#### WANTED - A TYPIST

As I shall not be available to produce the SIFD NEWS for a few months (the issues for January, February, March and April 1985) I am trying to ensure that there will be no disruption in the publication and that you will still receive your NEWS regularly.

Kelsey Blundell has very kindly agreed to take on the job of editor, i.e. collecting the material, typing it and editing it, sorting it out and putting it together in a complete draft copy. However, it then has to be typed on to stencils, the job that Kelsey does now, and we need someone to take this job on for the four months in question.

The job is to type, accurately, ten or eleven stencils from the draft pages which Kelsey puts together; send copies of these back to Kelsey so that she can check for errors; then, when any errors have been corrected, post the stencils to Doug Wells for printing. It has to be done between, roughly, 21st and 26th of each month - December (a difficult month because of Christmas), January, February and March - after which time I should be back in harness. Ideally, the typist should use a typeface similar to that presently used, so that it takes up the same amount of space. (depending on where the typist lives, it may be possible to arrange for him/her to borrow the Society's typewriter.)

Is there a typist among our members who would be willing to take this on, and so help us keep the SIFD NEWS going for those four months? If so, would he/she please contact me. It doesn't matter where the typist is living as contact is made by post and telephone.

Members often say they look forward to receiving the NEWS and enjoy reading it, so here is your chance to do a little to contribute towards the production. Any help would be very much appreciated. In fact, I'm afraid that if help is not forthcoming, it may mean that we shall be without the NEWS altogether for several months.

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR .....

Dear Lily,

A few months ago the SIFD NEWS published a calendar of folk events during the summer at a variety of places on the Continent. I was fortunate enough to be in Zermatt on 15th August and so made a point of remaining in the village for the afternoon - and we were not disappointed.

Spot on time (after all, it was Switzerland), a splendid procession began - some 42 items, which took about an hour to pass any one point. Groups had come from many of the villages down the valley from Zermatt - Zermatt being the highest village, at the head of the valley, beyond which rises the awe-inspiring Matterhorn. Each village was represented by a group of children and adults dressed in beautiful costumes - we presumed they were their "Sunday best" outfits. There were also groups less elaborately dressed but still very attractive, who later performed folkdances. Several villages had bands leading them.

As well as this, there were groups portraying the traditional way of life of mountain peoples - haymaking with the old implements, and baskets - similarly, cheese, wine, bread, knitting. Some beautiful cows, and also goats, were led along in the procession.

One or two fun items were included - a horsedrawn trailer (apart from the corporation dustcart, Zermatt has no motordriven vehicles, just electric "milk-float"-type vehicles, and horsedrawn carts and carriages), with a selection of Zermatt's chefs brewing soup and handing out free samples in plastic mugs. The final item was the old fire engine, hand pumped, and on this occasion showering the throng of people lining the streets.

The procession finished in a large field, where great tressle tables had been set out, all with (paper) table-cloths, and booths dispensing beer, wine, coffee, mineral water, and all sorts of traditional Swiss foods, lined the side. Everybody sat down to much eating, drinking, and general merrymaking, whilst on the stage a number of the groups danced and the bands played. I enjoyed the playing of the Alpenhorns the most - such a wonderful haunting sound. The traditional hunting horns were also fine - and their playing did not seem impaired despite the fact that their turn came after they had had two hours drinking time!

I wonder if any other SIFD members were there too?

From time to time, I would see Jan in the City of London and chat to him for a while. Not only was he a very fine musician, but he was also a gentleman. I shall miss his yearly Christmas card.
