

There are advantages in having the Monthly Day Courses in the same venue but that does not mean that we in London are unsympathetic to the views of our 'country members'.

Day courses are already held outside London and the Committee feel that this could be developed to the greater satisfaction of our provincial members without sacrificing the advantages of a 'permanent' central venue. (The change from Hugh Myddelton School to Cecil Sharp House was due to circumstances outside the control of the Committee.)

Generally it is easier for day courses to be organised by local people because they would know about the availability of halls and could make arrangements for refreshments and similar tasks. The Committee could give advice on the availability of tutors.

The Committee would be very pleased to hear the views of all members with practical suggestions. I should be grateful if members would write direct to me.

Both David Rackham's and Rod Perkins' letters in the December 'News' highlight the great difficulties under which the Society works, and both those problems and their possible solutions are closely interlinked.

The publicity which the Society issues has to be applicable to all its activities and it must therefore be somewhat bland in its approach. The literature produced by the EFDSS shows the same pattern, as can be seen by the notice boards at Cecil Sharp House, where the official publications are limited to a general appeal to join, together with a brief explanation of the organisation, and the 'hard sell' is left to individual groups and clubs. Both Joan Rackham and I hold stocks of our "Join the SIFD" leaflets and would only be too willing to send a selection to any group who could use them. But appeals to join particular groups must come from them, since only they know what they wish to offer and what type of member they want to attract.

These issues are, as I have said, very complex and there is a tendancy for us to keep going round in the same old circle, partly because newer members cannot be aware that simple solutions have been tried and were not successful. The real problem always remains: we are a small group trying to do a large task.

We are, for historic reasons, London based, but although our membership has been approximately the same for some time, the number of members in London available for administration has fallen drastically. There are, for instance, about a dozen living within a 5 mile radius of Charing Cross, with another 60 or 70 within a 10 mile radius and many of these have devoted over 30 years of time and effort to the SIFD.

In my view, it is neither fair nor practical that they should be asked to do more, and therefore, to ensure the continued existence and growth of the SIFD, the concept of Branches was included in the Constitution. It was intended that interested members outside the Home Counties should get together to form branches, covering areas designated by themselves, but possibly equivalent to the CCPR regions. These branches would be dedicated to increasing our influence in their areas, by promoting groups and classes. One of the first priorities would be to organise a residential week-end course or, failing that, day courses for teachers and prospective group leaders. I have no doubt that Frances Horrocks and the Teachers Committee would be able to supply suitable teachers. In this way, Silver badges and eventually Teachers' Certificates could become available outside the London area.

This may appear to be special pleading, but please let me assure all our valued groups and members in the 'provinces' that their work is appreciated and we don't think that London is the only place on earth! However, it is only by regional self-help that these much-to-be desired results can be obtained.

Finally, a few notes on publicity. In the near future a Crown size poster will be available in two formats. One will include information on groups in S.E. England and the other will have a blank space for any display you may wish to insert. Details of how to obtain them will appear in the 'NEWS'.

Dear Lily,

I feel that I must reply to Roy Clarke's letter in the January SIFD News, firstly to say that I agree with him that his letter regarding SIFD weekends isn't relevant to SIFD Day Courses and, secondly, to give a personal answer as to why Barbara and I have, over the past few years, restricted our attendance at weekends to certain 'specialist' weekends.

We started going on SIFD weekends soon after we took up folk dancing, and very soon we were going on every weekend, attending every day course, travelling all over the country - we were truly smitten. As time progressed and we got to know more dances from different countries we developed a special love of the music and dances from particular areas, as I am sure many other people have. In our case these were mainly, but not wholly, dances from the Balkans with their complex rhythms and subtle steps and those from Israel with their 'Joie de vivre'. We also found that at most SIFD social functions which we attended, weekends and dances, the dances being danced were always the same ones and were, more often than not, not those which we were learning at courses nor those from the countries which we were becoming especially attached to. True, we did Romanian, Jugoslav and Israeli dances but these nearly always turned out to be Alunelul, Serbian Suite, Cherkessia Kfula etc.!!

This letter isn't really meant as a criticism of the weekends or their organisers - please keep organising them Roy and Jack, there is obviously a call for them in their present form as is shown by the waiting lists - it is simply an explanation of our recent absence, which has nothing to do with the venue.

The day courses I feel come under a different category completely. They give people the opportunity to learn new dances, which hopefully they take away and dance at other occasions. These day courses are attended by people from a wide area and will I am sure continue to be so, no matter where they are held.

I should like to respond to two recent letters in the NEWS.

Firstly, speaking as a Provincial I most heartily endorse Rod Perkins' plea for Day-Courses to be held elsewhere than in London. A day-trip to London from here is an expensive and tedious business (and how much worse from the North!) and members of my Group have been very reluctant to attend courses. Many more of them, however, have been to those at Birmingham: the great value of these is to show folks that membership of the SIFD means more than just a monthly newsletter. The last time we attended a course in Birmingham, three of our members, having discovered what the SIFD is all about, became so enthused that they went to Swansea last summer - which proved to be of the greatest value to our group as a whole.

In Bristol, we have been holding a Day-Course every year since we started in 1974; we have had tremendous support, from tutors and invited M.C.s but only on three occasions have we had the pleasure of other visitors from the London area (our next one is on March 13th - please note!)

Secondly I very much appreciate Roy Clarke's efforts to spread his weekends around the country. We usually manage to send a representative or two for a day, when they are within reach of Bristol, and thoroughly enjoy it. The point I would like to make by way of explanation for non-attendance at weekends is that, in our group at any rate, the majority of us have husbands, children or other family commitments, who do not appreciate being abandoned for a weekend. And bringing them too is a somewhat expensive operation.

Keep at it Roy, and don't abandon the West. We'll keep supporting you whenever we can.

The New Year seems to be a good time for looking back as well as looking forward, so we hoped you might like to hear about the activities of Barnet International Fork Dance Club since the new season began at the end of September.

The first special event in the autumn term was the visit of Linda Swanton in November. We always look forward to her evenings. The dances she taught were Senjacko from Serbia, Moravac also from Serbia (currently featured on the new Dunav record), Skudrinka from Macedonia, and Posavski, Drms from Croatia. We hope to keep all these in our repertoire.

At the last minute, we were able to arrange an evening of Bulgarian dances with Christo Stoyanov who came to Barnet on December 4th as guest teacher. Dani Lumley and Di Waller, who have been running a Bulgarian class on Thursdays at Jackson's Lane Community Centre in Highgate since September, managed (with great difficulty) to organise an extended holiday for their friend from Bulgaria. Christo used to dance with the Bulgarian Army Ensemble. He gave several classes at Highgate, and we were so impressed by him, both as a dancer and as a teacher, and by his warm personality, that we felt we must ask him to come to Barnet at least once before he had to return home. He taught a simple Pravo, a Daichevo which incorporated several steps new to us, and finished with a very attractive Reka, which will be a favourite at Barnet for many months to come.

Our Christmas party was a smaller affair than usual because of the weather, but congratulations to all those who braved the sub-zero temperatures and travelled to Barnet across the frozen wastes. Small numbers of course meant more room for dancing and more food, so there were advantages:

- unfortunately, it too was spoilt by a blizzard, but Jack and Joan
Richardson and Roy Clarke won through, and also 4 new members from Harpenden!
It was a pity more people were unable to come as we had a very enjoyable

NEW RECRUITS AND HOW TO KEEP THEM

Diki Gleeson's despair about young people and SIFD can't be left as it is without looking for (a) reasons for loss of interest and (b) more important, ways to deal with the situation.

First, however, consider also how many <u>adults</u> pass through! What a large number have come to our C.S.H. dances <u>just once</u>. Perhaps my thoughts might relate to these too.

Some organisations do keep some recruits: Scouts, Guides, St. John Ambulance and Nursing Cadets, R.S.P.B. riding schools and many others. And just think of the hundreds of stage dancing classes for children. True, all have a big turnover, but many recruits stay for years.

Let's look at some thoughts about holding people longer.

- 1. We offer them no future. I don't mean a professional future, but early in their contact with us we should point them towards a future event, e.g. a joint dance evening with another group, a visit from some special dancers, a show for parents, a simple exam with certificate... even better, a continuous series of future activities. Today's class is not just a one-off, but part of something continuous. They should be encouraged to ask 'When is that Band coming?'
- 2. We seem to isolate them. People, especially the younger, should be shown that the class is part of a great movement that people all over the world dance like we do. It's not just 'jumping in the gym with Miss Wotnot on Thursdays'. I've met dancers of years' experience in classes who have never heard even of SIFD!
- 3. Make them pay. They won't come if it's free.
- 4. Aren't we sometimes a bit vague? At each class children should learn something very definite to take home and 'show off' to family and friends. A fast step, a special hand movement, or a figure or floor pattern. E.G. elbow turn, Cherkessia step, step hop forwards and back. A small achievement that will 'stick'. Older pupils could learn Russian click-heel, reel of three, stamps of Alunelul, Vlajnica step. And pupils should be told that this will be part of next week's dances.
- 5. For youngsters we could revive the plastic badge we once had but sell it to them, and only when they deserve it.
