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BERT PRICE PROFICIENCY AWARD

On 18th May we held the Silver Badge Examination for the above award for dances from the following countries: France, Italy, Israel, Serbia and Poland.

The overall standard was quite good - in For the French we had 8 candidates. some cases very good - and we were pleased to award the Silver Badge to 7 of the candidates.

For Italian there were four candidates and we were very pleased that they all passed. The style was lively and the standard good. The item was a pleasure to watch.

The Israeli was a little disappointing and the standard not as high as the judges would have liked. Nevertheless all five candidates were given a pass, but with reservations and a little advice on how to polish up their steps.

For Serbia, there were three entries, only one of whom passed. rather difficult to show in such a short line of three, but the one member who passed danced very well, and we hope the other two will not be discouraged.

There was just one entry for the Polish badge, so the judges just had one couple It was a smooth and competent performance, very pleasant to watch, and there was no hesitation in awarding a pass to the one brave candidate.

We were very pleased to be able to award a Silver Badge to the youngest candidate so far - Marion Long, aged 11, and also to congratulate David Rackham on achieving his fifth Silver Badge, and therefore the Gold.

Many thanks to all the organizers, judges, helpers and candidates for all their hard work, and of course to Wilf Horrocks, our musician. The Silver Badge examinations are certainly a very worthwhile project and over the years the standard of dancing has improved enormously.

THE QUESTIONNAIRE

I see that I have not reported on the Questionnaire since last December, which just goes to show how time flies and how other demands on one's time can sweep away one's good intentions. To continue:-

Many members have expressed their satisfaction with Day Courses, holiday courses with the Holiday Fellowship and Countrywide Holidays Association, weekends away, courses at the Earnley Concourse, and the Swansea Summer School. Beginners' Dances are also praised. However, there is a demand from some members for an increase in courses outside London, and the cost and difficulty of getting to London is mentioned. One member would like SIFD teachers to visit groups and take classes as a guest teacher. The discontinued courses at Falmer come in for special mention, and an annual Summer School has been asked for. It has been requested that teachers from abroad visit the provinces as well as London. Apart from teachers, there is a suggestion that Committee members visit groups to talk about the Society.

On a different point, it has been asked why there is not closer contact with ethnic dance groups. There is also a suggestion that we should have a thinner membership card similar to a credit card in size, shape and thickness.

In view of the criticism at the A.G.M. that my own views appear in my analysis of the Questionnaire, I shall let others explain that Society teachers do visit groups by invitation; that Committee members are currently in the process of visiting groups; that there is an international folkdance group near Eastbourne which if expanded could possibly resuscitate the Falmer course; that there is also regular international folkdancing in Cambridge for the Cambridge member who can only get to London occasionally; and that the Ukrainian Dancers at this year's Eastbourne Festival are an example of an ethnic group who ought to be at least known to the Society.

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SUNDAY SOCIAL DANCES AT HAMPSTEAD

The problem of an alternative and cheaper venue for folk dance activities in London has been on my mind for some time, and as a result I have now booked two dates at the Swiss Cottage Community Centre, 19 Winchester Road (very near the Underground Station), from 7 to 9.30 p.m. on Sundays, July 21st and September 22nd. The hall was obtained through the good offices of Mrs. Lucile Armstrong and Juanita, and the dances will follow on from their Spanish and Portuguese classes in the afternoon in the same hall.

These events are experimental and, for the time being, are a personal project by myself. Their success will depend on the support of SIFD Members, and the format of the evening will be largely to suit the wishes of the dancers. It is expected that dancing will be to tapes, although I shall try for 'live' music if possible. Also, there will be some teaching, probably between 7 and 7.45 p.m.; generally it is intended to be an informal evening, filling the gap between the members' and beginners' dances at Cecil Sharp House. It is hoped to attract some local residents, who can be encouraged to join the Society and the Central London general and specialist classes. Admission will be around £1.

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Dear Lily,

At the beginning of May, Rod, Anna and I spent a very enjoyable weekend at a folk camp in Gt. Alne, near Alcester, and feel we would like to share a little of our experiences there.

The people who came to the folk camp were of varying ages and during the weekend many showed that they had numerous talents - some were dancers, some musicians, some were great with the children, etc. etc. Most were only used to English folk (music and dance) but wanted to sample some international dances and music, which they did and appeared to enjoy.

During the mornings there were two music workshops. The first was basically English folk music and the second was International. Each morning there were between 12 and 20 musicians, of varying ability, playing together, and the sound was great. Even "beginner" musicians and "percussion" players gained lots of confidence playing with such a large band. Most people can bang a drum or shake a tambourine in time with the music.

I know the Swansea Summer School is basically for dance, but I do know several people who are going and who are quite musically talented, and others who like to have a "dabble" on the music side, especially when they are very tired after dancing. I hope these people and many others who play instruments will take them to Swansea and have the occasional music workshops or get-togethers, and perhaps play sometimes during the evening dances. There are many people who will hide their light under a bushel unless encouraged, and have a great deal of talent to share and to bring alive dances which if only played by one or two musicians seem very dead.

Folk Camps are, by the way, a cheap way to enjoy folk music and dance, and people, if you are prepared to put a little in yourself. You don't notice the weather if you've got a Village Hall to escape to, and kind people who make soup, sausage baps, baked potatoes etc. for you, to save slaving away over a camp cooker - a meal can take you half the day when your camping equipment is as primitive as ours!

An International Folk Camp might be a way of encouraging younger people in this country to participate in international folk dancing (and all those young at heart!)

Have an interesting and enjoyable summer whereveror whatever you may be doing.

As I was very annoyed about the lack of coverage by television of our part in the CCPR Show I wrote (1) to the television company who made the film of the Royal Albert Hall Show and (2) to the man who gave the brush-off to Steve when he appeared on our behalf on the "Right to Reply" programme. Below are copies of my letters and the replies I received. They are of interest, I feel, in that they tell us everything but nothing. I know that other members of the SIFD have written to Channel 4 and I wonder how the replies to my letters compare with theirs?

To the Manager, Independent Film Production Associates:

"Dear Sir,

Today, on Channel 4 T.V., I saw the programme "covering" the Central Council of Physical Recreation's Festival of Movement and Dance which took place at the Royal Albert Hall last month, and which I had the pleasure to attend.

Why did not your programme show all the groups who actually took part at the Albert Hall? Whoever selected what was to be shown on television was not very fair. Some groups had a large slice of the action, some had very little and some had nothing at all. You did not show much of the folk dancing. Why did you not, for example, show the European dances by the Society for International Folk Dancing? In my view, and apparently in that of many of the audience, judging by some very complimentary remarks I heard, that particular group was one of the most interesting, with their cheerful music, their colourful folk costumes from many countries and lively dancing.

One person in the audience was heard to say about these folk dancers, "Wonderful! How much nicer than all those heaving boobs and bottoms in lectards". Perhaps that was the answer; perhaps it was the latter that the television cameras preferred - or can you give me another reason?

Dear Lily,

The most important point arising from recent letters is that we need to attract more young people to the SIFD. I doubt that they can all be put off on financial grounds (though some - and 0.A.P.s - may well be). More likely they just don't know we exist. Last month Rachel Novak thanked the SIFD "for opening our eyes to a world of dance that we previously didn't know existed".

Lately, I have been limited to "minimum participation" - sitting at home reading the SIFD NEWS (for which many thanks to all who produce and distribute it). But in almost 20 years of membership I have seldom danced at Cecil Sharp House because of distance. Saturday courses were possible, but even so I spent more time (and money) travelling than actually dancing.

It is sad that the lady who wrote from Bristol cannot afford to go to Swansea, but at least she will be able to learn the dances later from other members of her group. She is fortunate to have classes and even day courses locally. The Summer Schools are a wonderful experience and great fun, but Oh! the frustration felt by us isolated country members on returning home, wondering if or when we would be able to do those dances again.

A pen-friend writing enthusiastically last year how much he had enjoyed a week of international dancing led by Philip Lloyd at C.H.A. Whitby said that if there were a local group (Durham) he would join the SIFD. More local groups in different areas are needed, but I do appreciate the difficulties. I have tried in vain to interest people here (Sheerness/Sheppey). When teaching I sometimes include a few simple European or Israeli dances but with limited success. Children say, "Miss, can't we do pop, disco, go-go (according to the current craze) dancing?". There is no continuity for those few interested, as folk dancing on Sheppey consists of a tiny group of middle-aged and elderly people who dance Scottish, and a small group of ladies, mostly elderly, who dance English. No incentive for young people there; they go to discos.

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Young people are influenced by what they see on television. Is there any possibility of publicising ourselves in that way? What about Susan Tupper's idea of a marathon dance, maybe combined with next year's London Marathon?

Certainly we need to expand or, as Will Green says, the SIFD will fizzle out. A Society which gives (and has given over the years) so much pleasure to so many is well worthwhile.

THE LONG TERM FUTURE OF THE SIFD

At the last A.G.M. a motion was passed to "Form a sub-Committee to consider the long-term future of the SIFD and how it can best be organized to achieve its ends". This sub-Committee is now in existence and includes Ed Whiteley, Will Green, George Sweetland, David Rackham and myself.

One of the first minor hurdles to efficient operation of our sub-Committee (I will call it L.T.F. for short) was the following: We are not dealing with hard facts. The long-term future of the Society is a matter of taste (even the need for larger membership can be argued for or against, depending on your personality). Once we decide what the membership wants, we have to recommend ways of achieving it. This too is a matter of opinion, and though it is easy to criticise the present organization it is more difficult to suggest alternatives, or to say with any degree of certainty that these alternatives will work.

It follows that it is pointless for the L.T.F. to argue points at length, or even to insist on presenting a majority report at the end. Instead, we are going to try to talk to as many members as possible, both in London ard "far away places". Our first objective is to gather opinions. I know there has been a Questionnaire, but what we need is not answers to questions someone else has thought of. We want your own problems, big or small, and good points too! Many people have already been approached, and though it is early to summarise, it is interesting to have a glimpse at what has been said. Criticism includes not only the structure but the Constitution itself (indirectly). The objects of the Society are stated to be, "preserving folk dances, encourage the practice, promote knowledge etc. etc.". The word "fun" is not even mentioned. To many people, the reason for dancing is fun, and if we are to "encourage the practice of folk dancing" we must surely try to make it look like fun.

A major structural feature has caused a lot of talk recently; the distinction between Affiliated group, Associated class, and Branch, is not understood by some people and others find it irrelevant. Connected with this is the question of teachers' badges. An Associated class must have an SIFD approved teacher, and we might lose some Associated classes because approved teachers are retiring and new ones either cannot or will not take the badge examination. If we do lose them, the loss will be ours not theirs.

Communication between the various constituents of the Society is another major area of concern, e.g. communication (or lack of it) between the centre and the various clubs, and the lack of communication between the SIFD and other bodies, and in particular similar organizations abroad.

The above is just a sample of what has been said, and much abbreviated at that. If you have any thoughts, please contact me or any other L.T.F. member. We will be most grateful.

WOODVALE INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCE GROUP, VISIT TO CHALONS-SUR-MARNE, FRANCE. 17th to 20th May 1985

Woodvale has been twinned with the Association Folklorique Chaalonaise since 1974 and we have had regular exchange visits until 1977, when it became too much for our small group. Despite this, we have kept in touch, and this year we were invited to take part in their 15th Anniversary celebrations.

When we arrived in Chalons we found that it was also the 7th International Arts Festival and so there were also groups from Holland, Ireland, Bulgaria, Austria and other regions of France (Bourgogne, Lorraine, Auvergne). Our group consisted of 12 dancers (5 of whom are under 17), a borrowed musician (Tina Meech kindly agreed to play for us), two "old members" and a "mascot" (Alison's Mum). It was very useful having live music even though the first chance we had to practise dancing to Tina's playing was just before our first display!

We travelled to France by coach, leaving Borough Green at 7.15 a.m. on the Friday and arriving in Chalons at 6 p.m. We were put up with families - actually they put up with us, as we couldn't speak much French and they spoke little English, but we muddled through, using that great international language - sign language.

We had a very packed programme arranged for us. A concert of Hurdy Gurdy playing on the Friday evening, a visit to the Mercier Champagne cellars on Saturday morning, a procession through the town, and a display in front of the Mayor - with an exchange of presents - on Saturday afternoon, and a "mammoth" display by all the groups on Sunday, lasting from 3 p.m. until after 8 p.m. Saturday evening and Sunday morning were free to spend with the families.

This was quite a hectic schedule, yet despite this we still had enough energy left to dance in the car park at Calais for an hour whilst waiting for our ferry - much to the bemusement of people coming off the ferries.
