#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR....

Dear Lily,

The letter in last month's SIFD NEWS by one Nick Green gave me the cold shivers.

Fifty-five years ago - yes, well over half a century - the E.F.D.S. actually sponsored me, to the vast sum of £100 (roughly my fares) to go to the Balkans and spend three months collecting, tabulating and recording assorted folk dances. The idea was very practical. In 1935 we had in London the very first real International Folkdance Festival; and Cecil Sharp House wanted to see what sort of material was available. That was the first of many many visits to the Balkans, and I brought back on film and field-recordings, a mass of material. It was authentic, it was original, it was "real". Most of it was destroyed when my home went up in smoke during the war, during the bombing of Bristol, BUT by '36 I had started to teach a handful of men and women, who were mesmerised by the Horas, Kolos and Oras that I had played to them and the footwork I had demonstrated.

Now in 1989, I imagine the S.I.F.D. could at a pinch sponsor an occasional "collector" .... but the difference today is that there seem to be dozens of wierdoteachers, including the mass of Circle-Dance devotees who are doing the "propagation" (largely for cash!).

I have never had a "lesson" in my life, but I have had what I call supervisory inspection by the old experts (now dead) like the sisters Janković in Beograd and Raina Katzarova in Sofia. I learned like a peasant does - piecemeal, by observation, by endless endless ebservation. When I was running a Balkan class in Hortensia Road School (for the S.I.F.D.) in '59, we had a sudden surprise visit from a bunch of officials from the Jugoslav Embassy. At the moment of their visit we were actually dancing Paidushka. They stared at us in blank astonishment. One of them whispered quietly, in Serbian, to his neighbour, "Misha, tell me, who on earth ARE these people dancing exactly like Macedonians? Where do they come from?". The answer was, of course, the streets of London and the dear old S.I.F.D. So you can do it correctly if you try to, and if you're taught properly. I don't say it is easy, and I don't say you can do all the dances uniformly well. I shall never master the true Serbian slick, nimble foot movements. Have you ever tried to do Hopak like a real Russian?

But, it's this "recreational exercise" bit that can be guaranteed to kill all style dead in its tracks. Have a quick butcher's at the mess now known as Circle Dancing; it's about as Folk as a Tube Train, and just as inspiring.

Dear Lily,

I was most interested to read Nick and Helen Green's letters in the November NEWS. The use of Y.H.A. hostels as a venue for weekend courses is a welcome return to the roots of International Folk dancing in this country. Such places as Kemsing and Ivinghoe were well known to our early members and, of course, it does enable the less well—heeled to savour the delights of residential workshops.

Nick's example of the views of Warwickshire Morris Men exactly echoes my own views; that is, it is only acceptable for local people who are steeped in their tradition to add to, or otherwise change, "their" dances, as they think fit. It surely follows that those outside any particular tradition, least of all sophisticated urbanites from, for example, Sofia, Amsterdam, New York or London, should not change these dances for any reason whatever, or if they do the results are something other than folk dances. As I see it, this must mean we should respect the meaning of the dances (to quote Lucile Armstrong) and perform them as recorded. I am sure the Morris Men would have been even more disgusted with Cecil Sharp if he had included a few Russian steps to make the dances more "interesting".

Nick also goes on to say that non-Romanians cannot even walk like Romanians and, by implication, that non-Scots cannot dance like Scots, and so on through every known style. I am afraid I do not believe this. Given that a dancer has sufficient ability, physical dexterity, and application, she/he should be able to dance, on the surface at least, in a manner indistinguishable from that of the native people.

Finally, perhaps I should say that I may not have understood Nick's general drift. Is he saying that we should not be trying to copy these dances and their different styles, but use them simply as a basis to enjoy ourselves? But I have probably got it wrong again.

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Dear Lily.

I would like to pick out one sentence from Nick Green's letter to the November SIFD NEWS: "A Romanian (not Silviu) recently commented that we have enthusiasm but will never dance (or even walk to the music) like a Romanian".

On 13th May, seven of us who went to Romania last summer with Silviu, plus another member of my Horniman class, gave a performance on the occasion of Romania's National Day. I should like to quote just one paragraph from the letter of thanks the team received afterwards:-

"It was a great honour and pleasure for us Romanians that such an accomplished group of dedicated dancers should be prepared to highlight our national festivity. We are very grateful that you have given our guests an unforgettable image of how beautiful our folk dances are when presented in such a perfectly chiselled way, so careful of the authenticity as well as of every detail. Each of you and all together danced as if you had been born in the Carpathian hills, or near those rivers surging from them and nourishing the meadows and the fields in which these dances come to life. Our guests would not believe that none of you were of Romanian blood!".

I quote this paragraph from the letter to show that in the right atmosphere, with music and costumes, it is possible to dance as if one came from that country, and perhaps Nick would like to show it to his Romanian acquaintance.

As for the bulk of Nick's letter that tradition is forever changing and is not a museum piece, I would say that the members of the S.I.F.D. are indeed living up to tradition no matter what the constitution might say.

Whatever your point of view, the most important thing is - Keep dancing.

# GREEK SEMINARS

Apr.14th/21st. Easter Dance Seminar in Anoyia, Crete (30kms from Iraklion). Traditional village Easter celebration. Dance parties with villagers and local musicians. Dance instruction 3-4 hours daily. Lectures, slides, videos. Dance regions: Crete, Dodecanese Islands, Macedonia, others. Instructors: Yvonne Hunt and others. This seminar is being organized by Yvonne Hunt with the co-operation of the Hellenic American Union (Athens).

The members of the Larissa section of the International Organization of Folk Arts (IOFA) present two 1990 summer seminars of the "Hiphaistia" type:-

- A. July 17th/29th. The Argithea region of the Agrafa Mountains, near Lake Meydova. Participating in the seminar will be visitors from the communities of Krokos, Aridea, Monastiri and Aetorahl. Join the local villagers in their dance celebration; musicians also from either Bulgaria or Albania.
- B. Aug.3rd/16th. Tsepelovo, Epirus, in the picturesque Zagori region near the Vikos Gorge. Thirteen days with a team of dance instructors and musicians, the members of the City College of Thessaloniki dance group, and the folk music department of the Larissa Odeon. On the first day, participation in the celebration of the Sarakatsani nomads, eight kms. from Tsepelovo. In addition, another eight celebrations will take place at various nearby villages during the period.

The Larissa section of IOFA, responsible for the above two seminars, is composed of those who work toward the strengthening of the traditional culture in Greece as well as in the Balkans. Besides the central organization in Larissa, many other members and colleagues, mainly in Northern Greece, work toward Hiphaistia's goals. Their goal for the seminars is to form an educational institution through the dance celebrations which will bring about a better acquaintance with traditional dance and culture. The team organizes various activities throughout the year in Greece:— seminars, research, recreation. Their theme: Balkan Culture. Yvonne Hunt, who is in charge, is an excellent teacher and researcher. She has been living in Greece for many years, spending a lot of time in remote villages researching and collecting dances and music.
