling up to London, gaining another experience in international dance. It was a credit to the members to see "Sold Out" on arrival. Luckily I had my ticket in advance.

Our teachers, Fiona Howarth, Frank Dowling, Gaye Saunte, and Frances Horrocks, certainly inspired us with their vitality, enthusiasm, and love of the dances they taught. The Advanced and Intermediate class groupings was an excellent idea which enabled those not attending regular classes to master the introductory dances, while the advanced dancers could really get their feet into some tricky steps, our teachers taking it in turns to go from one class to another. The day spent inside the school hall seemed for me to capture the spirit of the native Israeli in their dance, song and music. The sound of their instruments weird and exciting, the mood of the music very expressive of the dance.

The evening's party decorations and posters of Israeli scenes, and costumes worn by some of the dancers, enhanced and transformed the hall into a sunny party spirit. The party fare of Israeli dishes, so temptingly displayed and artistically prepared, added that final flavour, along with a delightful fruit punch made from (Jaffa?) oranges.

The Israeli dances we found lively, exciting, bouncy and quick moving. It was a lovely contrast, dancing the couple dance Dror Yikra - Sabbath Day - calm, relaxing movements with all those Yemeni steps; also Erev Ba, and the singing dance Ma Naavu. Bachazar Ha Rabbi, learned at the end, a "fun" dance, would look well in a display formation. My fiance and I agreed that even the native Israeli dancers would find Fiona a formidable match in her energy and enthusiasm.

I think part of the pleasure in attending these valuable Day Courses and Special Events is re-meeting dancing acquaintances. This time I met an Australian couple at present living in Cirencester whom I had previously met at an international dance group whilst living in Sydney, Australia.

Thank you musicians, and thank you Fiona and your helpers for a marvellous Israeli Day of Dance.

(Also enjoyed very much Gaye Saunte's family's delightful display of Danish dances and songs on the Sunday. Our weekend was well spent.)
