SILVER BADGE

The Silver Badge examinations were held on 11th February for dances from Austria, Portugal, Basque and Sweden. Unfortunately Margery Latham was unable to be present to judge the Italian, and the Badge Sub-Committee therefore decided to postpone this section of the examination. This meant that the Croatian was also cancelled as the members who had intended to participate in the Italian and had to withdraw were also those who were to have danced the Croatian. Both these countries will be included at a later date.

The Austrian went well, and all five who took the examination gained their Silver Badges. I thought the standard of dancing was quite good but needed a little more life.

The Portuguese was better, and ten of the twelve participants gained Silver Badges. The dances were very enjoyable to watch and considerably enhanced by the vocal accompaniment of Lucile Armstrong. The style was quite good, but I must say I would very much like to see these Portuguese dances performed in the proper footwear - backless mule-type shoes, which would change the style considerably.

Kelsey Blundell passed the Basque (Fandango and Bastan Dantza) and Swedish (Hambo) with flying colours and was a pleasure to watch.

TEACHER'S CERTIFICATE

As previously announced, it is proposed to hold an examination for an SIFD Teacher's Certificate on 8th July 1978. Copies of the syllabus were sent out with October 1977 SIFD NEWS. Since then, the Badge Sub-Committee have made two amendments to the syllabus. Would all members please amend their copies.

- Amendment 1. First paragraph to read "not more than 30 from any one of the five regional groups" instead of "not more than 25".
- Amendment 2. Regional classification of countries. Mexico and the Philippines to be added to list No.3; Turkey to be added to list No.4.

The first Day Course for prospective teachers was held in October 1977, when the morning's programme consisted of talks on Recorded Music (types of recorders and amplifiers, indexing etc.), Planning a Term's Syllabus and Evening's Programme, Writing Down Instructions, and Recognizing Costumes. In the afternoon, practical methods of teaching dances were demonstrated.

The second Day Course is to be held on 11th March 1978 when the morning's programme will be talks on Reading Dance Instructions, Evening Classes for Adults, Music from Various Countries, Costumes, How to Treat your Live Musician. The afternoon will again be on practical teaching methods, and people attending are asked to come prepared to teach a dance themselves.

As before, the Course will be at Hugh Myddelton School, Corporation Row, Clerkenwell Green, E.C.1, from 10.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m., fee 50p. To assist in the arrangements, we would like members intending to come to notify Charles Steventon, 64 Erridge Road, Merton Park, S.W.19, by 7th March. This is not a commitment to take the examination.

SPECIALIST TEACHER'S CERTIFICATE

It is proposed to hold an examination for a POLISH SPECIALIST TEACHER's certificate. This will be held in the summer of 1979. A prerequisite for candidates will be a Silver Badge in Polish dancing, and Polish will be included in the next Silver Badge examinations, due to take place in February 1979. Members who might like to take the Polish Specialist Teacher's certificate would find attendance at the Teacher's Day Courses beneficial. The Polish Specialist syllabus will be circulated as soon as it has been finalized.

MY FIRST DAY COURSE

Not really a Day Course at all, but just a Half-Day Course; and on the other side of London through all the worst traffic; and where do we park the car if we ever get there; and will we look out of place; and what if we are the only hopeless ones among a lot of experienced dancers; and will we have to dance barefoot and get splinters in our toes; best take a first aid kit.

We set off, armed with the Master Atlas of Greater London. My navigator unerringly guides us through the unknown streets and across busy traffic junctions without a hitch until we reach the cool and open eastern uplands of Blackheath, and here is Invicta School - single storey, modern, spacious, in a pleasantly quiet tree-lined road - no trouble at all with parking.

Introductions to Gaye Saunte - change into dancing pumps - a quick look round, no bare feet in sight. Am I the only man here? Not to worry, about 70 people turn up, women and girls predominate but a good sprinkling of men, and off we go.

Two simple dances to start with - Uri Zion and Haya Ze Basadeh; the first a circle dance with grapevine steps and some leaping and clapping, and the second a progressive dance consisting of a succession of four running steps with changes of direction. Nothing too difficult so far, and we have learned a couple of nice easy dances. Next comes a more difficult dance, Tefilat Hashachar, a circle dance with the dreaded Yemenite step, but it is a very good dance testing our skills of instant assimilation and translation into graceful movements of foot and hand, and indeed the whole body. The set faces and furrowed brows show the intense concentration of novices learning from the hands of the master (or do I mean the feet of the mistress?). After that we are allowed to dissipate our tension in a one man-two ladies dance with the man progressing, called Te We Orez. Nothing too hard about this one, and it gives us a chance to smile at our fellow students and receive smiles in return from young (under ten) and old (well, not too old) alike.

Then comes a tea-break, and we need it too. It is a chance to chat to each other. "Where do you come from?" "I come from Switzerland." "I come from the keep-fit class." and "No, I have never done any folkdancing before." Indeed, nobody seems to have done any folkdancing before except Naomi and I, and as for S.I.F.D. WHATEVER IS THAT? How did they come to hear about the class then - why, from a friend who knows a friend of course. But there are one or two familiar faces about - usually seen at Cecil Sharp House on the first Sunday of each month.

The tea is superb, and with a sandwich and a cake or two to replace our spent energy we are off again, but this time we split into two groups and an advanced class is led away (yes, there are about a dozen or so who must have done this sort of thing before). The beginners are doing Kol Dodi which we already know so a hurried consultation with Naomi and the class teacher and we join the advanced class. It is step and leap and

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turn and twist and my feet refuse to behave themselves but others seem to be doing all right, including lithe Naomi, but we decide to return to the beginners and learn two more simple dances. We then all join up again and Gaye Saunte and Frances Horrocks and another demonstrate a slow graceful dance in the dying light of the afternoon, and all is silent except for the flowing music accompanying the beautiful and inspiring movements of the dancers; and then it is our turn - not so peaceful or graceful but satisfying all the same. Then straight through all the dances we have been taught, and when we get to the advanced we join in to do the one we learnt but, surprise surprise, it is not the same one and we are racing round the circle quite lost. I manage to glance at Naomi and she shrugs; I want to drop out but it is too late and we are caught up in it, step-hopping and clapping and grape-vining, two steps behind everyone else. It is over and we crawl away abashed but, wait, it is now 'our' dance and off we go again, only one step behind everybody else this time. We finish the afternoon with a social progressive dance - Mitzvah Tans - and it is all over apart from taping the music.

We drive home through the darkened streets by a different route with no bother at all and we are home in forty minutes. Did we learn anything? Was it worth going? Did we enjoy it? No doubt about it. Yes!

This edition contains articles on Dance Folklore and the urbanized world, which indicates the different roles acquired by original peasant dances when they are adopted by a different social group. Dora Stratou, the director of Greece's leading folk dance company, tells how Greek dances are discovered, taught and presented. John Blacking, Professor of Anthropology at Queen's University, Belfast, has written on Venda Traditional Dances; this studies the importance of dance in the life of an African tribe. Part II of the book contains articles on notation.
