## A RESIDENTIAL WEEKEND OF INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCING

Members and friends of the S.I.F.D. are invited to book now for a weekend at the Walford College of Agriculture, Baschurch, near Shrewsbury, from Friday, 8th September, to Sunday, 10th September 1989. Folk dancing from various countries will be taught, practised and enjoyed by an expected forty enthusiasts of international dancing. The West Midlands Branch of S.I.F.D. have had residential weekends every two years since 1982 but this is their first visit to Shropshire. Bookings are now open and it is hoped that this will be an opportunity for members everywhere to meet those of the West Midlands.

There will be dance workshops led by Janet Woolbar covering various countries. These will include new dances as well as forgotten favourites. It is also planned to have plenty of time for general folkdancing so that popular dances can be shared and enjoyed. For musicians there will be a practice workshop where any instrumental skills can be explored.

The College is set in attractive countryside and a walk/ramble is planned for those wishing for a change of exercise. All meals will be provided and those needing special diets should indicate when booking. Accommodation is mostly in single rooms. Each guest, however, should bring towels and washing accountrements. The overall cost is £35 per person and on booking a £5 deposit is required. An "interpayment" of £15 will be required, and final payment by 1st July. This early payment is necessary as we shall be out of regular contact during July/August so final arrangements for September need to be made by early summer.

The programme and meal times will be sent to those booking as soon as these are finalised with the College. Also the name of the guest teacher as soon as this is confirmed. Instructions as to travel and access also will be sent early to those booking a place. 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# LOST TREASURE?

When I was preparing the "international" part of the programme for the Merry Andrew evening at Y.W.C.A. in April, I looked through my index of dances for which I have recorded music, and was shocked to see the enormous number of dances we have learned and never do now. The index holds about 1,000 items, about half of which I have been taught. A vast store of dances seems to have been totally lost to us. A Balkan tape which used to be a favourite is now ignored completely; the work of Jacob & Judith Barkan who dedicated themselves to giving us Israeli dances and tapes (free!) is hardly remembered. The Mexican, the Catalan, the Irish......

We have paid thousands of pounds to bring to Britain several people of the status of Magda Ossko, yet hardly a dance is remembered. Why did we spend all this time and money acquiring these dances if we immediately forget them? What is this feverish drive to gather up more and yet more new dances? Will they too all be forgotten? I find these newer dances far less exciting, more repetitious, than many older ones. What is the reason for the prejudice against "set" dances and couple dances? Are people nowadays afraid to touch each other? The ratio male/female is more even than it used to be, which should improve matters.

When did we last do Al Tira, El Ginatagoz, El Candil, Pajdushka, Sadi Momo, Kolomajka, Hulan, Kontrasajre, Keddelflikkatur, Yorkshire Square, Posties Jig, Tuljak, Partalos, Matamarikos, Hasapiko, Maricare, Makil Tiki, Offa's Dyke, various Czardas, Verbunks and Sardanas, Baroigez Tanz, Kaly Raglayim, Debka Rafiach, Debka Gilboa, Dinga, Kubilas, Evangelina, La Marrietta, Povolniak, Padeirinha, Senhor de la Serra, Ca La Balta, Petronella, La Rondon – and that is a minute selection which I remember learning.

Do we have too many Day Courses? Should some of the Day Courses be revivalist?

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Dear Lily,

I am prompted to write by the remark in Jacky Green's letter in the April SIFD NEWS about the "ever dulling programme" of dance events. I should like to put the question back by saying — when was it brighter, or what made it brighter? This is valid in the sense that if the younger members of the S.I.F.D. want a different programme to that currently available, then organizers need to know what it is they want.

However, the answers may not be easy; a good first principle is that events should be financially viable; this brings disciplines into action. For "one-off" rather than regular club events, teacher and nationality, M.C., musicians, venue, publicity, price, date and co-ordination for a start.

A related question is, what makes an event dull or boring? Age is relevant to this, and perhaps Jacky's remark! Dancers of my vintage tend to be aware of physical limitations that those in their teens and twenties do not possess. Another thing is the discovery of an activity, so I wonder if Jacky is looking back to the time when she was younger and first experienced the joy of dancing "International" and that perhaps today her taste and demands are more sophisticated or specialised? My interest led me a few years ago to ask one noted member, "What makes a boring dance?" and the reply, "Any dance I've learnt" does help illustrate the problem. I also recall at the end of one weekend being told by some that the programme included too much couple dancing and by others that there was too much line and circle dancing! I only hope that all went home having enjoyed themselves!

How does one cater with a <u>limited</u> clientele for those who want dancing within the genuine folk tradition, those who want exciting music and dence as they experience it, which may be different from that of others, and those who want a repertoire different today from yesterday and who are perhaps not over-concerned about authenticity? My observation is that perhaps there has never been more on offer in terms of day courses, specialist events, and groups within the International dance scene than there is today, so I invite Jacky and other younger members to write telling us of their experience, views and wishes.

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# THE SONG AND DANCE ENSEMBLE OF THE BLACK SEA FLEET, HERE KNOWN AS THE RED NAVY

As announced in the March issue of SIFD NEWS, the Red Navy are currently appearing at various towns in the U.K. Jenia Graman has written the following account of their performance in London, and has drawn this month's cover showing various costumes of the U.S.S.R.

This was a very welcome visit after a twenty-year break, thoroughly enjoyed by an enthusiastic audience. What a pity we could only see them in London on two days, and week-days at that (28th & 29th March). Fortunately, they will be back in the London area on the 11th, 12th and 13th May, at Wembley. So I urge enyone who wants a very varied and enjoyable show to go to see and hear them. But, as the programme was printed quite some time before they came, you may perhaps be a bit puzzled by some of the changes made, and as I always feel that the more you know what is going on, the more you enjoy it, here are a few explanations.

First, you may expect to hear the name of their home port, and in fact they do sing and talk about it, but of course pronounce it in the Russian way, SevasTOpol, whereas here it is known as SebAStopol. Secondly, "Varyag" is the name of the legendary battleship of this name which, rather than surrender in the Russo-Japanese War of 1905, blew itself up. This explains the music and acting, first heroic then mournful, then heroic again. No dancing in this item of course. And then, "Apple Dance"; no apples in this — it is the wellknown song, "Where are you rolling, little apple?", which the Navy have made their Theme Song.

Apart from that, there are a lot of Sailors' Songs, choirs and solos, Sailors' Dances, Russian and Ukrainian Dances (Sevastopol being on the Black Sea, the Southern border of the Ukraine). Some of them are rich in comedy with, of course, the acrobatic feats we expect of any ensemble from the U.S.S.R. The girls wear colcurful Russian and Ukrainian costumes, and are not only graceful dancers, but also take part in the comedy numbers, as for instance in the enchanting "Three Love Birds". Folk dancers will especially love the "Russian Song Ensemble" - three men and six women who wear authentic Central Russian costumes and sing unaccompanied, sometimes breaking into clearly improvised dancing. In between, there are two guest artistes, stars of the Kiev Opera, who sing folksongs and operatic arias. What impressed me most was the obvious enjoyment of all dancers - so sadly missing sometimes in other dance performances. The show finished with a standing ovation from a delighted audience.
