COLWYN BAY INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL

This month's cover shows the BARIS, or Warrior's Dance, from the island of Bali, Indonesia. It is drawn by Janet McCrickard, who has kindly written for us an article on "The Traditional Dances of Bali", in two parts. We printed Part 1 last month.

THE TRADITIONAL DANCES OF BALL. Part II

The dance-tradition of Bali is very diverse, and in an article of this scope one can only give a brief sketch, so I have concentrated on the dances which a visitor to the island is most likely to see. These are chiefly dances as done in the South of Bali. In the North, the style and traditions are different; the movement more vigorous, and the mood more extravagant.

Most tourists get to see a performance of LEGONG, in which three little girls, sometimes as young as seven years, and who have been superbly trained, dance a story — usually that of the King of Lasem and his fateful abduction of a princess. This dance is properly called LEGONG KRATON ("palace Legong"), while LEGONG means simply "dance", or women's dance in particular. Chosen at first for their beauty, a number of village girls are given a rigorous schooling in the complex movements and rhythms of the dance. Since they have seen Legong regularly from their sarliest years, they have already absorbed the idea of the movements and know pretty well what is required of them. The very best will go on to perform for the gods, retiring at first menstruation. (Nowadays "ratired" legongs dance for tourists at the hotel "folklore evenings").

Legong style is exquisite and birdlike, with quick, fluttering, angular movements, darting accents and tremblings of fingers, shoulders and knees, and the flashing glances and staring eyes which recell the far-off Indian origins of the Balinese dance style. (All the other feminine dances, except certain temple-dances, are more or less similar to Legong style). The little dancers are bound into yards of cloth-of-gold, and wear fantastic gilded leather helmets filled with frangipani, tjempaka and hibiscus flowers. Accessories in the dance include gilded fans, with which much brilliant play is made, bows-and-arrows, and gilded leather wings. Legong dancers appear like dainty jewelled dolls, and proceed to dance an involved, arduous, sometimes hour-long choreography with amazing virtuosity and great seriousness. To be a Legong is a high honour for which the little girls work hard and with great enthusiasm.

Other women's dances include the dream-like processional REDJANG, a temple-dance in which the dancers are linked by long stoles; this is an offering-dance, of great serenity and enchantment; closely allied to it is MENDET, in which elaborate baskets of offerings are carried. PENDET is a dance often done for tourists, in whose honour flowers are strewn (originally, in honour of those who come to worship). If you witness temple festivals you will see women getting up to dance solo; this is OLEG, another offering-dance, which can be done by any woman, and in which the dancer's own body is the offering to the gods in pure dance. Young girls are the vehicles in the SANGHYANG trance-dances, in which goddesses are invited to enter and dance in their bodies, usually for exorcistic reasons such as epidemic in the villages. (This is basically Legong, remembered and done in an unconscious state). DJOGED is Bali's only really "social" dance; it is a dance of imitation and flirtation, in which one or more girls invite men to dance with them. (You may find yourself caught up in this as it is done for fun at hotel dance performances!).

The principal masculine dance is BARIS, which means "a row", as of men in military drill, and indeed that is what it is, the dance of warriors. In its numerous ritual varieties, lines of men approach the shrine in slow, stately, hesitant movements, dedicating their weapons or offerings. Sole BARIS is, in complete contrast, a spectacular, dramatic display, a vivid expression of the warrior's tumultuous and varying moods as he prepares himself for battle. With fingers quivering and eyes starting out of his head, the dancer stamps, preens and whirls about in his resplendent costume of multi-coloured stoles, advancing and retreating, intimidating his invisible enemy and then as suddenly being overcome by waves of doubt or fear. At its best, Baris is a dance of great virtuosity, combining athletic ability with the actor's skill. (It is still considered by the Balinese nobleman to be a matter

of princely duty to dance Baris well). Baris costume, with its leggings, and helmet all-a-shimmer with leaves of mother-of-pearl stuck on wires, is derived from military dress.

Other male dances include KEBYAR, a seated dance in which a man explores both masculine and feminine dance—expressions; PENTJAK, or Balinese unarmed combat, which resembles Kung—Fu and is used by men as an everyday exercise as well as a dance to music, and TOPENG, a dance—mime where the solo dancer uses different masks to excress various traditional temperaments, a kind of Balinese version of Shakespeare's "ages of man".

Tourists in Bali are always treated to a performance of KETJAK, the so-called "Monkey Dance". Before the temple gateway, or on the moonlit sea-shore, by the flickering light of coconut lamps, concentric circles of men chant an eerie and thrilling chorus, with swaying bodies and vigorous arm-movements like those of a Polynesian group-dance. Ketjak can include up to one hundred and fifty men in its dance-choir, and their chant is a fully-orchestrated, highly-disciplined version of the gamelan's vivid rhythms. It looks, feels and is primitive, coming from Bali's animistic past, but in the form shown to tourists it is only half—a—century old. The artist and musicien Walter Spies, who lived in Bali before the second world war and who was an expert on all things Baliness, encouraged the villagers to develop the very archaic dance-choir which accompanied the SANGHYANG trance-dances, and virtually to choreograph it into a new form of dance-drama. The first "modern" Ketjak appeared on a German film about Bali, "The Isle of Demons", in the 1930s. Nowadays dancers in the centre of the circle perform a version of the Ramayana story (drawn from yet enother old dance-form, WAYANG UGNG) and at one point the singers "become" the god Hanuman's monkey army. Ketjak illustrates how effectively the Balinese can incorporate new creative ideas, and also how the old intentions lie just beneath the skin, for the dance is still performed as a religious ritual, and the singers can still fall into trance, believing that the spirits of Hanuman's mankey hards have entered their bodies.

Bali is gradually being transformed into a "modern" island. Yet the festivals, the rituals, the music and dance are still intensely alive, flourishing alongside the paraphernalia of twentieth—century life.

P.I.F.D. enjoyed its first informal dance party just before Christmas, with everyone bringing plenty of food and drink. The members also brought their families and friends, and as a result we have some new members. The two groups put on a concert in Fishguard and P.I.F.D. members made up a large part of the audience. Krakis presented their dances, together with songs and music, as a midsummer wedding story. Very, very good. I was delighted to see in their programme Vava Vadmal, Oxdans and Fyrmannedans, and regarding the latter learned a lot about style and sequence order, but especially the style, and have worked hard to improve our presentation of this dance with P.I.F.D. This coming May I hope to meet up with a German Folkdance Group when, with the Glan Cleddau, I shall be going to Germany where we have been invited to take part in the twinning ceremonies between Oberkirch and Haverfordwest.
