Dear Kelsey Blundell,

I wonder how many ears were burning on Monday 11th March? After 23 years Lily & Les Avery and I met again. They were able to visit us here during their brief stopover in Brisbane. It was great. The time gap disappeared. My Leslie could hardly get a word in as we chatted over old times and caught up on the present.

Our Norwegian Folk Dance Group (the only one in Australia!) has given its first public demonstration. Much hectic sewing took place to have the men dressed in time. We had 6 couples and danced at an open air ethnic market day organised by Brisbane Community Arts Council. The concrete road was a bit hard on the feet, and the space limited by the interested audience; however, all went well until we had finished Reinlendar med Turar, when a pop-band - 12 strong - started up nearby and made so much noise we abandoned our last three dances. True, we were running a few minutes late, but it seemed rather rude of them to butt in like that.

We have another, more important and somewhat auspicious demonstration on April 20th at the official opening of the new Performing Arts Centre in Brisbane. Most ethnic groups will be dancing that afternoon and there is a street parade in the morning (and a free lunch!)

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Dear Kelsey,

There are two points I would like to make about Will Green's letter in the News.

Perhaps the most important is that it costs about £150 to put on a Sunday evening dance at Cecil Sharp House. Attendance generally is less than 60 dancers, so that the admission fee should strictly be about £2.50 if we are to break even. In fact, since September last year we have lost about £350 on the CSH dances. Even when the cost of admission was £1.80 (last year) attendances were not high enough to avoid appreciable losses. The net rent we have to pay for CSH on a Sunday evening is now £120, so one obvious answer is to try to find a comparable hall at a lower rent. Any suggestions would be welcome.

Secondly, I think Will should really have compared his five other organisations with a local SIFD group rather than a national one. In the latter case, the need for larger premises in a central location and the desirability of a band inevitably increases costs.

HUNGARIAN FOLK DANCING

The Magyar ancestors of the Hungarian people came into Europe about the end of the ninth century. One of the earliest references to dancing is by the monk of St. Gall, the Chronicler Ekkchard, who describes Hungarian soldiers, who fought, near Lake Constance, as dancing "jubilant with joy" before their leaders. After this we hear very little till 1470, when King Matthias Corvinus himself footed a Hungarian dance for the Emperor, and again, when his bride, Beatrice of Aragon, was seen dancing "in the Hungarian manner".

In the 18th century folk dancing became fashionable. One old court dance was the Palotas, the Palace dance. Even the clergy took part, holding the corner of a handkerchief instead of the hand of their partners. Besides court dances it was sometimes customary to include folk dances at the balls of the aristocracy who then wore genuine peasant costumes.

Hungary's wonderful treasury of costume is too rich even to be summarised. Contemporary Hungarian dances are meant to be performed in top boots, spurred for the man, and of great significance in the dance. Hats, often decorated with flowers, feathers or ribbons, are worn, to be snatched off and waved. The woman's silk head-kerchief answers the same purpose, it is used as a link between her and her partner and, more prosaically, for mopping her face.

Male dress shows two main types, tight fitting trousers or the gatya, the skirtlike wide linen breeches, and the dancer's rhythm and movement will vary according to which he wears. The woman swings her many petticoats and the kerchiefs attached to her hip, hand or hair. Bells are often fixed to the boots.

Dancing is amongst the arts most easily and most generally understood and folkdance is the most instinctive mode of expression of the people. Hungarian dance has its individual characteristics, there is an extraordinary richness, partly due to personal improvisation. Although many of the traditions and dances seem to be outdated, they are still being kept alive, not in the villages, where it is now difficult to see original dancing among the people, but in the language, poetry, songs, music and most of all the enthusiasm of folk dance groups, both in Hungary and abroad.

Kodaly pioneered a revival of interest in folk songs and dances. Bartok, also, collected folk songs from the original village artists before they became lost in the mists of memory. In the 1930's a Peacock Circle, so called because of the peacock's prominent role as a symbol of folk art and a theme of many folk songs, was formed. Regional and countrywide meetings took place. The best performances received publicity, then by radio, nowadays on television as well. Many young people with an interest in these customs and traditions organise dance houses, based on the old traditions and ideas. Folk dancing is gaining in popularity and enjoyed by many every week.

Janos Arany wrote in his poem, The Killing Angel, 1851, about the Hungarian couple dance, a description that cannot be bettered.

A hundred couples are moving, all of them together, There will be an infinite labrynth,
An interwoven abundance
Unseizable medley
In which - as many as there are couples - as many
Shapes and moods of the dance,
And yet it is the same beat
That governs everyone's steps.

THE GEORGIAN STATE DANCE COMPANY

On their fifth visit to London, they had only one week at the Dominion Theatre before their extended tour of the country. After the first two days no more tickets were available for the rest of their stay and during the first two days the place was crammed with all those who had seen the company before eager to see this wonderful company again.

The programme consisted of many dances seen before, and a few not seen previously in London, and let me add hastily that, for instance, "Kartuli", the one-couple dance is a real folk dance, extensively and often performed throughout the country.

There were a few alterations from the programme we had seen before. For instance, the typical mens' movements on the knuckles (not tips) of their toes has been changed into real dance steps, rather than the "ugly struttings" of former years. On the other hand, I and other "old hands" felt that "Nanari" (The Girls' Gliding Dance) had not really gained by opening it out more and making it longer - and that "Samaya" (the 3 girl dance to represent an old church painting) had lost some of its grace and fluidity by more rigidity, both in costumes and hand movements, so it looked now more like three statues.

But then these little criticisms detract only very little from the overall dreamlike fantastic performance, where even just coming on, the breathtakingly beautiful dancers of both sexes received instant thunderous applause. There is no style in the USSR where the movements of the women and men are as opposed to each other as in Georgia and the other Caucasian Republics. About this I had written in the SIFD News of August 1981.

For the company, their visit finished on a very tragic note. Iliko Sukhishvili, who founded the company with his wife Nino Ramishvili 25 years ago, died in Tbilisi on the day of their last but one show here. For the company it was "the loss of our father".
