"WILD BORSCHT"

"Wild Borscht" is the name of a folk group which specialises in music from Eastern Europe. Based in Devon, they have had a great success playing at various festivals, folk clubs, on the radio and television. Their latest recording is a cassette called "Wild Borscht" and includes traditional music from the Ukraine, Moldavia, Russia, Romania, Czechoslovakia as well as Gipsy and Hassidic.

The group consists of five musicians, with several others joining for certain of the numbers. They play a variety of instruments - accordion, bayan, bass, violin, domre, clarinet, recorders, kcbza, fujara and percussion. The sound is excellent and very "foot tapping" and cheerful.

CHINESE DANCE

In China there are two major forms of dance - Chinese Folk Dance and Chinese Classical or Court Dance.

Chinese Folk Dance, the oldest of all the dance forms, has its roots in the imitation of the animals that man hunted to provide food and clothing, and in the agricultural and working life of the peasants. There are many dances which reflect picking tea, gathering herbs, collecting flowers, planting rice, fishing, working in the fields, etc. There are also other dances based on animals such as the lion, dragon, horse, peacock etc. Many of the traditional dance movements and steps are based on and named after the actions of animals and birds such as, "Pair of Flying Swallows", "Tiger Jumping", "Black Dragon Shakes the Columns" and "Steps of the Scorpion".

The martial arts have always been popular in China, and still are. Over 1200 years ago sword dances were being performed, and today there are many wonderful dances based on the agility and dexterity of sword play.

The development of Chinese dance really began in the Han Dynasty (206 BC - AD 220) and continued through to the Sui and Tang Dynasties (589 AD). The Tang Dynasty was known as the Golden Age of dance and it was during that time that the beautiful Chinese Classical or Court dances were created. Devised for court entertainment, the dancers used elaborate fans, long floating sleeves, yards of ribbon, or represented water lilies, peacocks, etc. From the Sung Dynasty (907 AD) onwards, the arts gradually fell into a decline. Many of the dancers and musicians left the courts and dispersed into the various regions and were to play a very important role in developing folk song and dance.

China now consists of 55 national minorities, each region having its own costume and style of dancing. In Mongolia, in the North-West, the dances show the strong, hard-working approach of this nomadic, horse-riding group and are quite different from those of the South or from the Sinkiang region which have unusual arm and head movements.

Dance in China went through many difficulties; sometimes it was banned altogether. Contact between the sexes was not considered proper. Therefore folk dance was very limited (perhaps that is why today Balkan and Israeli dances are so popular). The custom of binding the feet of girls, which continued right up to the 20th century, again made dance practically impossible, although this practice did not apply to the peasants. It was only in the late 1940s, with the Chinese Liberation, that the arts began to flourish again, although for ten years during the Cultural Revolution and the "Gang of Four" they were to suffer drastically.

Today, many of the Classical dances have been reconstructed and the folk dances recreated. A very unusual style are the Dunhuang dances which have been based on the dancing poses of ancient murals and sculptures of over 1,000 years ago. There are many simple and popular folk dances which are used for recreational purposes and are based on traditional melodies and incorporate steps and features common to a particular minority group. Children are taught dance at a very early age from Primary School upwards and a great deal of support is given by the Government to dance at all levels. Chinese Classical and Chinese Folk Dance is certainly flourishing once again.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Lily,

Just a few lines to let you know that after about 6,500 miles in the wilds of the Third World of South America, I'm back in one piece. The trip was pretty exciting although a bit frightening at times, travelling on narrow tracks in the High Andes with a sheer drop of hundreds of feet at the side of the so-called highway. Throughout it was intensely hot, and even at 15,000 feet, the sun was still blazing down but with the addition of pure mountain air as a pleasant relief but with the dust of the deserts and plains. I didn't risk going into the Amazon jungle; I got bitten enough times along the coast and near the rivers, and was glad that I had taken the precaution of having all the necessary injections and regularly taking the tablets.

Ouring the trip, I met a Canadian cyclist in Lima youth hostel who was on a solo three—years cycling tour round the whole world; he's already in the Guinness Book of Records for a previous world cycling tour. I travelled on the highest railway in the world, getting to the highest crossing point of the Andes, did a 12—hour 'bus trip on what the Peruvians proudly claim as the worst highway in the world. I believe them because I had the bad luck of having to sit in a back seat and on four occasions I was bounced up to hit my head on a ledge above the back seats. In La Paz, Bolivia, I visited the highest ski resort in the world at 5,800 metres, then went round Lake Titicaca, on the borders of Peru and Bolivia, which is the highest navigable lake in the world, and finally in Rio de Janeiro saw the longest bridge in the world, 15kms.

The only real mishap occurred on the final Sunday when travelling on a very crowded 'bus to a typical tourist market in Rio; trying to get off the 'bus, I got pushed around by a crowd of youths and discovered that my passport, about £500, and other documents had been stolen.

At every town I seemed to be a few days too early or too late to see the local Folklore Festivals and was particularly disappointed to miss the Mexican State Folklore Company in Mexico City. However, in Peru, in the heart of the Incas country, I did see a few performances by local folkdance groups and spent an afternoon learning eight dances from one of these groups and got a cassette made by their musicians. So my hope of learning enough dances of all these countries to form a South American group here cannot materialise. I have, however, a good selection of cassettes of the folk music of every country. If anybody is interested in having a copy of any of the music, I'll be pleased to oblige.

Can I now please remind members who might be interested that they are welcome to weekly Romanian dance classes every Friday evening from 7 to 9 o'clock in the Gymnasium of the Y.W.C.A. in Great Russell Street, near Tottenham Court Road Station, London. The classes will be free. We will have the use of 16 sets of original Romanian costumes from the Embassy if we are asked to perform publicly, and the group will be known as "Romanian Rhapsody". Galina Tuker has now transferred her Bulgarian class from the Y.W.C.A. to the Grays Inn Resource Centre at 1A Rosevery Avenue, by the junction with Grays Inn Road.

Even before publication of the March SIFD NEWS containing my letter requesting mallorquin music, I had a letter from Lily Avery offering assistance, and a few days after publication came a surprise package of tape and instructions from Ken Poyton of the Watford Group. We are delighted down here, and especially Ann Houghton. Thank you so very much.

The group here continues to expand; nineteen now, with thirteen the highest weekly attendance. We are preparing for our first W.I. demonstration and taking a very informal approach with a "join us in our fun" attitude rather than a "this is how it should be" one.

Have any of you read Leonard Knight's books about the "Rebecca Riots" (Conquerors Road, Deadmans Bay and Judgement Rock)? In them he describes with great accuracy and great feeling the desolate moors, the narrow lanes between high Pembrokeshire banks and the isolated properties. All of these are local to here and can quite easily be identified. Just imagine then one such isolated mill swathed in mists by a gurgling brook and a babble of voices coming forth, not of the Rebecca Rioters hatching out some bloody plot, but of international folkdancers laughing and dancing the hours away as they hatch out the plot of some new dance. (We even discuss the possibilities of the Mill weaving our folk fabrics when required). This really is the setting for our group, and avoiding foxes and badgers rather than cars as we drive to and from the mill is the norm. The Pembrokeshire banks are all lined now with snowdrops, and the primroses are on the way. Soon it will be red campion, bluebells and foxgloves. I do go on, I know, but sitting out here in the sunshine, listening to Ken Poyton's tape whilst recovering from last night's three—hour international folkdance session at the Mill, well, wouldn't you?

On another happy note, it was well worth the 100-mile journey to Cardiff last month to see Newport International Folkdance Group perform in the bi-annual Festival of Movement & Dance at the National Sports Centre. It's a pity their allotted time was so short. They deserved longer.

Happy dancing, everyone, and do come and share our lovely countryside.

RECORD REVIEW

I have just acquired an intriguing folk song record and I want to share my enjoyment of it.

On "Pick of the Week" I heard an unusual and haunting Sulgarian Love Chant and fell for it — and chased up the origin so that I could include it in my next Lunch—hour Concert at Bromley Library. I received a beautifully presented 12" record containing thirteen items of mysterious—sounding, almost bewitching, songs in Bulgarian, all by women, including that Love Chant. If you like the East European sound, you'll love this record. Curious (to us) harmonies and apparent dis—harmonies, deep drone voices, shrill slurs rising, alternately harsh and subtle, almost uncountable rhythms. Voices mostly unaccompanied; some items have an orchestra, and one has a tapan and spoons! The sleeve note says, "Bulgarian song bears the scars of an extremely difficult evolution...". — "its expressive magnificence to be enjoyed with eyelids closed". I agree.

Two minor criticisms; there is little variety among the items chosen; and English ears may prefer to cut the top register on most items. The Love Chant is the easiest to listen to but Bulgarian aficionados will enjoy all of it. The title of the record is "Le Mystère Des Voix Bulgares" and it is obtainable, price £6, from 4AD Records", 17-19 Albany Street, London S.W.18. (Please mention S.I.F.D. if you write to them).
