NOTES FROM KAY LEIGHTON

Victoria Embankment Gardens

The new stage is now well under way, though by no means finished at the time of writing (middle of June). A red-tiled roof has been put in place, on top of which is a curious structure of green metal piping, rather like an enormous roof-rack on a car. We were told that it was to support an awning. We were extremely pleased to see that the half-finished apron stage will be sprung, rather than a block of concrete which at one time we feared that the non-dancing architects would supply. Fortunately, the more sensitive Gardens Staff were going to insist on consulting a London ballet school about the stage. The opening date is now September.

Barbican Demonstrations - May Bank Holiday

These went off very well, and the S.I.F.D. provided colourful and interesting displays on the Sunday and Monday. Leslie Haddon led the Balaton team on Sunday, when they performed a Wedding Dance, a dance for men only (not a Verbunk), a version of the girls' Bottle Dance, and finally a lively Czardas. The dances were much enjoyed by the audience, who applauded enthusiastically. Thank you, Balaton, for providing this item for the S.I.F.D.

On the Monday, the Central London Evening Institute's Wednesday class, taught by Janet Woolbar, performed a suite of Swedish dances — Vøstgøta, Dal Dans, Uchsdans and Ränningen. Uchsdans was danced by Tony Latham and Peter Cobb, and both children and adults roared with laughter at their antics. These Swedish dances were also well received by the large audience — thank you to all members of the team, and particularly to Janet for all her hard work preparing for this event.

Apart from the S.I.F.D., there were many interesting performances during the two days, including London Folk, Dolmetsch Historical Dance Society, and a never-to-be-forgotten item by the Penge Latin-American Dancers of "Come Dancing" fame, complete with Peggy Spencer announcing; glittering costumes, sparkling dancing and scintillating music!

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.....

Dear Lily,

I should like to comment on Will Green's letter in the May edition of SIFD NEWS — even though I am now a month late in doing so!

Like Will, I have a large collection of dances on tape which I have been taught but which I never use for one or more of three reasons. Some of them are quite difficult and either I am not confident enough to teach them, or I consider them unsuitable for my class which has an extremely wide range of experience. Others are easy to the point of boredom; "this week's weedy dance" gets short shrift from the class! Many of these are dances which I enjoyed at the Summer School but without the personality of the teacher now seem totally uninspiring. The third group of "dead" dances is made up of those for which I have music but inadequate or no notes. However, like Will, I should welcome revivalist courses — before I throw out my unusable tapes and notes.

Couples and sets versus circles and lines is an argument set to run and run. No, people aren't afraid to touch each other (you touch two in a circle!). The balance between male and female may have improved, but not universally and not in my class; the most men we have ever had is four, and then we consider ourselves lucky! Set dances create particular problems unless you have exact multiples of eight; otherwise the hall is adormed with anything up to seven bored wallflowers. Circle dances also cater better than partners or sets for variation in competence. In a circle, anyone who wishes may dance, whether they have been "asked to dance" or not, and drop out if it proves too difficult. Most important, in circles you dance with everyone rather than with one person, making it a much more social activity.

However, in the end it comes down to personal taste, and it is good to have variety in the programme.

I should like to take up Roy Clarke's offer to explain my views and wishes. As he appeared to miss the point in my last letter, I hope offence will not be taken if I am blunt. Personally, I found the tone of his letter a little patronising.

First, I should like to address the need to be financially viable. I have been involved in the organization of several dance clubs and events, the most notable of which was the 1986 intervarsity folk dance festival which was enjoyed by about 600 young people. From these experiences, it has become clear to me that viability depends on popularity. If an event becomes popular, it will be financially viable; if not, then there is justification for cancellation, or re-assessing what is wanted.

I find the implication that traditional dances are slow and simple and that complex or fast dances are less authentic hard to swallow. Every country incorporates different styles of dancing. There will be both simple and complex, fast and slow, within its tradition. All of these are enjoyable to learn. There are also many enjoyable composed dances, some very simple, which should be perfectly acceptable as long as their origins are clarified.

In general, I find my "younger" friends are as concerned, if not more so, with origin and authenticity of dances as many of my older acquaintances. However, I find the apparent age distinction unhelpful and I hope I am not alienating those of slightly maturer years who share the same interests and frustrations as myself.

The only thing that makes a boring dance is overkill, i.e. when the same dance is done week after week. This is easily solved by dropping it from the weekly repertoire for a month or two. This is not to say I enjoy every dance; everyone has personal taste, but as long as there is variety available, most people will be happy.

We accept that our taste in dancing differs from that of the Committee, and we don't want them to organize events especially for us. What we want is encouragement for the events we organize. Why not put these events under the S.I.F.D. heading instead of treating them as competition? At present, the Committee would seem to be killing any enthusiasm that the people around me have for organizing. If this continues, what future does the Society have? I hope other young members will not be put off by the Society's apparent attitudes and will also voice their opinions.
