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EASTBOURNE INTERNATIONAL FOLK FESTIVAL, 28th APRIL to 1st MAY 1989

Over 70 events between 7 p.m. on Friday, 28th April, and 5 p.m. on Monday, 1st May can't be bad! There are more venues and more leaders this year, and there are song concerts and dances in the town.

We have some new faces for you and some new ideas. We've invited a Holistic Circle dance group to come along and help you relax. Look out for notices at the Festival; it was not possible to include them in the printed programme. Another newcomer is Glad Thorpe, who will be helping those who have only the slightest knowledge, or none at all, of music. She revels in impromptu sessions and is great fun. Elsche Korf-Schroder is making her first appearance as a teacher, covering dances from Sweden, Holland, Norway, Germany and Poland; and Roberto Haddon is leading a Balkan session on the Saturday and also the Balkan Party on the Monday. The Rangers Band, already wellknown at the Festival, is appearing in a new guise when the band accompanies Jill Bransby on Saturday night. To all those, we extend a specially warm welcome.

The old favourites are here too. Tina Meech with her musicians' workshops; Judy Ingram, teaching Israeli, is back by popular request; and Roy le Croissette with his welcome to the weekend — an International Barn Dance on the Friday at 8 p.m. with two very wellknown local musicians, Chris and Don.

All in all, we think you will enjoy the weekend, which also includes the even more extensive range of English, Scottish, Welsh, Irish, Clog, Rapper and Band. We're anxious to introduce a more informal atmosphere this year, so please come along prepared to make music or dance wherever you may be. Would you also bring costumes and CLUB BANNERS for the Saturday evening dance. The main venue is the same as last year — The Bishop Bell School, Priory Road, Eastbourne — and the easiest route from London is to come down the A22 and turn left at Polegate (A27) as far as West Ham (signposted Eastbourne), and cross the railway line, turning left at a new roundabout on to Priory Road. 'Buses from Town Centre or the sea—front, or Seaside Road, to Priory Road, Langney.

Even if you can only come along for one day, or part, I am sure you will go away enriched by the Eastbourne Festival spirit.....it's quite a weekend.

This month's cover shows a dancer from Bali, Indonesia, in the costume of the REDJANG dance, and carrying a basket of offerings used in another dance, MENDET. It is drawn by Janet McCrickard, who has kindly written for us an article on "The Traditional Dances of Bali", in two parts.

THE TRADITIONAL DANCES OF BALI. Part I

Bali is the jewel among Indonesia's many thousands of islands; lying a little east of Java, in the Indian ocean, it retains a special and ancient kind of Hinduculture, unique in Indonesia's Islamic republic. Only ninety miles long and fifty miles wide, Bali probably contains more dancers and musicians per square mile than anywhere else in the world — its cultural life is astonishingly rich, and the whole island is enthusiastically involved in it. Yet in Bali there are no communal or social dances of the kind found in Eastern Europe. Likewise there is really no such thing as "secular" dance, because ultimately all dancing and music, even when ostensibly "secular" and performed for tourists, is essentially meant for the gods, and is accompanied by prayer and ceremonial. The seriousness of this intention (appreciated even by the tiny child-dancers for which Bali is famed) ensures an extremely high standard in all dance and music.

One cannot begin to understand Balinese dance unless one first realises that Bali is still a traditional society, one in which there is no division of the world into "sacred" and "secular". The arts, religion and everyday life are one whole; it is not even true to say that they are "integrated" — it is simply that, for the Balinese, life itself is a ritual; the very order of the cosmos depends on the devotion and care with which they carry this ritual out. Bali is an island of startling contrasts and paradoxes, upsetting all one's preconceived ideas about life, art, society and "folklore".

Everyone in the Balinese community, from the greatest to the least, expects in some way to be an artist, whether in the making of temple offerings, wood-carving, weaving, painting, playing in the GAMELAN (the percussion orchestra) or some other creative way. The raison d'etre of all this is religious, and its richness is seen in the sheer extravagance of the very frequent feasts, festivals and rituals, the complex round of which fills the calendar and which the Balinese believe necessary for the preservation of the cosmic order. Everything is made as beautiful as possible. It is true to say that in Bali everyone dances, with or without special training. Some dances are learned by imitation, or just "absorbed" from childhood - these include processional dances of offering in the temple itself. Others require a rigorous and special discipline, similar to that needed for Indian temple dance. Most of these are performed outside the temple, before the gateway. Everything is done in the open—air, as the temple is just a courtyard containing shrines and small pavilions.

Even out of costume, Balinese dance is instantly recognisable, and quite distinct from the other dances of the east, although it has basics in common with other South Asian traditions, particularly Malay — the flexed knees, the turned—back fingers, the expressive gestures. Passages of fast, angular movement are interrupted by intense and statuesque poses; darting of eyes and neck and flickering of fingers are often used to accent the complex, syncopated rhythms of the GAMELAN. Like the music itself, the Balinese dancer is usually a bundle of nervous energy. Each gesture and movement is defined by tradition and, while most have names (relating to animal movement such as that of birds, monkeys, elephants, etc.) the hand—movements do not spell out a narrative — do not "tell a story", as Westerners often imagine. Some gestures are forms of mime, some have a symbolic meaning, but most are pure movement, beautifying the dance.

The Baliness are peasant farmers, leading a communalistic lifestyle in which mutual help is the rule in everything from irrigation to housebuilding, and where democratic procedures govern every aspect of village life, particularly the arts, which take up a lot of village time. The orchestra, the dance costumes and so forth are owned in common, and villages compete to have the most splendid and skilled dancers, the most accomplished musicians. The traditional democratic arrangement of Baliness village society is one of the things that keeps music and dance vitally alive:

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they are both truly "of the folk", and when members of the Balinese noble families (who are still the great patrons of the arts) play in the GAMELAN and dance the dances, they do so as equals with the common villagers, their claim to honour in these areas lying in their artistic skill, and not their rank.

Bali in prehistoric days was animist, as indeed some of the Indonesian islands still are, and as indeed one layer of Balinese culture still is. It was to Bali that the Hindu courts of fifteenth century Java fled before the onrush of Islam, taking with them a rich culture of music and dance which was preserved on Bali until the days of Dutch rule. While the courts failed and decayed, the peasant Balinese completely took over the music and dance, incorporating it into their own traditions, and giving the Balinese arts that hybrid vigour which they still enjoy. To this day the Balinese have a genius for borrowing from invaders those elements which enhance and can be combined with their own artistic traditions — the fabulous layer—cake which is Bali contains not only animism and Hinduism but also Buddhist, Malay, Chinese and other elements and, some scholars believe, even African ones. Unlike many traditional cultures, which have died because they could not change, that of the Balinese has survived, thanks to its exuberant, eclectic religious temperament, which both conserves and adds. Whether that process is now, in the folkloristic "dark age" of the twentieth century, at an end, remains to be seen.

It was with great pleasure that I listened to the varied programme on the above cassette by The Essential Dance Band. This small group of musicians have produced a good sound with an excellent rhythm. I liked the energetic feeling of the four dances in the Romanian suite, very lively, with a quieter one in the middle to enable you to catch your breath. One of the best things about this cassette is the steady tempo, absolutely the right speed for dancing to, though one would need some stamina to dance the full eight minutes of Tsamikos. I'm not sure that I like the flute used for the Greek — it doesn't evoke for me quite the right atmosphere, and also I would like to have heard a good, solid, tapan beat for Osogovka. However, these are purely personal feelings which you may not agree with when you sit down to listen to — or rather get up and dance to — your own copy.

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SHORT COURSE IN INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCE, AUGUST 1989

The Cleveland Education Committee is planning the twenty-first residential course in International Folk Dance, at Billingham, Cleveland, from 12th to 19th August 1989, in association with the Billingham International Folklore Festival. The course is intended for organizers, specialist teachers and others interested in international folkdance. It is a practical course, and each group taking part in the Folklore Festival visits the course to teach one or two national dances to the course members. It is essential that course members are able to master dance phrases quickly, so as not to hold up the visiting groups' programmes of tuition.

Ten groups will take part in the Festival, and this course is a unique opportunity to work with the visitors and record the music they use for their dances. Since the early 1970s there has been a continuous revival in the interest of folk music and dance in Hungary.
