

#### TEACHERS' DAY COURSE

Owing to the postponement of the Proficiency Badge Tests until July, the March Day course will now be one for prospective teachers. This will be held on Sunday 14th March at Cecil Sharp House in the Main Hall at the usual time of 10.30 am.

One does not need to have any proficiency badges or be a committed candidate in order to come along. Indeed everyone who just teaches the odd dance now and again and would perhaps like to pick up a few hints is most welcome.

All teachers need to have some-one to teach, so we would also be delighted to have some "pupils" to come along and be pushed and pulled through dances that perhaps they already know, or would like to brush up on. We intend to go through some of those forgotten or neglected dances in the SIFD books, so if you have any particular long-lost favourite let me know by 7th March or as soon as possible.

The programme for the day will also include teaching hints - "do's and don'ts" and how to tackle the waltz and the polka. There will also be a music quiz and a costume quiz, and what not to leave out when making notes on dances.

We would like those who are thinking of taking the certificate, or any-one who would just like to have a go, to prepare one dance to teach. It can be an old favourite or you can astonish us with something brand new, but if you would like Wilf to play for you, please let me know as soon as possible so we can avoid duplication and sort out the music.

Future teachers' courses will include advice on how to plan a syllabus and the organisation and running of a regular class, plus more opportunities to practise teaching so if anyone is unable to attend this particular course there will be plenty of opportunity in the future. Copies of the syllabus will also be available to those interested.

#### BERT PRICE PROFICIENCY BADGE EXAMINATIONS

Since we started the Bert Price Proficiency Badge Examinations in 1975 we have an had many new members joining the SIFD, and the Badge Sub-Committee feel that those newer members might like to know a little more about how it all began. We are therefore setting out below a little background information.

Our SIFD social evenings which are open to everyone are a mixed programme of European dances, with little or no teaching, but every night of the week we also run classes for instruction in general European dances and also in specialised countries, where people can learn the dances properly and not just pick them up by copying others who may be doing them "wrongly". In addition to this, we hold at least once a month, whole days of instruction of one particular country's dances, and we also hold every other year a Summer School for a week, covering, say, three countries, for which we 'import' national teachers if we possibly can.

There are therefore plenty of opportunities for members to learn dances.

We also produce books of instructions to go with our records, although we do emphasise that written instructions should really only be used as "aidememoires" as it is impossible to learn style from written words, without having seen how the dance is actually done.

Having given members and class teachers the opportunity to build up a repertoire, either in one country's dances, or in general European dances, we hope to spread folkdances and pass on the knowledge we gain from either national teachers visiting England, or from our own teachers who travel to Europe collecting material.

However, we find that not everyone who attends the instruction classes and courses is able to pass on correctly the dances they learn: particularly in out-of-the-way places where one or two people who are very keen on dancing but have no local group to go to, start a group of their own without any ability really to teach, but just the enthusiasm to get a few people together and dance. Therefore, standards throughout the country vary enormously, and dances sometimes finish up looking nothing like those taught by the original teacher. Therefore, we decided there was a need to set up an "examination" with badge awards, which we hoped would encourage members to want to learn the dances properly, to attain a certain standard.

We set-up a sub-Committee who gave the matter a great deal of thought and we then evolved the following system.

We choose five or six countries and, in consultation with the various specialist teachers in those countries, choose a list of dances typical in style and steps of those countries. Each list contains two dances which are compulsory because they contain the most typical or difficult steps, and members are allowed to choose three others from the list - thus making five dances in all for the examination. A whole day is set aside for the examination for the Silver Badge and members may choose to take all five or six countries on the one day, or just one or two or however many they choose. Three judges sit for each

country, and marks are awarded for style, technique, knowledge of steps, etc. with emphasis on style, which we consider most important. Members attaining the required number of marks win a Silver Badge. We decided to call them "Bert Price Proficiency Award" badges in remembrance of the late Bert Price, who did so much for the SIFD and in launching this project.

The Day Courses we run have to complement the countries chosen for the examination so that members have a chance to learn or revise dances just before the examination date looms up. We hold the examinations once, or perhaps twice, a year and usually repeat some of the countries each time, so that people can have another chance.

When a member attains five Silver Badges (i.e. he/she has passed the examination in five countries' dances), he/she is awarded a Gold Badge. However, this does not mean that they can claim to be teachers.

After running the badge examinations for a few years, we decided the time had come to hold examinations for SIFD Teachers of General European Dancing. The conditions were that candidates had to be SIFD members and that they had to hold the Gold Badge.

We drew up a syllabus which called for knowledge of 100 dances (a percentage of which had to be taken from our SIFD books), a knowledge of folkdance music and costume, but most important of all, the ability to teach. In order to help members, we held three Day Courses, with instructions on how to recognise costume, identify music, plan a term's classes, handle a class of mixed ability, and gave candidates an opportunity to practise teaching. The actual Teacher's Examination took a whole day, with a period of actual teaching (one compulsory dance and two others chosen by the candidate from a list of four, the names of which were given by the adjudicators half an hour beforehand), written tests on how to write down instructions for a dance, how to write out and plan a whole term's syllabus for a class, recognise music, costumes, etc.

We have held only one Teachers' Examination so far but it worked very successfully, with five out of six candidates having passed. We now have, in addition to the several tried and tested SIFD teachers of many years standing, five newly qualified teachers who we know will pass on the dances in as authentic a manner as we have been able to set up. Where possible we have always got nationals to teach the dances in the first place. We award a special Teacher's Badge and Certificate, and this has been helpful in obtaining teaching posts in the various Evening Class Institutes organised by the Ministry of Education.

We then reached the stage where we had a demand for a Specialist Teachers' Badge, i.e. a teacher who specialises in one country only, as opposed to General European dances. We drew up a syllabus for a Polish teaching badge and held a successful examination. This can be repeated for other specialised countries.

We have found the whole idea very worthwhile as, even if people do not wish to become teachers, the idea of working towards a Silver and a Gold badge has certainly improved the standard of even the poorest dancers.

The next Silver Badge examination will be held on 10th July, and there will be a Day Course of instruction for prospective teachers on 14th March.

#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Lily,

Peggy and I were very sorry to read of the demise of Harrow Green Folk Dance Group. After all, it was there where we first met. I used to carry Peggy's bike up to the first floor at Trumpington Road School which was where the Group was meeting in those days!

I first joined H.G.F.D.G. in 1953, already knowing quite a few members from YHA local group circles. The Group was then meeting at Trumpington Road School, Leytonstone (the original Harrow Green meeting place had lasted only a few months).

This was in the days of the Coultrup dynasty! Ron, Wally and Janet Coultrup were leading members, while Ron and Wally's parents collected the cash at the door. Most of the teaching was done by Ruth Sharp who also was Demonstration Secretary. Other leading lights of the time included Johnny Dear, Peter Lilley, a clean-shaven George Sweetland and that dark and dapper man-about-town, Roland Royston-Minton. Ladies of the Group at that time included Maria Sinclair, Edna Moss and Eileen and Marie Greve.

The Group in 1953 met twice weekly with a general dance on Wednesdays and a class-cum-demonstration team practice on Mondays. The latter was officially an evening class for which Ruth Sharp was paid by the Education Authority. She donated her pay for this to the Group funds. Many of the dances popular at that time seem to have faded into oblivion, e.g. Lot is Dead, Fonotanz, Zaplet - but others, such as Kreuz Koenig, Cherkassia Kfula and Datchko Kolo, are still around (with the older members anyway). We even had a monthly magazine called 'Fandango'.

The Committee used to make up a rota of M.C.s for the Wednesday dances, who would enter the names of the dances done on their evenings in a book kept for that purpose. There was some competition to see who could get the greatest number of dances into an evening and thirty in one evening was not unknown.

Music was provided by an amplified record player, using mainly 'Folk Dancer' series records from the USA and a lady pianist, Mrs. Dicker. I remember that M.C.s were requested to plan the last part of their programme so as to use records in order that Mrs. Dicker could get away early. Occasionally we had a visiting accordionist, Mourrie Ffeffer or Harry de Caux.

Once we were on the radio! A B.B.C. recording unit came and recorded part of a Wednesday dance including a part of Ruth teaching. They were so surprised by the lack of background noise while Ruth was teaching that they dubbed some in 'to make it more natural', they said. They didn't know Harrow Green - or Ruth!

The beginning of the end for Harrow Green Folk Dance Group can, in our opinion, be blamed on London Transport. They cut the number of trolley-buses which passed the school causing a drop in numbers and dances and classes. The Group moved to Bethnal Green nearer public transport, but members never seemed

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to recover. Success breeds success; well attended classes attract more people. The reverse is equally true. Poorly attended dances and classes, often causing late starts, discourage and eventually lose the hitherto faithfuly to other groups and classes.

Peggy and I owe a lot to Harrow Green Folk Dance Group and we often think of the many friends that we made there.


