# S.I.F.D. MALLORCAN DAY COURSE, SATURDAY, 9TH JUNE

As announced last month, our SIFD Day Course this month will be Mallorcan. Kelsey Blundell and Charles Steventon will be teaching some of the dances from the last Swansea Summer School, and the following is the order of the dances they plan to teach, time permitting:-

Jota Redonda Jota Antigua Bolero Mallorquin Parado de Valdemosa Copeo Matanse

Either soft shoes or "national character" shoes can be worn. Please bring castanets if you have them. There will not be time for a lengthy practice of these, but you can pick up some hints for further practice at home.

Members at the Swansea Course will recall that Jaime was always trying to teach dances that were not included in the pre-recorded cassette. He managed to teach one of these (Jota Redonda) before we could stop him and this dance proved to be very popular and is also very suitable for general dancing. We are therefore keeping it in the repertoire, and an opportunity will be given during the Day Course for those attending to take a copy of the recording for this dance if they wish. The other dances are all included on the "Swansea" tape, and copies can be ordered on the day, at a cost of £3.50.

Some members may already know a version of "Parado de Valdemosa". The dance taught by Jaime Beltran has the same format of three dancers, and the chorus figure is the same, but the three verse figures are different. It lacks much of the symbolism and ritualistic quality of the earlier version, but Jaime assured us that his was the way the dance is performed in Mallorca and that during his 60 years of dancing he has known no other. We feel justified, therefore, in including it in our programme since, although on the difficult side, it proved popular at the Swansea Course and has been requested by several people.

Much, of course, will depend on the time element and it is possible that we may not have time to learn all five dances in one day. Kelsey and Steve intend to follow the above order of dances but are prepared to be a little flexible if there are very strong objections and/or requests.

#### MAURI DAY COURSE

As Frances Horrocks so aptly put it at the end of the SIFD Day Course of Maori Dances, it was a day of "Elegance and Pois" - although some of us were less than elegant when it came to manipulating those soft balls attached to a string.

It was a delightfully relaxing day of Stick Games, Poi Dances and Action Songs.

Stick Games used to be practised by young Maori warriors to improve their dexterity, alertness and rhythm - and we found that these qualities were certainly needed to keep up the movements of juggling with the sticks, and throwing and catching with a partner opposite, in time to the music. Tough knees are also required as some of these Stick Games are performed kneeling the whole time.

The Action Songs are posture dances in which a story is told in actions and words. Popular themes are Welcome and Farewell, as well as commemoration of great occasions.

In contrast to the Action Love Song we learned, we were also schooled in the more warlike Haka - a traditional posture dance. Although it is thought of by many people as a war dance, and it certainly looks like one when performed with wild gestures, rolling of eyes and poking out of tongues, it is also a dance of Welcome.

Then we came to the Pois, and discovered just how difficult it is to keep control of one poi and manipulate it to go where you want it to - let alone two, going in different directions! We had a lot of fun tying ourselves up in knots and learning Figures of Eight, Sideways Movements, Verticle Circles, etc. To do all this and swing your hips and remember to sing at the same time must be quite a feat!

I should like to thank Frances Horrocks very much for finding someone to teach us Maori dancing. We on the Badge/Day-Course Sub-Committee work hard to keep the Day Courses going, and to make them interesting, but most of the work done in finding outside teachers is done by Frances. It is easy to suggest countries, but finding teachers and arranging for them to come to us is much more difficult and takes up a lot of Frances' time.

It was particularly good to go outside Europe for a change, for a completely different type of dancing as, although we pride ourselves on being "international", we are really mostly European. So I feel we have really trodden new ground with our brief taste of the Antipodes.
