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EDINBURGH COURSE TAPES AND CASSETTES

All tapes and cassettes ordered at Edinburgh were posted on 14th September. Would anyone who has not received his/her recordings please let me know, and would members kindly settle any outstanding accounts as soon as possible. There are a few spare copies of the Serbo-Croat cassettes available from me at £1.25 each. Please send money with order.

The cassettes were all made on a fast copier, operating at eight times the normal speed, and it appears that in a few cases the tape may have slipped slightly against the recording heads, with the result that it appears to play too slowly. Furthermore, some of the cassettes are a little stiffer than normal and may cause trouble on cassette recorders on which the drive is a little weak. In this case, re-reeling several times may be beneficial. Please return to me any cassettes which prove to be unsatisfactory, so that they may be re-recorded or replaced.

THE MANNER TO DANCE BACE DANCES

The following is an extract from a book on Basse Dances of England and France by Domesch. If you thought the instructions for Sardanas were complicated, how about this?

- 117) For to dance any Bace Dance there behoveth four paces, that is to wit: single, double, reprise, and braule (branle). And ye ought first to make reverence toward the lady, and then make 2 singles, 1 double, a reprise, and a braule. And this rule ye ought alway to keep at the beginning, as it is said. And sometime is made 2 singles after the doubles, and before the reprises, and that is done when the measures are perfected. Also when any song or dance is written, R betokeneth reverence. By SS double betokeneth 2 single paces, and by d betokeneth 1 double pace. And if there be ddd, ye ought to make 3 doubles after, as the dance requireth, for sometime there is made but I double and sometime 3 or 5 one after another and therefore is ddddd thus written. And when r is written, it betokeneth reprise, and if rrr be written it signifieth 3 reprises, and rrrrr betokeneth five. For ye ought never to make 2 nor 4 together, nor of the doubles also, for the doubles and the reprises are ever odd in number.
 - Also all bace dances begin by singles or reverence and end with braule. Also it behoveth to know the number of notes of every bace dance, and the paces after the measure of the notes. Therefore ye ought to wit that first ye ought to make reverence with the left foot, and then braule with the right foot, then two single paces, the first with the left foot and the second with the right foot in going forward, and ye must raise your body.
- 3) The first double pace is made with the left foot in raising the body, stepping 3 paces forward lightly, the first with the left foot, the second with the right foot, and the third with the left foot, as the first.
- 4) The second double pace beginneth with the right foot, going three paces forward as is said of the first in raising the body, etc.
- 5) The third double pace is done as the first."

and so on and so on, through 11 paragraphs, finishing with notation for various Bace Dances and Dances of England and France, as follows:-

At the end of the description, the dancing master adds:-

"These dances have I set at the end of this book to the intent that every learner of the said book after their diligent study may rejoice somewhat their spirits honestly in eschewing of idleness the portress of vices."

Elsewhere another dancing master gives the following advice, which many of our most boisterous members would do well to follow:-

"In joining shoulders with the lady, take care not to bump against her in your rapid approach, for if you should jostle her too much, you might cause the maiden to stagger backwards."

and again for La Volta:-

"When you wish to revolve, let go of the lady's left hand and place your left arm on her back, taking her and, holding her tight with your left hand, by the waist above the right hip (it is the arm that is over the right hip, the hand being bearer to the left hip), and at the same instant you will place your right hand beneath her busk to help her to jump when you will push her before you with your left thigh. She for her part will put her right hand on your back or your collar, and will place her left hand against her thigh to hold down her skirt or her robe, lest in gathering the wind it should display her chemise or her bare leg; this done you will go on making the revolutions of the volte, as explained above; and after having turned by as many cadences as you please, restore the demoiselle to her place where she will feel (no matter what good countenance she makes) her head whirling, full of vertigo and giddiness, and you perhaps will be much the same. I leave you to judge whether it be a proper thing for a young girl to make large steps and wide movements of the legs; and whether in this volte her honour and wellbeing are not risked and involved. have already told you my opinion."

The above is NOT meant to be part of the syllabus for our Teacher's Badge!

FOLKDANCING IN OPATIJE

Whilst on holiday recently in Jugoslavia we were fortunate enough to see the ZORA folk dance group dancing in their home town of Opatije. We had hoped to see them dance twice but an outdoor concert had to be cancelled owing to the weather so we were lucky they had another appearance arranged at one of the hotels.

The group performed an attractive Slovenian suite and also some dances from Serbia. I was disappointed that there were no dances from Macedonia but was delighted to see some Istrian dances (Opatije is close to the Istrian peninsula) that I have not seen since a previous visit to Jugoslavia about seven years ago. The music is fascinating and in this instance was played on a bagpipe. The group did a dance called Balon which is performed in couples. The steps are quite simple and this particular dance is a slow one with about three basic sequences of steps. They then did some dances from the island of Krk (not far from Opatije) and I thought the music rather similar to that of the Istrian, though probably not to the practised ear. The instrument used for these dances was a double flute. In one particular dance, the girls stood in a line, the men opposite and one by one the men came forward and danced, first alone in front of the girl, then they danced together. The men's costumes were black with baggy trousers, quite close-fitting jackets and small round black caps. The girls' were full-skirted, with a fullsleeved blouse and waistcoat, and a scarf-like headdress tied in a large knot at one side.

Although the whole programme (about an hour's dancing) was extremely good, I found these two dances especially interesting.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Whatever the final form in which Branches are incorporated into our Constitution, it is clear that any Branch organization must include the administration of "Groups" or "Classes" and since I am aware that some confusion exists as to the meaning of these words in the context of the SIFD, for the sake of clarity in future discussions, I hope here to clear up some misapprehensions.

Simply, as far as the attitude of the Committee is concerned, there is no difference. How the "meeting" organizes itself is an internal matter and is of no concern to the Committee. To enlarge on this, if you consider that a class may exist as such for several years, but then one fine day it decides to give itself a name, ".... Folk Dance Group", it must be obvious that to the Committee it still remains the same entity.

The important distinction is, is the organization an Affiliated or Associated one? The former was the original form of attachment to the SIFD and was conceived in the days when the only activity was a single all-purpose class, and it was not until the proliferation of specialist groups and classes in the fifties and sixties that it was no longer clear whether they were "in" the SIFD or not. It could not be assumed that because a teacher was individually a member, the organization was automatically a "Society" class. A Sub-Committee was formed under the Chairmanship of Les Avery to find an answer to the problem and it came up with the concept of "Association". Therefore, we have the following:-

Affiliated

This is appropriate for an organization which for some reason prefers to have only a loose connection with the SIFD. The affiliation fee entitles it to be sent the SIFD NEWS for a year, to have a vote at the A.G.M. (apart from individual membership) and to have a number of visits by SIFD teachers.

Associated

This is for organizations who wish to be more closely allied to the SIFD. It is free, the only stipulation being that the teacher has been approved by the Committee and is an SIFD member. Other members are not obliged to join, although it is hoped they will. If the number of SIFD members in the organization reaches 51% the organization can claim financial assistance if needed and it will be given full publicity in our literature, regardless of numbers.

You will perhaps see that it is difficult to write about any "body of dancers" without using the words "groups" and "classes", and it is true that this has complicated the position, since the Constitution uses both indiscriminately, but I can only emphasize it really doesn't matter anyway.

I wonder if I have made the position clear; if there are any groups/classes as yet not attached to us and would like to be, all they need do is to ask for an application form from the Secretary either for affiliation or association, but remember association is free!
