# SECRETARY'S NOTES

We must pay tribute to all the continuing hard work of the many volunteers who beaver away behind the scenes on behalf of the Society, particularly this month to Alan Morton and his team of helpers, M.C.s, musicians and teachers who made Eastbourne memorable; and to Kelsey Blundell and the Badge Sub-Committee for their far-sightedness and organization. As the Forward Planning Sub-Committee's Report recommended, the best way forward is to follow movements which come from members.

The Committee continued its deliberations on the Greater London Arts submission for grants, and I am grateful for the information I have received so far from various members on individual and group activities in the community. More evidence, however, would be most welcome.

# 12TH EASTBOURNE FESTIVAL 1987

This year the Eastbourne Festival Committee invited Karin Bellaart (a Dutch teacher of international dances), a Dutch team and a Turkish team, as well as the S.I.F.D. to take part in the 12th Eastbourne Festival. The S.I.F.D. presented seven events at the Festival this year, and they were:

A Friday evening International Get—Together Estonian specialist workshops on Saturday, Sunday and Monday Musicians' international workshops on Saturday and Sunday Saturday evening Costume Dance with Dunav and M.C. Alf Garton A stand at the Wintergarden Craft Fair

A show at the Wintergarden Theatre

A Sunday evening International Dance preceded by the Musicians' Band

The Friday and Sunday evening dances were run by Roy Le Croissette. On Friday evening a number of teachers were invited to present their own impromptu dances, adding variety. The Turkish team in full costume performed some of their repertoire and invited everyone to join in and learn some Turkish dances. On Sunday evening more variety was added by Tina Meech's Musicians playing for the first part of the evening, followed by Alan Cant and Roy alternating as M.C. For the rest of the evening, music was provided by players from the S.I.F.D. Band comprising Alan Humberstone, piano, Phil Steventon, clarinet, and Tina Meech, accordion.

Juhani Eistrat, accompanied by Tiina Metsma on the piano presented most successful Estonian folkdance workshops with some old favourites and some new (to me) dances that were thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. Piano accompaniment added so much more friendliness and enjoyment.

Tina Meech's international musicians' workshops resulted in a band comprising newcomers and experienced members entertaining the Sunday evening dance as well as creating a true 'folk' atmosphere. Further, Tina produced a book of ten Society Circle Dances which, judging by the number sold, was very successful. The Saturday evening Costume Dance with Alf Garton from Selpar and the Dunav Group surpassed all expectations. There were rich and exhilarating Balkan melodies sung by Dunav guest singers, a visit from the Dutch team who performed a lively dance, and the Turkish team, on this occasion in plain clothes, came to listen to the Balkan songs and join in the dancing. At one time the hall was full to capacity with everyone dancing. Alf introduced some easier but musically appealing South Eastern European dances that most people could attempt and have fun trying, balanced by a few more advanced ones for the more experienced. He included also Juhani's extremely popular dance which Juhani taught that morning, Kassari — a lively circle—pattern dance for six couples with synchronised clapping and there is no time for dreaming!

Karin Bellaart taught Armenian, Dutch, Turkish, Greek and Romanian dances. These were well liked by everyone. Julie Korth presented a first-class show which was well applauded by a full house at the Wintergarden Theatre. The S.I.F.D. Stand was well organized by Kay Leighton and we made a profit.

She also sang, in a very strong voice and style, Portuguese songs to accompany the dances and translated the words for us and explained the meaning of the songs.

Lucile finished by emphasizing the importance of keeping alive a country's traditional dances — a cause to which she has already devoted a good part of her life and which she continues to do.

# NEW PUBLICATIONS

"The Massif Central" is the title of a Tune Book just issued by Traditional Music Publications. It consists of 125 tunes collected and written out by Mel Stevens, leader of Rosbif, all taken from that part of France known as the Massif Central. Just the tune on a treble stave of two or three lines each, occasionally four, and grouped under headings: Scottishes, Bourrées, Valses, Mazurkas, Polkas, and a few oddments. All very clear, all concise.

The book contains music for many of the French dances done in S.I.F.D. circles, such as Bourrée de la Chapelotte, Bourrée Valse d'Issoudun, Bourrée Tournante (several), Bourrée Carrée, Bourrée Droite du Pays Fort, Polka Piquée (several), and Cochinchine (Crested Hen) and others. But not included are some dances that we like, such as Deux Deux, Bourrée Pastourelle, Bourrée à Six; perhaps they don't originate from that district, or maybe they will be included in the next volume which has already been prepared — and a third is contemplated.

# BULDVA COSSACK ENSEMBLE

I had seen Canadian-Ukrainian Ensembles before, and so went rather out of a sense of duty to this show on 4th May in the Queen Elizabeth Hall, especially as I was rather put off by their claim that they "blend Ukrainian and Canadian style". But I was proved gloriously wrong. These eight dancers and three musicians carried a 2-hour show with marvellous authentic Ukrainian dancing and singing, and playing of folk instruments, while the Canadian part consisted of several comic dances. Their dances are beautifully choreographed to show their fantastic skills - and before some "outand-out folksie" says it is all too stagey and artificial, may I stress that in the U.S.S.R. dancing is much more widespread than here. All schools, universities, kolchoses, and factories have their song and dance groups; no worries about sliding membership - the Piatnitzky Ensemble for instance has a waiting list of 300! Even the armed forces have their dance groups and choirs, and a dancer of the Red Army Ensemble once asked me whether the British Army have a similar ensemble! In all these groups and ensembles the men try to outdance each other, each with his own "trick". So these marvellous dancers only show the highest perfection of what the boys in the villages and other dance groups do all the time. They could join the Ukrainian State Dance Company, and I cannot think of higher praise. The programme too was very well produced, with beautiful photographs and interesting information.

It was sad not to see any S.I.F.D. member in the packed audience. I understand there were S.I.F.D. activities going on elsewhere on that day, but I do hope many members will see them in the other places they visit.

# TALLY HO!

We all made our way to Taplow, near Maidenhead, to give colour and excitement to a big one-day Horse Show. Proceedings took place in fields adjacent to Taplow Lake (which stretch of water was currently in the news as the scene of a murder!).

Our opening dance was Neapolitan Tarantella, and once through that was enough to exhaust us all on that surface, let alone a second time. But we kept on gamely through the programme, even giving them Jota Tapatia. We  $\underline{\text{did}}$  have some nice remarks made to us afterwards, and perhaps we felt a little smug as we noticed that the American Forces Fancy Marching Team which followed us in the programme had to give up after a very few minutes.

Many thanks to all from the Central London Class and from Merton, and to Wilf Horrocks, for giving up their Sunday afternoon. Your co-operation is very much appreciated.

### CATALAN DAY COURSE

Those of you who were at the S.I.F.D. Catalan Day Course at St. Paul's Centre in April and who purchased typed notes of the dances, are reminded of the following corrections or additions to the notes which were announced at the time but which you may not have had time to write down. Your notes should be amended as follows:-

# La Bolangera

First Verse. When the first lady makes a circle on her own in the centre, she should travel clockwise, forming "loops" rather than "figures of 8".

Second Verse. (1st & 5th ladies) and Third Verse (1st, 3rd, 5th & 7th ladies) dance clockwise around each other, giving right shoulders (a sort of Righthand Star without giving hands).

It has been argued that it would be easier if these odd-numbered ladies were to dance counter-clockwise (i.e. left shoulders to centre, forming a figure of 8,) as they would travel less distance to meet their partners, and I understand that some groups will be trying it that way!

Final Chorus: Serdana (circle). <u>Delete</u> this instruction. The dance ends with the third verse. Each couple arms right into their place, and finishes by giving hands in a circle to raise and lower arms, in the usual way, in acknowledgement and thanks to the other dancers.

# Danca de Vilanova y Geltru

Music A Play 4 times.

Music B Corranda (Gallop) Ladies start to skip on outside foot, men on right foot (i.e. the same as first lady who is on his right).

# Espanyolet

Music B Bar 1. Beat 1. Step on left foot
Beats 2 & 3. Bring right foot round behind left foot.

Bar 2. Beat 1. Transfer weight on to right foot and bow, bending right knee and keeping left knee straight.

Beats 2 & 3. Hold for 2 beats.

# Ball del Ram

Second Part. Men leave the open circle with a slow stately <u>walk</u>, <u>not</u> a balance step.

Ladies dance as described but <u>always</u> in a counter-clockwise direction.

They must keep their steps small and cover the minimum of ground.

# Contrapas de Xinxina

Sequence: First man dances

First couple dances

First, second and third couples dance

First three couples plus four more couples dance First seven couples plus five more couples dance

and so on, if you are lucky enough to have so many dancers!

# Contrapas de San Genis

Final note: There is music provided for the Sardana at the end, so it is not necessary after all to use the Sardana from La Bolangera.
