THE MARGERY LATHAM MEMORIAL DANCE

ON 7TH MAY 1983

AT PORCHESTER HALL, LONDON

Very soon you will be buying your 1983 Calendars and Diaries. Please make sure the above Dance is noted on these before anything else. This will without doubt be the most important Dance in 1983.

A STYLE IS BORN

It will come as a surprise to some of you to hear that there are wide areas in the Asian part of the USSR - and for all I know perhaps in other parts of the world too - where there is no tradition of dancing at all; for instance, what about the Lapps, Eskimos, Boot-Arabs and other Eastern people who live in boats? What indeed about the English gypsies? Has anyone any information about any of those?

In the USSR, the Kazakh and Kirghiz people have traditional riding games and recitals of their hero-epics, but they have only fairly recently begun to dance, encouraged by the building of theatres of opera and ballet in the capital citics, where ballet teachers and choreographers, trained in Moscow and Leningrad, teach young people, study the people's movements, the countryside, traditions, folk art and music etc. and try to stage full ballets and dances included in stage presentations, and also dances for the many amateur groups run by schools, universities, state farms etc., hoping no doubt that all that will, in time, filter down to create a real folk dance tradition.

A case in point is the folk dancing in the Karakalpak Autonomous Republic on the shores of the Aral Sea.

The Karakalpaks are fishers and herdsmen, and were before the revolution under the Muslim rule, which forbids women to "expose" themselves outside their home, which of course made folk dancing as we know it here impossible. But after the revolution amateur groups of actors and musicians sprang up, and in 1920 a professional theatre was formed. At first, understandably, attempts to create folk dances were not successful. Even when later "Karakalpak Folk Dances" were created, they did not really have the real Karakalpak character, and just did not "click" with the people. Later dance creations became popular, but only in the repertoire of the "Karakalpak Ensemble of Songs and Dances", as a "spectator sport".

It took deep research into the Karakalpak traditions of accompanying straight speech by expressive gestures and body movements, which all Karakalpaks know, and use for all and any occasion. Definite complicated expressions of old rituals are part of Karakalpak life from birth to death, and based on these the real Karakalpak folk dance was born and formed in three short years; 1956-59. This was the work of Elena Petrosova, who wrote a book "Karakalpak Dances", in Russian of course.

Steps and movements are now described, registered, and rules for positions laid down. All this is simpler than in neighbouring Uzbekistan, where there is an age-old tradition of dancing. But, as there, great emphasis is put on hand/arm movements rather than on complicated steps. In the movement "shagala" for instance, arms are held shoulder-high to sides, elbows slightly bent, palms of hands pointing backwards. This is "a seagull in flight". Many arm positions are like a zig-zag, with upper arms diagonally downwards to sides, elbows bent, lower arms diagonally down towards body, wrists bent, fingers pointing outward. This position can also be held overhead. It is inspired by the ornaments of Karakalpak rugs and carpets. For the men there is a basic position and movement I have not come across elsewhere; sit on the floor, one leg stretched forward, knee slightly bent, the other foot tucked under this leg. From this position several hand/arm movements can be done, for instance "rowing" or "dragging nets".

Costumes for dancing are sometimes adapted from authentic folk costumes which, especially for the women, would be far too heavy and elaborate for dancing - you can see these on this month's cover, by courtesy of Caroline Thomas. Others are specially designed costumes. For instance in the dance "Amu Darya" (the name of Karakalpakia's great river) the girls wear very full long skirts of white/pale blue/

dark blue. The men mostly wear a long shirt with long wide sleeves. This overhangs the trousers, which are tucked into boots. Sometimes the shirt is held at the waist by a long sash, sometimes a short waistcoat is worn.

There are girls' dances, boys' dances, and mixed mass dances. In these there may be solo parts, but though so far no special solo dances or duos seem to have evolved, no doubt in time this will come too.

I am sure we all wish the Karakalpak people a great and satisfying success in their venture to create a living tradition.

VASIL LEVSKI GROUP

The above-named group, under class tutors Dani Lumley, Diane Waller and Moni Sheehan, meet to perform authentic Bulgarian dances from all regions of Bulgaria on Thursday evenings from 7.30 to 9.30 at North Bank, Pages Lane, Muswell Hill, London N.10.

The group has been in existence for about 25 years and has amassed a large collection of folk costumes which are worn at all performances. The present leaders and tutors have all spent lengthy periods of time in Bulgaria, working with amateur and professional ensembles, to ensure that the standard of the dances is maintained.

Bulgarian dances are characterized by rapid footwork, fast changes of weight and complicated rhythmic patterns. They range from very fast, exciting horos of the Sofia region, to slow lynx-like warrior dances from the South, and from tight, upright styles of the North, to the relaxed flowing movements of the Black Sea Coast. The dances used to be performed at Saints' Days, weddings, christenings, and other celebrations. There are certain dances which were only performed on special days - such as St.Elena's Day etc. The ritualistic aspect of the dance is therefore very important. There were dances for particular professions, such as potters and tinsmiths, and to celebrate the New Year.

The dances are accompanied by musicians playing instruments such as bagpipe, drum, long flute, stringed instruments and chordophones, and a very loud trumpet (zurla). More recently, the accordion and double-bass have been introduced. The group is associated with musicians who are skilled in playing the complex rhythms and who accompany performances and rehearsals. Members of the group also have access to a large collection of books on costume, dance and music, tapes and records.

Beginners are welcome, no previous dance training is necessary. Visitors who wish to watch a class are also welcome. For further information please contact Diane Waller (01 692 1424, day) or 01 348 6143, evening).

I received my October NEWS this morning, 6th October. I note that it was posted on the 4th. I often receive the NEWS even later than this. I know that producing a monthly bulletin is a mammoth task but unfortunately fixtures for the earlier part of the month have been and gone by the time it arrives and notice of future events is often so short that it is too late to make travel and babysitting arrangements. As I am very keen to take part in dance courses etc., the fixture list is the most important part of the bulletin for me.

Might I suggest some possible solutions:

- 1) You raise the country members' subscription so as to post first rather than second class.
- or 2) You produce bulletins less often, so lessening the unending hassle of collating, printing, addressing, posting.
- and 3) You consider producing a monthly fixture stop press page.
 - 4) You make the latest date for material to be included much earlier than the middle of the preceding month.
 - 5) You mention hints and rumours regarding possible future events so that country members can at least follow them up if they're interested by contacting the groups concerned.

Dear Jacqueline,

Re your letter printed above; I can assure you that everything possible is done to try to get the SIFD NEWS to members by the 1st of the month, and if you did not receive yours until the 6th, then I am afraid that that was the earliest we could manage it for that particular month. Years ago, when our membership was only about 200, I personally used to supervise and take part in every step of the publication from the initial draft to typing the envelopes, licking the stamps, to putting it through the pillarbox (even searching out a late-night Post Office) and, with the

help of only two or three loyal helpers, with whom I was always in close personal contact, the NEWS was posted by about the 28th. Now that membership has doubled, the task is far too big for that arrangement. We still have only a few helpers but the work is allocated differently to spread the load, and we have to rely on contact with each other by post.

I start collecting and typing material from the 1st of the month (if, that is, I have anything that early); on the 15th I start to put it all together, usually finishing the draft and sending it by post to the typist by the 18th. Then the typist has to find time to type twelve/fourteen stencils and post copies back to me for checking; I check them and telephone any corrections; the typist then has to make the alterations and post the stencils to the printer, who has to find time to print them, staple them, fold them, put them into envelopes, put on the stamps, and post them. Meantime, someone else has to make out 400-odd envelopes each month, bringing up to date new addresses, adding new members (a task that is presently giving us some problems as we are trying to find another volunteer to take it on) and get them to the printer. All this has to be fitted around our other activities, appointments, commitments, holidays etc. and completed between the 15th and, say, the 29th. We do it as quickly as we can, and I'm afraid I cannot see any way of improving it at the moment. (This current month is particularly bad anyway as our typist, Kelsey Blundell, is unfortunately in hospital).

Regarding the October events that you would have been "too late" for; the Friday Class on 1st October was announced in the September issue; the weekend at Knuston Hall was advertized as far ahead as October 1981; the Day Course on the 9th was announced in the September issue, as was the Sunday Dance on the 3rd, and also at least three other of the October events; the French Day Course on the 16th was announced in the July issue.

Regarding your suggestions:

- 1) I would suggest that you put forward a proposal to this effect at the A.G.M. as it is really a matter for the Committee and the other country members to agree. (I might add that it would cause more work for the person sorting the envelopes, and therefore more delay).
- 2) If we produced the magazine say every two months instead of monthly, it would mean people would have to send in notices even more in advance. I find difficulty in getting material even one month in advance. I'm afraid the same difficulty would apply to your suggestion No.3 as I still wouldn't have the information any earlier than I do now.
- 4) If the deadline is brought forward, it may mean members will get the NEWS earlier but it is not going to ensure more advance information unless people provide me with the material even more in advance than they do now.
- 5) I always willingly print any information about future events <u>if people</u> send it to me. I can only repeat, it really is up to the groups to keep me supplied with information.

I am sorry to be so negative in my replies but we really have tried, over the fifteen years I have had of struggling to meet deadlines, to think of ways of making the job more efficient and at the same time practicable, but after considering many suggestions we have settled for what we have at the moment - by no means ideal, but it works.
