VISITING TEACHERS

In response to the Secretary's request for comments, I wrote the following to the Committee. Perhaps other members would like to raise the subject as a talking point at the A.G.M. this month.

"Re the question of paying for teachers from overseas; I feel that it would be in the SIFD's best interests, and keep up the aims of the SIFD, to grasp as many opportunities as possible of learning authentic folkdances from national teachers. This can be done in different ways:-

- 1) Bringing national teachers over specially.
- 2) Taking advantage of national teachers already over here on a visit or passing through.
- 3) Encouraging our own English SIFD teachers who specialize in a country's dances to visit that country to collect material.

It is only in these ways that we are going to add to our repertoire and find good material for our books and records, and I feel we should do everything we can to further our interests in these directions. However, it needs careful selection of teachers, and also the way in which these aims are implemented.

Bringing national teachers over specially.

We do already pay fares and expenses for one or two teachers to come every other year to our Summer Schools, which is a good thing and I think should continue. It is a big advantage to have them here for a whole week so that we can learn the dances properly. The only criticism I would make is that the taped music provided at the end of the session is not always of good enough quality.

Teachers who are here on a visit or passing through.

Here, we would not have to pay their fares, and the SIFD does, I feel, have sufficient funds to pay them a fee for a day's course but we would have to decide what would be a reasonable fee; we would have to be sure that they are good teachers and their material is authentic; we would have to be sure that music would be available to us, both notation and records/cassettes - in other words that we are getting value for money.

Whether it should be a Day or a Weekend Course could be discussed, but would depend on what time the teachers have available. Also, to book a weekend residential course would probably not be practicable as these weekends have to be booked a year or more in advance and we do not usually have that much notice. I do not think we should take any of the weekends that we usually book during the year with Jack Richardson, Roy Clarke and Michael Clark, as one member suggested. These weekends are a very enjoyable mixture of social dancing, some teaching, some walking, some social gathering for pleasure etc., and not "workshop" weekends. If working weekends are to be arranged they should be kept quite separate and at a place where we can accommodate the largest number of people.

As regards a venue for Day Courses with these teachers, obviously the Londoners come off best. However, I noticed at the Romanian Course in London last month /Contd....

that, in addition to several London-based teachers, there were also teachers/group Leaders from Sheffield, Cambridge, Birmingham, Barnet. If we agreed to pay the fares of some selected teachers, this would go some way to help.

Our own teachers.

We have some good, dedicated teachers who could perhaps be subsidized to attend folk "workshops" or visit recognised groups, or use their own contacts, in Europe, and bring back dances, music and costumes which would be available to the SIFD for teaching at our Day Courses etc. The committee would have to invite applications from our recognised certificated teachers and consider each application and whether to grant a subsidy and how much. Obviously we would have to limit the number of grants and also the amount of money available.

I hope the above comments will be of some use to the committee."

Way back at the beginning of this year, returning from a Cecil Sharp House Dance, three of us were throwing a few ideas about whilst weaving through the traffic back to Stevenage. Initially, we were planning our display and workshop to be held at Bedford College in September, organized by the Council of Sport with various other dance groups. This would be our third year of being involved in this annual event and we were concerned that each year at the end of the day we had been inundated with so many enquiries from dancers who lived within reasonable distance from Bedford, but too far from Stevenage. We felt there must be a way of introducing these enthusiasts to general international dancing, and decided on a Day Course in Bedford. We would need a school hall, a good all-round teacher preferably from the S.I.F.D., and as well as the usual help from our members we would need a modicum of luck to make the day financially viable. After pursuing our plans the great day arrived - 29th September 1979.

The venue was Dame Alice Harpur School situated in Bedford. The instructor was Janet Woolbar, renowned in the S.I.F.D for her expertise, assisted by Frank Flanagan and using the latest piece of equipment recently purchased by the Society, proving its worth in speed change, tone and volume. The day turned out to be really nice, and driving out to Bedford that fine September morning made us feel pleased with life and eager to get dancing.

Jill Bransby started the day off by introducing everyone to the Serbian Suite of dances and Niguno Shel Yossi. Then the local press reporter arrived and interrupted the proceedings by taking photographs and asking questions. Soon after this, Janet Woolbar took over, commencing with the two Estonian dances Oige Ya Vasemba and Raaksi Jaak. After a quick cuppa we were twisting and twirling to the two Swiss dances "Strompt em Babilee" and Scardanala. The Russian Lyrical came next, and what a joy to learn such a majestic dance properly, after having blundered around at Cecil Sharp House chancing our luck.

The Palestinian Hora, or New Kolo as some of us old'ns remember it, came next, and that was sufficient to tire most people until they had eaten their packed lunches outside on the terrace and lawn. The Israeli Lamidbar got us going nicely in the afternoon, followed by the Polish Lublin Polka. Another cuppa and then outside in the afternoon sunshine on the lawn for a recap. This was a really lovely way to finish a most successful day.

The members of Rainmakers worked hard in organizing the day. The school was exceptionally well kept and situated in nice surroundings. Frank Flanagan, as usual, did the right thing in the right place all the time, and last but certainly not least Janet Woolbar excelled herself in successfully adding more dances to our repertoire. Everybody attending, as well as the Rainmakers, expressed the view that this venture should not be the last as it had been most exciting and enjoyable.
