THE SOUND OF MUSIC - AT PORCHESTER HALL

Before the MARGERY LATHAM MEMORIAL DANCE on 7th May, I was worried whether there would be sufficient sound from the Band to fill such a large hall. I had learned from previous visits that the public address system installed there could not be used for music reproduction and that we would have to supply our own. The SIFD of course hasn't got anything like this, and my imagination started to run away with me as I heard, in my mind's ear, those hundreds of pairs of eager feet trampling noisily over the dance floor. I has serious doubts as to whether the Band would be able to project its sound to the far end of the hall.

However, thanks to Jill Bransby of the Rainmakers and Charles Steventon of Merton and their equipment, we had little bother with volume. In fact, I am so accustomed to the feeble amplification at Cecil Sharp House that it took me some time to get used to this new power. It may have been this that made it difficult for the Band to get going immediately, and it was a little while before we adjusted completely. I think also that we were affected a little by nerves brought about by the unusual surroundings, the very special occasion - always at the fore front of our minds - and the number of musicians keen to play on such an occasion.

The necessarily prompt start following immediately from the introductory taped music meant, unfortunately, that we were given no chance to test the microphones and make an appreciation of the overall sound produced. (If only we had an efficient technician for every occasion who could arrange everything for us and keep a trained ear on the sound during an entire evening!) Once the Dance had started we could hear that all was not perfect but when you have to concentrate on a list of dances for eager dancers who, although they are panting because they have just finished a dance, are panting to start another, there is not much you can do except scrabble around furiously for the next sheet of music.

Fortunately, things improved as the evening progressed. The hall P.A. system was put to good use by the M.C., who came over loud and clear. Jack, you did a great job but, please, next time give the Band just a little more warning when you want us to stop! Remember that although you may have two eyes hawkishly raking the entire hall to ensure that all are doing what they should, with musicians one eye has to look at the music and that leaves the other crossing frantically between the dancers and the M.C. It's bad enough when we cause our own problems without being helped along the way!

Let me thank the music-makers - the 'regular' musicians and those who came to join us - Alan Humberstone, John Greene, Ernie Childs, Philip Steventon, John Puddock, Barbara Dewdney, Tina Page and Tina Meech. Let me thank them not only for playing but also for donating so willingly all their fees and expenses to the Leukaemia Research Fund, which this Dance was in aid of. (I would also like to say to Mourrie Pfeffer that it was good to hear him playing his push-button and mandoline after such a long time, and to Caroline Thomas playing alone but always a delight to listen to

and to look at). I know I speak for all the Band when I say that although it was hard work we enjoyed the whole evening. We thought that the organisers organised well and their helpers helped well - and we understand that the refreshments were good, too! The demonstrations were excellent; the enthusiasm and exuberance of all dancers was worth seeing. Certainly, it was a most colourful spectacle and a memorable evening.

SOCIAL DANCES IN THE USSR

At evening social functions, the normal thing to do seems to be just as here - get round somehow in ballroom hold - but lately there has been a move to introduce Folk elements - perhaps similar to certain Scottish dances in our "Old Tyme" dancing, though most of the "Old Tyme" dances here seem to be based on ballroom dancing; or are there any based on, for instance, Irish, English or Morris dancing? If so, I haven't heard of it so far.

BUT, during my latest stay in Moscow I have learned a number of social dances, executed in couples, based on the styles of Russia, Ukraine, Georgia, Lithuania, Moldavia, Armenia, the Kazakh Republic (in Southern Siberia) and the Buryat Republic (on the border of Mongolia), with the appropriate music. They are all like the "Russian Lyrical Dance", which is actually included, insofar as they are couple dances, repetitive, have never more than eight bars per figure and at the most ten figures.

In the book I was given there are even a few Polka dances; a Byelo-Russian one, a Ukrainian, a Latvian and an Estonian Polka, and there are some Waltzes - Pas-de-Quatre Waltz, Pas-de-Trois Waltz, Waltz Minion, Waltz Mazurka, Waltz Boston and Slow Waltz. All these, and the following dances are newly choreographed. There are also social dances based on Polish, Hungarian, Romanian and Slovakian dances and, believe it or not, also Rumba, Cha-Cha-Cha, Samba and Paso Doble. These are also in the "Old Tyme" style - fixed figures, repetitive. As I specialise in the dances of the USSR I have so far disregarded these.

But this international display just shows that dances travel, and as Dani Lumley pointed out so rightly, dancing is a living thing, not a fossil. (While reading your article, Dani, I mentally shouted "Hear, hear!" all the way through.)

For instance, many years ago a friend gave me a tape of a "Russian" dance, 'Polka Kokettka', which he had learned from an International Folk Group in Canada. sounds not at all Russian, and the music is actually an old German Pop Song, ca. 1900; "Sehn sie, das ist ein Geschaft!". Who got it from whom, how and when, we will never know. But I do know that I taught the "Russian Lyrical Dance" at an Old Time Club, only to hear a few months later that one of the couples had spent their holiday in Greece, taught it there, and as (surprise, surprise!) they could not find the music, had taught it to Greek music! Now I am sure that the dance will, in time, become a Greek-style one, for one finds again and again that dancers do things in their own style, as for instance the Russian peasants have transformed Western dances like Quadrille and Lancers into their own "Kadrils" and "Lantshiks", or the girls of the Armenian State Dance Company (sorry, Lily) when doing a Russian Khorovod did not look Russian at all, even though steps and choreography were. And has anyone ever heard the Red Army Choir singing "God Save the Queen"? Anyone not knowing the anthem would never ever take it for anything but a Russian song.

To end on a hilarious note: some years ago I was taken to the dress rehearsal of a big Folk-and-Ballet Competition in Leningrad. There I saw a dance that had me completely puzzled. Music and movements seemed vaguely familiar; lovely big sweeping arm movements, fists on waist, quick saucy turns; the costumes were coloured skirts, white blouses and aprons for girls, with black "corsets", and for the boys, white shirts and short trousers (SHORT trousers???). I just couldn't make it out. In the end I asked; it turned out to be a Bavarian dance! I can assure you solemaly; it was lovely, but no Bavarian ever danced like that!

Apropos Jenia's point about people dancing in their own style, the Margery Latham Memorial Dance was an opportunity to see how different groups, from different areas, performed the same dance - according to who had taught them, and how accurate was the teacher's reproduction of the style he/she had learnt. One corruption I particularly noticed was in "Bal A Quatre" which was taught at Swansea two years ago. A simple enough dance one would have thought, but obviously one group had been taught, on the first bar, to turn towards their partner and acknowledge them with a pronounced nod and pas-de-bas, instead of facing forward, slightly dipping the left knee while bringing the right foot forward with a long sweeping step; another group had been taught to wave their joined hands up and down like an aeroplane in the turning figure, instead of just a very subtle, saucy little movement; and I saw hardly anyone come out of the turn and pass on to the next partner on the correct beat. So just in a short space of time the dance as taught at Swansea has undergone quite pronounced Oh, for a video tape of the dances taught by changes - for the worse, I might add. our national teachers. Can the Committee be persuaded to purchase some good video equipment for the SIFD? I think it would prove very valuable indeed. in time for Swansea this year?
