LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Lily,

I have just returned from another of my trips abroad, which unfortunately was cut short by a heart attack and stroke, necessitating eleven days in an Intensive Care Unit. However, I'm back again and now want to write about something else.

During my stay in Kathmandu, capital of Nepal, I made a very useful contact with the Municipal Folkdance Group of Nepal, known as "Sanskritik Sansthan". This group performs daily throughout the year to the local people in their own theatre in the centre of Kathmandu. I was told that they have already performed in Folk Festivals in Italy and France but are now very keen to perform in Festivals in England next summer. The Director of the group (who, incidentally, studied Business Management in England for three years) has passed to me a representative collection of photos of the group in action, so that potential festival organizers can contact them. They are a very talented group of dancers, singers and musicians, most of whom speak English.

I am now appealing to members of the Society to let me have the fullest possible details of any Folklore Festivals which they know of (with the organizers' details) which have an International character. This information I will pass on to the Kathmandu group.

On another completely different matter. The Kathmand $_{\dot{u}}$ group would welcome a visit sometime next year of some of our Society's dancers to spend two or three weeks with them and to study enough of their dances perhaps to form a new group in London or elsewhere in England. This visit could include a long weekend doing some gentle trekking in the lower Himalayas.

Regarding accommodation; I stayed in Kathmandu guest house which has 200 bedrooms. Overnight charges range from £1 to £10. All bedrooms have their own showers and toilets, and the guest house has its own restaurant which serves food from several countries. The whole area is full of Nepalese, Chinese, Thai, Mexican, Tibetan, Italian and general Continental restaurants. From September to the end of May the weather is glorious there and quite hot with little rainfall. The monsoon months are June, July and August, when it is generally cloudy in the mornings, very hot in the afternoons and in the evenings, and during the night the rainfall is very heavy.

This trip would be something like the one which a group of our Society's members did years ago when they were guests of the Albanian State Dance Ensemble.

So, I should now be very pleased to hear from any individuals or groups in the Society who would be interested in doing this trip next year. When writing, can you please let me know in which month you would be free to travel. I would suggest the best months would be May or September from the weather angle, and would be best for the Kathmandu group as they would be back home again after any festivals they have taken part in.

I look forward with great interest to hearing from many of you. If it comes off, it will make the Society a little more International.
