FOLK DANCE INSTRUMENTS

BANDURA (Ukrainian)

A string musical instrument of very ancient origin. It is difficult to say where it originated, but it is thought to have some connection with the Bandora of Italy, or the eight-stringed instrument to be found in the East in Uzbekstan. The Bandura was used in the 16th and 17th centuries by Ukrainian Cossacks and later by wandering blind singers (repatriated Cossack prisoners) reciting "Dumy" to musical accompaniment on the Bandura. "Dumy" was a lyrical epic work about the life and heroic fight between Ukrainian Cossacks and neighbouring enemies, for the freedom of the country. Just as there were wandering troubadours in Western Europe, so there were wandering bandurists in the East. The playing of the Bandura was usually handed down from father to son. The present-day Bandura has fifty-six strings.

DANCES OF MODERN EGYPT AND OF THE TIME OF THE PHARAOH

When thinking of oriental dances, the Western amateur thinks instinctively of a single aspect of the art of dancing in the Arab countries; the "belly" dance. Although known everywhere in the world, up to the remote islands in the South Seas, as being an Egyptian invention, many authors have denied that the "belly" dance is of pharaonic origin. It is true that it flourished mainly in the Middle Ages under the Mameluks and under the Turkish domination. It has survived, in a more refined form, to our days.

Following recent researches, the problem of the origin of the "belly" dance has been discussed again. One favours again the theory that it was known to the ancient Egyptians. It is true that very few representations have subsisted showing girls in the characteristic attitude of the "belly" dance. It has not that strongly erotic character, but seems to have had a ritual meaning, perhaps even magic; that of a very old dance of fertility.

Whatever it may be ,the belly dance is an artistic dance. It does not belong to the Egyptian folk dances. Similarly, the "Iba" dance, which reminds one of the "Chess ballet" of the Middle Ages, was a dance of the Court which has not left any traces in the popular customs of the Nile valley. If we find in certain Nile tribes some dances that look like it, we believe that they are at the origin of the "Iba" dance, the raised arms of the dancing girls imitating the horns of the cow, holy animal for these peoples, symbol of the goddess Hathor in ancient Egypt.

A few inscriptions noted on sarcophagi and illustrations found in tombs, allow us to reconstitute the 'dance of the four winds' known since 2,000 B.C. Contrarily to the other dances mentioned above, the last-named has left traces in the modern popular traditions. A French traveller observed it at the end of the last century, and recorded it.

Another curious phenomenon is that of the survival of very old cults of Osiris. One does not know precisely how far back goes the veneration of this god of fertility and of wheat, the god of the dead and of the resurrection, Osiris. We know, however, that this cult was very widespread, which is natural with a population comprising mainly country people.

The festivities relating to the cult of Osiris have also struck the imagination of the Greek travellers. It is surprising that Egyptian farmers still celebrate today, in Middle Egypt and the Said, certain ceremonies recalling this millenary cult of Osiris. What a strength of tradition, tried by centuries, which enables us today to be present at scenes which happened exactly in the same way several thousand years ago, in the centres of the Isirian cult, scattered more or less everywhere in the country.

We know also the representation of some dances with castanets which anticipate the Spanish dance by several centuries. The castanets had been known in the Egypt of the Pharaohs since the Middle Empire, therefore long before their appearance in Spain.

The Egyptians have known, since the beginning of the 3rd Millenary, dances which they have represented in the bas reliefs of their tombs. We have

reconstituted two of these dances; the first one is executed by boys, the second one by young girls holding mirrors. This study has been possible thanks to several representations showing the various steps which we needed for the reconstitution. The mirror dance does not exist any longer in modern Egypt, but some travellers have observed very similar dances in the Sudan.

I would mention lastly a folkdance very widespread in the modern High-Egypt; the dance "au nabout". This object is a big stick which the farmers use during the dance, simulating a kind of very simplified fight. It finds its like in a war dance known among the tribe of the Bicharin nomads living in the desert near Assouan.

Seen as a whole, the repertory of Egyptian dances shows us, exactly like the music, the most differing influences coming from the centre of Africa or from the Middle East; influences due to the evolution, political, cultural and social, of Pharaonic Egypt. We notice, however, among all the forms and the different aspects of the Egyptian folkdances, that they have their roots in the pharaonic dances. The folkdance student can only be pleased; it is very rare, in the whole world, to find folk customs loaded with so many millenary traditions.
