We are very sorry to announce that Dr. Pug Cyriax died on 14th February 1993 aged 86. Irene Fyffe brought to my notice an announcement in "The Times" but unfortunately this was after the NEWS had been posted including a note saying that Pug would like to see old friends from the S.I.F.D. She still retained links with the Society up to the end. Ed.

Dr.Cyriax came to the Society in the very early days, and we were lucky to secure a teacher of Swedish dancing who knew her subject so thoroughly. "Pug", as she became to us immediately, soon inspired many of us with a love of Swedish dancing, and almost all of the dances of that country now in the repertoire of the Society were originally taught by Pug.

Her grandfather, according to repute, was a Sort of Swedish Cecil Sharp, and following in the family tradition Pug was a stickler for authenticity. I remember that on her first appearance we were all told to "get rid of those plimsolls and wear stout shoes". Her help with costumes was invaluable, providing the Society with a large collection of authentic Swedish garments. She was Wardrobe Mistress for the Society for many years.

In 1953, the "See How They Dance" show at the Royal Albert Hall opened with a Swedish Midsummer Eve display, featuring a maypole, dances, and song-dances, the words learnt phonetically by the dancers. All of these arrangements were choreographed and rehearsed by Pug.

She was an important and well-loved person in the Society, and her death leaves us all a little impoverished.

THOSE WHO CAN AND THOSE WHO TEACH

There is a saying that those who can, do, those who can't, teach. Perhaps this is the reason that I have become a teacher of folk dances to a group of 10-12 year old girls? Many years ago, when the world was young and so was I, a group of dancers at the University of Sussex beguiled me into becoming a member of IFDS, the International Folk Dance Society of Sussex. After my student days were over, I contributed to the brain drain (?!) and emigrated to Finland, ostensibly for one year but eventually, apparently, for ever (I'm still here). For various reasons folk dancing went into eclipse for about 100 years, but in 1990 I decided to make a come-back and started coaching a group of girls from the local school...

The group, Radosna Bojana, has flourished. From their very unauspicious beginnings (Cherkassia kefula and Setnja kolo were ever so difficult at first!) the girls have become an experienced demonstration group, unafraid of audiences up to 600. Cherkassia is nowadays scorned as too simple! At present there are 16 girls in the group, 13 of them from the same class at school. Half of them wear blue skirts and dance boys' steps, the other half wear red skirts and dance girls' steps. Nobody seems to mind! Our programme of dances includes such as Windmühle, Napolian tarantella, Snurrebocken and Ken Ward's Serbian suite from the repertoire of SIFD but also others, such as El Carnavalito (Argentina), Ta'am haman (Israel), Czardas vrteilka (Hungary) and Strip the Willow (England, a foreign country from our perspective).

From their origins as a bickering, self-centred and frequently bloody-minded group of totally uncooperative individuals (to put the situation mildly!), Radosna Bojana has developed into a much more coherent micro-society of dancers who look after each other as well as themselves and have learned how to bury their differences in order to ensure that the show not only goes on but is successful. Of this, as much as of the dances they have learned, I am particularly pleased and proud. In the forseeable future I hope to be able to arrange international show trips for the group - perhaps at first to Estonia, only a four-hour boat trip away, later further afield. Maybe one day we'll even make it to the UK?

During the past three years, I have received help in various forms from members of SIFD. Special thanks go to Ken Ward, who first introduced me and my wooden legs to the tunes and rhythyms of Balkan dance music in 1969 and who also helped me more recently. I am glad to be a member of SIFD again after all this time, and I am also pleased to feel that I have achieved something in making a real show-standard group out of Radosna Bojana. Here in Finland, international folk dancing is quite a rare pastime - I know of no other children's groups. Best wishes to all SIFD News readers, and I hope to meet some of you in an SIFD dance in summer when our family is in the UK on holiday. Then you will understand what I meant in the title of this letter!

A NEW PUBLICATION

"Dance Studies, Vol.15", edited by Roderyk Lange. Price £6, p. & p. extra. From the Centre for Dance Studies, Les Bois, St.Peter, Jersey, Channel Islands JE3 7AQ.

As one year ends and another begins, Dr.Lange always produces one of his excellent Dance Studies. This one, No.15 in the series, is as always full of interest. Each issue manages to cover a new area or subject for the reader's perusal. In this volume, the subject matter presented is a study by Dr.Lange himself on the religious festival of Galungan in Bali. Jennifer Shennan writes about the Maori dance tradition and her research on it. The indigenous dance terminology is viewed in the context of the Maori language. The accounts on Maori dance are surveyed, and particular references are made to the Haka dance. The third contribution is by Nina De Shane and is on the Ksan dances of the North-West coast Indians of British Colombia, Canada.

The material is extremely interesting and has been presented with lavish illustrations. In today's climate of dance degrees and ethnic studies, these books must be invaluable. These types of studies and the dedicated field workers all help to establish the importance of folk dance and culture in our present society.

Here is an update on this summer trip, for which I am currently arranging the programme. I expect to have two dance teachers, so that we can benefit from a variety of styles. A LETTER FROM THEMEMBERSHIP SECRETARY ON HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP

The purpose of this letter is to tell all members how many Honorary Life Members I have on record, who they are, and address the problem of finding a consensus as to how to determine how many we should have.

My most recent count indicates that we have 11 Honorary Life Members on record as at 1st March 1993, and they are:-

Mrs. A.Aistrat, Mrs. L.Avery, Miss S.Chapman, Mrs. I.Fyffe, Mr. W.Horrocks, Mrs. K.Kedge, Mr. A.McLean, Professor J.Richardson, Mrs. D.Sloan (overseas), Mrs. M.Webb and Mr. D.Wells

As reported elsewhere, sadly we have recently lost two Honorary Life Members, Dr. Cyriax and Mr. D.V. Hunt.

Mainly for information for new members, the Constitution says that Honorary Life Membership may be awarded by a motion at an Annual General Meeting, with the Member's consent, to any member who is proposed and seconded in writing, and this being sent to the Secretary in time for inclusion in the A.G.M. Agenda, although late motions (non-constitutional changes) can be presented under "Any Other Business". Honorary Life Membership is a special honour and it is normally conferred in recognition of exceptional service to the Society over a significant number of years.

Separately from Honorary Life Membership, the Constitution enables the Executive Committee to confer Associateship on individuals where it is mutually advantageous for them to have a complimentary issue of the SIFD NEWS, for example, whilst they are providing a regular service or an overseas liaison to the Society; this is ended after the conclusion of their services. Associateship includes no membership benefits unless the recipient is a Member or Honorary Member of the Society. Not included in the above list are 12 persons listed as having Associateship of the Society. (Ref. Constitution January 1989, Articles of Association 1, 4, 9 and 10).

It was suggested at the A.G.M. that some balance should be drawn up between recognition for inclusion in the "List of Honours" and numbers relative to our total membership (approximately 630 at present, allowing for seasonal variation). The Committee have since considered setting a limit of approximately 3% of the membership, but as the membership total may vary, perhaps a fixed number of, say, about 15 may offer a better solution. However, the majority of the Committee would prefer not to impose a rigid limit so that there is freedom to recognise truly exceptional service whenever it occurs.

Following this discussion, the Committee, recognising the great significance of Honorary Membership, felt that it might be desirable to formalise the system of proposal. One suggestion, requiring formal proposals in advance, is described in the paper attached to this month's NEWS. Another idea, which the Committee will discuss in the future, is that the number of proposers might be increased.

The Committee would welcome any views from members before the Committee meeting on 9th May 1993.

FOLK COSTUMES OF THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA

Part 11. Macedonia - East. Injevo village.

In this my last extract from notes on costumes from my proposed book, I've chosen those from Injevo, which is the fertile hilly region seven kilometres from Radovis; the former mud track has now been tarmac-ed by the villagers and they have a 'bus service. The costumes are not monumental, nor do they have great ethnic qualities but they were, and perhaps are still, being made and worn on special occasions and on a daily basis by the older women. They are complete in their integral parts and have not disintegrated and become shabby and debased. After seeing a very impressive traditional performance at the Ohrid Festival in 1973, I was invited to visit the village by Simeon Kocev, the group leader. I wrote up the visits for SIFD NEWS at the time. I stayed at the village several times, and the St. George's Day celebration, with hundreds of costumes in perfect condition, is something I shall always remember.

The costumes, which are very attractive, are worn in several villages. Some of you may remember seeing them when I brought the group over to Llangollen in 1974, and they later danced at a Balkan party. Two interesting things I remember; on the way to the village, seeing an elderly shepherd with his flock, wearing his white costume with red jacket; and on a Sunday, the girls changing into "civvies" for a group rehearsal and back again for the evening dance in the village.

Fine embroidery is still being done, and in addition to the costumes examples can be seen in the houses, and in the old church which is like a folkcraft warehouse! The women's costume has changed little in outline but some more modern materials have been introduced. For the moment I cannot find the full details of the costume, and write from memory. The chemise is as described for other regions, very basic with minimal decoration to the collar and cuffs, but more to the hem, and in each bottom corner of the back panel a vertical oblong of embroidery. The young girls have more recent designs of stylised flowers, but the older women have geometric symbolic patterns. In addition there is a narrow band of embroidery down each seam. Over this garment is worn a short jacket with long sleeves, made of black "satin", which meets at the front. Called "saja", I believe it to be the remains of a richer garment of black or purple velvet, decorated around the edges and on the lower sleeve in gilt wire (similar to the rich Serbian waist-I have seen these worn by women from mountain villages at the markets in Ohrid and Struga. The current decoration is of much coarser braid and ricrac. The sleeves are about threequarter length to expose the embroidered chemise cuff. The jacket is of Turkish influence, and overthis is worn a long-sleeved basically cut white cotton threequarter-length coat. The edges and cuffs are narrowly embroidered and edged with crochet-work and coloured glass beads. Across the back bottom panel is a broad horizontal band of embroidery. The front bottom corners have embroidered panels on the inside. The corners are worn pinned to the edges of the back panel (in the nature of 18th-century military The cuffs are turned back to expose decoration on the black sleeves In the winter, a very thick quilted dark red jacket is worn underneath the white jacket.

This winter jacket has very large side panels and is sleeveless. It has a fanshape from the rear and the embroidered panels of the white rest across the back. It looks very attractive, but the wearer has to go through doorways sideways. This also resembles 18th-century high women's fashion. It is interesting to speculate if there is any link, however unlikely (which came first? The Western Europeans were around at the time!). I'm not sure what else is worn in cold weather, but fur jackets were worn with the fleece inside. It is possible that a longish fur jacket was worn under the red jacket with long sleeves. Over the white jacket is worn a waistcoat of white cotton with woven-in coloured wool and cotton motifs in vertical stripes.

A bed (or sleeping bag on the floor), breakfast, some sort of meal before the bed, and a packed lunch each day.

SIFD Constitution

Following discussion at the AGM last December, the Committee has reviewed the Constitution as amended at that meeting. The Committee has taken a number of decisions of principle, and has asked me to propose wording to give effect to those decisions.

While the impetus for the Committee review was the confusion concerning the calling of EGMs under the amended Constitution, the opportunity was taken to address a number of issues where the Constitution is thought to be inappropriate for present circumstances.

The Constitution requires that any proposal for constitutional change is circulated to members in advance of a General Meeting and that such motions cannot be amended at the meeting: they have to be accepted or rejected as they stand. It is important, therefore, that constitutional motions submitted to General Meetings are well formulated and, ideally, reflect a consensus.

The purpose of this note is to set out draft constitutional motions for the next AGM (in November 1993) and to seek comment on them before their formal submission to members, in the hope that any deficiencies may be rectified in advance. Members' comments are therefore sought on the proposals in this note as soon as possible.

Proposed amendments are based on the present Constitution, which incorporates the amendments accepted at the AGM in December 1992.

Motion 1

In Clause 6 of the Memorandum of Association, replace "two auditors" by "an auditor"

In Article 37, first sentence, replace "Auditors" by "An auditor" and "their" by "his". In second sentence of Art 37, replace "auditors" by "auditor" twice.

Comment: The change to reduce the number of auditors from two to one is in line with practice of the last few years.

Motion 2

Replace Clause 8 by 'The Executive Committee may whenever they think fit convene an Extraordinary General Meeting. An Extraordinary General Meeting shall be held within two months of the receipt by the Hon. Secretary of a written request for such a meeting signed by not less than twenty members, or one fifth of the members (which ever is the less). Such a written request shall include details of the business to be addressed at the meeting."

Replace Article 9 by "The notice of, and agenda for, any General Meeting shall be sent to members not less than 21 days before the date of the meeting. The agenda shall specify the date, time and place of the meeting and shall include all motions, including those proposed by the Committee and, for an EGM, by the requisitioners of the meeting. For the AGM, members shall have any motion that is duly proposed and seconded placed on the agenda, provided the motion is received by the Hon. Secretary by the end of September. In addition for the AGM, the agenda shall include items covering (a) reports of the Executive Committee and the auditor, (b) consideration of the accounts, and (c) election of officers and Executive Committee members for the coming year. The Chairman, at his discretion and subject to the necessary time being available after all business on the agenda has been

dealt with, may accept motions, excluding those involving constitutional change, duly seconded. from the floor."

Comment: These amendments, in which the last sentence of Art 8 and the first three and a half sentences of Art 9 are new, clarify the procedure for EGMs, exactly within the spirit of the procedure for AGMs approved by members at the last AGM. An additional requirement, for the requisitioners of an EGM to specify the business to be transacted has been inserted, in line with conventional practice.

Motion 3

Replace paragraph 1 and the first three sentences of paragraph 2 of Article 27 by "The Chairman, Hon, Treasurer, Hon, Secretary and six ordinary members of the Committee shall be elected according to the following procedure. Any paid up member of the Society may be nominated by members as a candidate for one or more of these offices, provided that each nomination (a) is in writing signed by two members, (b) contains the written consent of the member to act if elected, and (c) is received by the Hon, Secretary not later than the end of September. If the number of candidates nominated as aforesaid does not exceed the number of vacancies, candidates so nominated shall be deemed to have been selected. If the number of candidates exceeds the number of vacancies, an election shall be held and the Hon, Sec, shall send out voting papers. These shall be sent to members, and delegates of affiliated groups entitled to vote at the AGM that year, not later than 21 days before the Annual General Meeting."

Comment; The rest of the present Art 27 provides for the return of voting papers 7 days in advance of the meeting, for the counting of votes in secret and for a procedure that allows a person to be a candidate for more than one office,

The present Art 27 sets out an elaborate procedure which would be expensive (about £100 in postage) and time consuming to operate, to the extent that it may be impractical, therefore hindering democracy. The proposed new procedure retains the substance of the present constitution, but ties in nominations to the same date as is now proposed for motions for the AGM, with a requirement that, if necessary, voting papers are circulated at the same time as the papers for the AGM (expected to be with SIFD News). Members then have 14 days, less time for postal delivery, to get voting papers back to the Secretary, with the counting of votes following the same procedure as provided for in the present constitution,

Motion 4

Replace the third sentence of Article 1 by the following "Honorary Membership may be conferred on any person in recognition of services to the Society on the passing at an Annual General Meeting of a motion to that effect. Any such motion, duly proposed and seconded, must be received by the Hon Secretary by the end of September and shall be placed on the agenda for the AGM.

In new Article 9 (see Motion 2) after "constitutional change" insert "and those proposing Honorary Memberships"

Comment: This amendment introduces a requirement that motions proposing Honorary members are submitted to the same timetable as other business for the A6M, consistent with the Committee view that the procedure for conferring Honorary Membership should be made more formal. It is for further consideration whether such motions should require a larger number of proposers or whether there should be a postal vote.
