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TO COMPETE OR NOT?

One of the features which distinguishes the International Folk Festival of the mountainous regions of Zakopane (Poland) from other international festivals is its competitive nature. The teams coming to Zakopane are judged by an international jury, who take into consideration the different parts of each programme, and awards are made in the form of ice—axes (the symbol of the region) of gold, silver or bronze, or "Autumn leaves of the Tatras" if one wishes to praise a part of the programme.

The aim of this form of competition is clear. It is to develop all that is sound and good in the programmes of the teams, and to point out the mistakes which they must avoid in the future. In this way, the folklore is protected against wrong changes, and the public is able to judge the true standards of folklore, while avoiding the presentation of spectacles which have nothing to do with authentic traditions.

All the same, there are always many discussions, in spite of the matter seeming simple enough. Certain people with hypersensitivity are sorry for groups taking part in the competition, and ask, "Why have a competition? It only spoils the atmosphere of the Festival; it generates an unhealthy rivalry, and discourages those who do not obtain the approbation of the judges". One must nevertheless remember that whenever one wishes to get the best results, one uses competition. One meets it at school, on the sports field, and above all in all areas of art — for example, music, theatre, film, etc. Why then should folklore be the exception?.

The form of the competition is not a disagreeable surprise for the teams. On the contrary, they know the rules of the festival, and they freely submit themselves to adjudication. Moreover, there are teams who like to compete and thus obtain an appraisal by specialists. There are certainly those who are dissatisfied. They are those advisors and artistic directors of groups who do not know the true value of folklore, and present programmes of their own compositions, or of parts borrowed from others. As for the teams — they value to an extraordinary degree the festival prizes obtained at Zakopane, which among all other festivals puts them at the top of the league of folklore groups.

There are others who criticise the very large number, according to them, of the prizes awarded. The truth is: for the twenty teams, which in theory participate in the festival, there are 12 ice—axes, and unlimited Autumn Leaves. This seems fair, as it has the result that, at the end of the competition, there should not be any hurt feelings, because the judges can evaluate each team conscientiously, and can make an award corresponding to the worth of each performance. During previous years of the festival there was only a single prize (a gold ice—axe) for each of the three cate—gories which existed at that time. So there were many times when there were injustices, when there were two teams of the same standard and one could only make one award.

Sometimes, we are asked this question: "How can the judges compare things so different as the folklore of the Balkans and that of Scandinavia?". This is an extremely naive question. It is not the folklore which is appraised, but the manner of its stage presentation, which is not a difficult task for the experts. The members of the jury are specialists in various fields and they know how to recognise the team which understands best how to present the folklore of its own region, how to demonstrate its own customs, music, dance and costumes, and also knows how best to stage it all.

The judges are not interested in the fact that team X are more splendidly dressed and more colourful compared with team Y. What counts is the choice of costumes in the whole presentation and, above all, fidelity in relation to traditional costume. In the same way, one compares the composition of the instrumental ensembles, choice of repertoire, standard of the presentation of the dances, etc. By using this procedure, one can compare the various folklore groups who are different from each other. Division into categories is a great help. Each team is judged with others in one of four categories: 1) Authentic groups, 2) Groups with artistic arrangements, 3) Stylised Groups, 4) Groups reproducing folklore scenes.

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Someone will perhaps ask, "If competition is so advantageous to folklore, for the public and for the teams who are forced to achieve higher stands, why do not other festivals introduce it?". The answer is simple. The majority of festivals have material profit as their goal — economics rule, and not the protection of folklore. In such a situation, any adjudication by the experts would, to say the least, be undesirable and unsuitable.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Lily,

Just a quick note about the Georgian Dance Company recently over here. Surprise, surprise, — it was the Georgian State Dance Company after all! — though only a "mini" one; three girls and twelve boys.

They performed some of the dances listed in the programme, but by no means all of them, though sometimes it was difficult to see which was which. "A Collection of Dances", for two of them, for instance, is confusing. Where does one dance end and the next begin? The dances, "Davluri", Kartuli" and "Khevsuri" were easily recognisable, but the three "Warrior Dances" interspersed with them, which is which? Not that it really matters; the 15 dancers were superb, as always, and the applause of the packed Camden Centre Hall was deservedly rapturous.

As a very welcome surprise, we got several spots of "The Tsitisperi Trio", internationally known as "The Three Georgians" — a truly wonderful singing group sometimes accompanied by one of them playing a guitar, or two of them with the "pandura", a Caucasian stringed instrument (not to be confused with the Ukrainian bandura). I must confess that up to now all Georgian singing had struck me as rather morose, even the supposedly funny songs, but these three singers are a joy to anyone who loves truly beautiful singing.

FOLKDANCE TRIP TO ALBANIA

As promised last month, we give below further details of the folkdance trip to Albania.

The course will run from 17th March to 1st April 1989, and the maximum number of British participants will be 10 (to join up with a group from Germany). Deadline for application, with full payment, is 1st February 1989.

The cost will be £155 for the air fare (London/Belgrade/Titograd/Belgrade/London) plus DM1600 for the rest of the trip — which includes visa, bus transfers, full board (double room), excursions, entrance fees (except for performances), Albanian tour guide, Albanian dance teacher and musician, insurance for health and luggage (from Titograd). Hotels will be category 'A' where possible, but some will be 'B' class. Rooms will be double but single rooms can be requested at checking—in at hotels and payment for a single room is made at checking—out. If less than a total of 20 persons on the tour, there will be an extra DM120 added.

The group will leave London on 17th March to fly to Titograd (via Belgrade where they will join up with the group from Germany), then proceed over the Albanian border. Overnight stops during the tour, in Albania, will be at Shkodra, Durrës, Tirana, Korça, Berat, Lezha. In addition to some six hours per day of dancing, there will be visits to museums etc., talks on ethnography, sightseeing tours.

Visa application forms and further information on itinerary, and where to send the forms and the payment, available from the Editor (address on page 2). Application should be made as soon as possible, as the deadline for full payment is 1st February.
