SOME PERSONAL TRIBUTES TO PHILIP THORNTON, who died on Monday, 30th November 1992. He was one of the most charismatic and colourful personalities the S.I.F.D. has ever known; an inspiration to so many of us and a revered leader. (Philip had a unique way of "promoting" people from his Beginners' class to his "Advanced" group. No word was spoken but during the dance you would at some time during the evening feel a gentle tap on the shoulder from behind and you would know that you had been chosen to be "up-graded". This was the supreme accolade!).

PHILIP THORNTON 1910 - 1992

On 3rd December we said Goodbye to Philip. It was an informal occasion at which some of his favourite Balkan music was beautifully played by the Dunav Band. He was the last member of the Society who experienced life in the Balkans prior to the Second World War. His travels as a young man resulted in the publication of three interesting books — "The Voice of Atlas", "Dead Puppets Dance", and "Ikons and Oxen", in which he describes a way of life which up to the war had remained unchanged for hundreds of years. He attended the Fire Walking rituals at Nestinari in Bulgaria, the magic Rusalja Sword Dances from Gevgelija in Macedonia (in former Yugoslavia) and also the Serbian "Dodole" Rain Dances.

Philip was very talented and he had a marvellous understanding of balkan music and the complex structure and rhythms. I learnt much from him in chats at his home and in his weekly class. We did not find Philip a good teacher but we developed an understanding of the strange rhythms and the ability to perform the dances quite naturally.

He was in the balkans during the war, and for his exploits he was awarded a very high decoration by a major European country; apart from Greece, he never travelled in the balkans again - he told me he dared not!

It is due to Philip, his encouragement, his introduction to Zivko Firfov, and the beginning of my own travels and discoveries, that the group eventually evolved from Philip's old group. We look back at those enjoyable, if sometimes chaotic, evenings with nostalgia. There was never a dull moment - sometimes dances would just disintegrate and Philip would blame the gramophone pickup for jumping a groove! I suspect that often his mind travelled back into the past and he was no longer at the class. By now he is probably on his way to setting up a Balkan dance class in the other world!

PHILIP THORNTON

Philip's funeral, as expected, was brief and different. It was super to have Dunav playing, mostly Serbian but other Balkan music too. (A memorial Balkanplus is now being planned for March, I think, to celebrate his LIFE!). After the funeral, Frances Horrocks and Naren Kotiyan went back with Philip's "surrogate son", Tim Pryor, while I went with Mary Fergar, George Sweetland and John Hughes to Lady Lorna Gore-Brown's home. Lady Lorna was a companion of Philip's on many of his earlier travels and is a charming and fascinating character. (Anyone seeing the current edition of "Pole to Pole" will have seen Michael Palin talking to her daughter and son-in-law - both murdered soon after in the South of Zambia).

I think John's epithet for Philip was the nicest - "The Pied Piper of the Balkans". Very fitting. It adds a touch of the fairy tale, underlines his haunting and charismatic quality, his compelling personality, and includes his great love and ability in musicology. It only misses out his sense of humour and impish glee which will never fade and which several spoke of then.

I do hope that Philip's deep concern for maintaining traditions, music and dance unspoilt and unadulterated will be honoured and continued. Standards are important.

DANCING IN BUDAPEST

I don't know what happens in the summer, but during the winter Budapest is a thriving centre for folkdance, and not just the Hungarian Dance House. To get into the scene, you need to buy "Budapest Week", the only one of the three weekly English papers to include folkdance to do (as opposed to watch) in its listings. This is the current scene (autumn 1992) with notes where I was able to visit. Most run from 7 to 11 p.m.

Monday

You might pick up the fortnightly concert by the Gypsy folk-rock group "Kalyi Jag" at the Rudolf Vig Club held at Almassy Cultural Centre, Almassy ter.6, Budapest VII (near Blaha Lujza metro station. Maybe the audiences do the Gypsy Czardas.

Tuesday

Hungarian Dance House with "Muszikas" (and sometimes Marta Sebestyen) at the FMH Cultural Centre in Fehervari ut.47, Budapest XI. Teaching.

Wednesday

Two possibilities. Balkan dancing to the Falkafolk Band. Venue as Tuesday. Or Dance House with dances of the Csangos, originally danced by Hungarians in East Romania. Apparently very lively. Marczibany Cultural Centre, Marczibany ter. 5/a Budapest II (near Moskva ter.). The dances are taught.

Thursday

Try "Budapest Week" for Latin-American, Jazz or Country & Western, or one of the state folkdance ensembles giving a concert.

Friday

Again two possibilities. Teka Tanchaz, Hungarian Dance House with the Teka band. Normal dance house. Couple dances from Transylvania are taught simultaneously to beginners and advanced. No shortage of partners. Cafe to sit out in. Cheap handmade embroidery on sale. Or Zsaratnok Balkan Dance House. Serbian and Bulgarian, mainly circle dances to very lively music in chairless room. Snackbar downstairs. If you like Balkanplus you will like this. The dances are not walked through. Lagymanyos Cultural House, Korosi u.17, Budapest XI.

Saturday

Maybe some Greek dancing or a Disco. See "Budapest Week".

TURKISH DELIGHT

As you can see, I'm more able to indulge my interest in Turkish dancing these days! Well, those people unable to claim any vague connection to the tourist trade, or hesitant about coughing up £10 to get in, missed a treat in the middle of November at the World Travel Market. The Turkish group from Ankara was THE highlight of the stage offerings. They were young, enthusiastic, extremely talented, and presented a thrilling programme (varying each performance with several changes of costume too). The live musicians were of course intoxicating with their irresistable brand of magic. No wonder the applause continued long after they had van ished.

The London Turkish Group, with its customary open-handed and open-hearted hospitality, welcomed the whole group to the weekly class (hope you've noticed it's changed from the Monday, everything-on-day, to TUESDAY. Why not give it a go? It's always genuine Turkish teachers - Omer currently). Such a pity that the class is strictly two hours; we could have gone on for hours more watching them go through their seemingly endless repertoire. Not only were we entertained, but they wanted to see some of the dances the class knew! (They were so charming, it wasn't embarrassing) and then the high-spot of the evening - Turgay taught and we all danced together. All the dancers were so helpful and encouraging, it was a wonderful evening, helped along of course with the food and wine that Pauline Welch and Philip Barnes managed to produce - and that after a full day at Earls Court too - even flowers for the girls.

How about having Turgay for the Summer School York 1994? We've never had a Turkish teacher (I don't count the couple of Turkish dances thrown into Gary Karner's essentially Transylvanian programme several Swanseas ago — super though they were). Otherwise, what about Albanian, Filipino, Malaysian, Afghan, Japanese? There are plenty of others we haven't tried yet!

The last class of term for the London Turkish Group was, as usual, a wee party with customary Turkish hospitality and several visitors (always welcome). One in particular was unusual - a reporter from a Turkish newspaper, so there were photos and little interviews to add to the interest. It was lovely too to see the video that Pauline Welch had taken at the World Travel Market and to re-live those delights of the Ankara group. Don't forget to make a note of the first "class" of next term - Tuesday, 5th January. It will be a meal - and everyone interested is welcome to join the group - at the Sultan Ahmet Turkish Restaurant in Essex Road (300?), London N.1, where we have the basement to ourselves and can dance as well as eat and drink, very cheaply. Arrive around 7 to 7.30 p.m. Then, dancing as usual on 12th January, 7.30 to 9.30 p.m. at 1A Rosebery Avenue.

Oh, and don't forget that if anyone would like a "Turkish evening", with a slide show and talk from Pauline, food and dancing from the group, just name the day. Broaden the horizons of your P.T.A., W.I., whatever. It won't cost you/them much and will be a really enjoyable evening, whatever the age or interests.
