Thanks very much to all the 'trios' for coming to the 'blocking' rehearsal on December 9th. It was very useful to have a 100% turnout. My grateful thanks. I will send some amended notes to the groups as soon as possible.

I have a tape of the sequence as played on December 9th. If you wish to have a copy for practising, please send a s.a.e. and blank cassette and I will record the music and post the cassette back again.

At the next rehearsal (February 10th) we will practice the <u>dancing</u> as opposed to the <u>positioning</u> which I was concentrating on for this first rehearsal. My thanks to the leaders for teaching their groups the dances. Although at this stage the piece is rough and (not) ready, I'm sure that when 'polished' the sequence will look very effective (dare I say, even good!).

Next rehearsal for the SIFD is on <u>February 10th</u> at 2.30 - 5.30 pm at <u>Cecil Sharp House</u>. Please bring your complete costume and arrive promptly since we have a lot of work to do.

January 5th - CCFR rehearsal (not SIFD one) at Cecil Sharp House 2.30 to 3.45 pm to practice the FINALE. Please will the marby leaders attend this and, of course, anybody who is in the 'trios' and is interested in attending would be very welcome, since all dancers will be invited to participate in the closing item on April 20th. Please could you learn the following words of the Shaker song 'Simple Gifts' (to the tune of 'Lord of the Dance') as we are requested to sing them on April 20th (and January 5th).

'Tis the gift to be simple, 'tis the gift to be free,
'Tis the gift to come down where we ought to be,
And when we find ourselves in the place just right
'Twill be in the valley of love and delight.
When true simplicity is gained,
To bow and to bend we shan't be ashamed,
To turn, turn will be our delight,
'Till by turning, turning we come round right.

Many thanks to everybody for your willing co-operation.

At the A.G.M. we sanctioned four financial measures which indicate in my view a trend we must beware of.

During the past few years I have noticed that these increases are often proposed by members with an income above the national average - some well above. For every member above the average logic demands a member below. For a member well above, logic gives us not a member well below, but an ex-member, or someone who cannot join. And that gap grows even wider. We must remember that the SIFD is part of the general community in which about 12 million people have small incomes. Or do we not want these as members?

Who are these people? They are the students, the unemployed, people fresh from college, families with one income for several people, parents of young families... nearly all of these young people. (One supposes that we don't want to encourage too many O.A.P.s???). We <u>must</u> bring in young people or we will kill off the SIFD. But then - are we organising the SIFD just for ourselves and ignoring the outside world? i.e. making a middle-class middle-aged SIFD?

Do we need to increase our £10,000 capital? I know that treasurers panic over even slight increases of EXP. over INC. But surely we function to dance and not to make a profit on everything.

At the A.G.M. we (1) raised subscriptions, (2) raised admission charges, (3) reduced the number of London's monthly dances, (4) sanctioned a possible <u>further</u> increase of subscription by more than 50%. That is panic.

People have talked to me about such costs because they know my income is a very low one - in fact it is hardly more than one third the national average. But I won't quote anyone else's circumstances. My own is an adequate illustration: After almost thirty years association with SIFD I am now reduced to absolute minimum participation - the Society I have helped to build up. No Day Courses, no new books and records including those issued by SIFD and Dunav, no weekends away, no Swansea, Billingham, Sidmouth. No trips abroad. Few extra group parties.

Now I am not urging concessionary charges for the less well off (though in my experience SIFD is one of the few societies which do not consider the unwaged) but as we have a bloated bank balance, I do ask that you tread carefully before taking the SIFD too far away from those who cannot keep up with you.

NEWS FROM SELPAR

Good wishes from all of us in the West Midlands.

The last few weeks have been hectic, with preparations for the bi-annual Festival of the West Midlands Movement and Dance Association (Movement branch of the Sports Council). This was held in the Central Hall, Birmingham. Some readers may remember that our first experience of this Festival was the night of the "Birmingham bombing" some years ago. Arranging baby sitters and various other responsibilities when three nights are involved was not easy, but all went without a hitch.

Previously, we have shown a selection of Folk Dances as our "spot" but this time a team of 10 strong couples and our banner-bearer, all wearing costumes of North and N.E. Hungary (90% original) created a dramatic effect and impact with a series of dances from that area. The girls timed their sequence perfectly; the boys came in very strongly with Verbunk and then the couples made a very lovely Csardas. To judge by the reception, we did our best to uphold the Society's principles. What's more, we enjoyed and were apparently seen to be enjoying ourselves.

The contrast between our items and those of other movement groups was tremendous and I'm sure we felt it worth the time, efforts and costs. These latter, of course include much petrol, for many travel in from 20 miles and more, and hall hirings for extra rehearsals. Although Dennis Hunt wasn't yet well enough to play for us, it was good to have him back with us and keeping an eye on the P.A. operator (who needed it!).

Many thanks to all those who helped - stewarding, sewing, encouraging and all that is entailed in such a presentation. Now, we hear that the video tape made of the Festival shows us very well.

We shall end this week at the A.G.M. of the W.M.M.D.A. leading members in folk dance and enjoying theirs, in turn. Many more demonstrations are in the offing as well as some joining the Society's presentation in the Albert Hall in April.

It was good to have so many friends with us for our Knuston weekend. We keep very busy, and to those whom we shall not see before Christmas, we send all our good wishes to all members for a very happy Christmas and a good New Year.

A VISIT TO BULGARIA

Last August, I achieved a longstanding ambition. I went to Bulgaria for a week as a member of a tourist party organised by the Society for Friendship with Bulgaria. The holiday more than lived up to my expectations from the first meal on the 'plane to the last trip in the airport 'bus to the 'plane waiting to take us home.

There were ten in the party including an English guide. When we arrived in Bulgaria we were met by the Bulgarian guide who was assigned to us for the week. She was charming and efficient, which was just as well as my knowledge of Bulgarian is limited to "blagadoriya" (goodbye) and "voda" (water). With these two words I thought I could survive a week. (The word for "bread" is more difficult). I thought pointing would help, but when shopping for souvenirs I inadvertently bought two sets of eggcups (i.e. 12 eggcups) instead of two eggcups. Now all my friends are getting eggcups for Christmas.

Our first hotel in Sofia was very comfortable. Our 7th floor room looked out over a huge park. The first day was spent sightseeing. We were impressed by the Alexander Nevsky Cathedral, and the folk museum was very good. So was our first meal, at an open-air restaurant, where we eavesdropped on the music from a wedding indoors. I have nothing but praise for the food throughout our stay.

The next day we walked through the shopping centre, where I dashed into a small shop and bought a godulka (a Bulgarian folk violin). I can't play it but it looks nice on the wall at home! On the Monday we drove in our mini-bus to Sandanski, a spa town 60 miles south of Sofia. Here we stayed at a 4-star, hoping to become a 5-star, hotel. This was a new experience for me and one which I should like to repeat. We had a lovely room with a balcony, there was a marvellous swimming pool, and of course, good food. I could have stayed there for two months instead of the two nights allotted. While at Sandanski we were entertained by the Lady Mayor to coffee and chocolates, and were given a lecture and a lovely souvenir badge. One day our guide, Sacha, organised a special treat for us, this was a visit to the most beautiful house in Melnik where the curator of the museum entertained us with coffee and preserved figs in the best room of this most beautiful house.

We next stayed four nights in Blagoevgrad. En route, we stopped at a wayside cafe to try the famous sheep's yoghurt. It was delicious and the portions were huge. While at Blagoevgrad we were lucky enough to happen upon the filming for Bulgarian television of a local dance group, with a well known Bulgarian Folksinger. She insisted on being photographed with us. Then we were sung to by the local ladies' choir, and very good they were. In turn, Liz and Nadia sang to them. They were surprised, and charmed, by the sisters' rendering of Theodora. We returned to the town to have a good meal in the folk restaurant of the Allen Mak hotel. The folk cabaret turn was excellent and afterwards we joined in the general dancing, as we did on the previous night at the Volga Hotel where our own dear Dunav Group were staying.

One small criticism, we did think that Intourist might have laid on more music and dancing since that was what the majority of our party was interested in, but a word in their ear, and they pulled out all the stops. We were allowed to watch the preperformance rehearsel of the Pirin Folk Ensemble and this to me was the high spot of the holiday. We saw a Thracian dance in rehearsal which was too new to be included in the actual performance the next day, so unless we had been to the rehearsal we wouldn't have seen it. The purists may say it was too new and too choreographed to be real folk, but the excellence of the dancing was such that these considerations paled into insignificance. In any case, all the steps were firmly based in the Thracian idion, and I shall never forget those men's hand movements.

The next day we saw the actual performance at the miners' open-air gala. We were sitting on blankets in the front row with the party bosses $\underline{\text{behind}}$ us. Once again we had the red-carpet treatment.

Our last morning in Sofia was spent in a fever of present buying. We came home weighed down with godulkas, kavals, dolls, tablecloths, a tarrabucca and a single tap tapan.

My thanks to the Bulgarian Friendship Society for organising such a splendid trip. I shall always remember the kindness of the Bulgarian people, and the good humour of our 'bus driver who insisted on playing us a tape of Greek music when he realised we were interested in dancing. On the 'bus, we sang every Bulgarian song we could think of. One or two were new even to our guide, and she was not a little astonished that we knew so many songs when our grasp of Bulgarian was so rudimentary!

We were sorry to leave Blagoevgrad because it meant our holiday was nearly over, but we hoped there were more treats in store for us in Sofia. However, something went wrong with the arrangements, so I spent a peaceful Sunday evening in the bar at the Park Hotel drinking coffee and brandy with Pauline Welch. I spent my last evening in Bulgaria having dinner with some of the party, talking about the state of education in England. Some of the party painted the town red, but I wasn't one of them. I went to bed but couldn't sleep. I needed a cup of coffee and came down to Reception in the middle of the night, where I met the night porter and a policeman. I asked for coffee in my best French. I looked harmless, so they didn't arrest me but asked me if I needed an ambulance. I said, "No, coffee!" but that they couldn't provide, so they politely put me back in the lift, and I went coffeeless to bed. It was a very long night.

Next morning, I bought a lovely blouse, a nice tablecloth (no more eggcups!), and a pretty picture. We said Goodbye sadly to our Bulgarian guide. I think she was genuinely sorry to see us go. The holiday was over, but next year I'd like to do it all over again.

DELILO AND ALL THAT

The Turkish Folklore Group is small, but thrives on challenges. And we get them! Twelve months ago it proved necessary to change the day-of-week of our evening classes from Thursday (a day established over seventeen years) to Monday; and this September we moved from the Gateway School (Edgware Road) to the John Keats School at Swiss Cottage - where happily the facilities are much improved. More tragically, we have had to face the loss of Hilton Calpine, our senior musician - but he was so much more than that. This loss has inspired us to greater effort; we have increased our stock of taped folk music, and edited it, making it suitable for teaching; and we have benefitted from increased participation by Turkish musicians, who can be found in London - given patience and persistence. Our tutor, Mr. Halil Celebioglu, has directed his efforts into three avenues - by 'tightening' the style of dances well known to us, by reviving partly forgotten dances, and by introducing dances hitherto unknown to us.

We are a group for study, and not a cabaret turn, but we were happy to give a brief "demo" at the Doyna Anniversary Dance, such demos serve to keep us on our mettle. We have maintained, and plan to strengthen, our close connection with the Turkish Embassy's cultural group. Ever mindful of the social aspects of folk-dancing, we decided to meet for an informal evening meal at a Turkish restaurant in North London on the first Monday evening after term. Imagine our surprise and delight when we were 18 at table! The success of the evening was no doubt assured by the (carefully leaked) fact that the restaurant had an unfurnished cellar, where we could dance. And dance we did!
