One other point I must mention: as well as the lavish hospitality of the evening itself, N.I.F.D., with true Welsh generosity, hosted as many dancers and musicians as needed it, and there were quite a lot. Dear Lily,

A word in defence of "The Place" which I was surprised to read in last month's SIFD NEWS that you, and apparently some others, found "scruffy and uninviting" and therefore not conclusive to drawing in good numbers.

I personally feel it has a lot to recommend it. It is central and easy to find. The studios are a good shape, and light and airy, and have well-sprung floors. If I have a grumble, it is that it is difficult to find anything to sit on! Cloakroom facilities may not be terrific, but I have never found them dirty, and the canteen is quite adequate. (I must have been unlucky, as I found the changing rooms and toilets (downstairs) disgustingly filthy; and the canteen is closed on Sundays when we hold S.I.F.D. Day courses, anyway. L.A.).

It is also extremely reasonable to hire, which is such an important point. At a Jacy Tacy session in the Spring we were unable to obtain a studio there and had to hire one (admittedly larger, but a poor shape) at Holborn Centre for Performing Arts. Facilities were very similar to those at The Place but it cost almost three times as much. I would add that at our recent November date at the latter we had very good numbers.

PODEGRODZIE SONG & DANCE GROUP REVISITED AFTER 21 YEARS

Podegrodzie is a village a little way from Nowy Sacz in South Poland, and I went there all those years ago to study the truly authentic dances of that area. These consist almost entirely of polkas and waltzes danced on the flat of the foot. On that previous visit the group was divided almost equally in two parts, one of very young people who did the more energetic dances, and the other of the elderly, and all the dances were interspersed with frequent song. I was particularly enchanted on that occasion by the beautiful old costumes and vivacity of the dancing of the old folk.

The present group consists now almost entirely of younger members, though some of them appeared to be nearing their middle years. They still have just four elderly couples they told me, but none was there on the evening of my visit, which was a disappointment. Maybe in another decade or so the balance will even up again if some of the now younger members still want to maintain their old traditions.

Anyhow, the group is certainly flourishing, and have just won "gold" at the September Festival in Zakopane, and in 1992 they became Laureate of European Award in Folk Art. They told me they are at present working on customs surrounding the ancient wedding ceremony in their region, but they chose to show me instead part of their very polished arrangement of dances for Harvest Festival. The speed and accuracy of these was incredible, and the singing and the playing of the small orchestra was likewise splendid; everything flowed and linked together so very naturally. This, of course, all comes with years of practising just these polkas and waltzes, many of them very similar, and nothing else. I couldn't help thinking however once again of how bored most of our S.I.F.D. members would become doing only this. Not only do our dancers expect to learn dances from all regions of a country, but from many different countries as well. Following on from this thought inevitably is "how can a high standard be attained in all this variety, especially as to style?". However - back to Podegrodzie!

I had a small chuckle to myself when noticing absolutely all of the girls were dancing in slacks. (It was an exceedingly cold night and the hall was unheated). "Jacy Tacy" girls will remember how fierce I was with them if they did this when rehearsing in bygone days, the swinging and sometimes the holding of the skirt being quite important to the dance. Footwear likewise seemed to be just about anything these days.

Anyhow, it was a marvellous evening for me to see this group again and check on several of the dances we have known and enjoyed over the years. There was a time a few years ago when I heard that with the coming of freedom from Communism, and all the ensuing changes, a number of the dance groups had disbanded or amalgamated with others. This was partly due to the fact that they were no longer funded by state or local authorities, and had to find their own finances as, of course, we have always had to do. Now again, as I've heard from several areas, a number have reconstituted themselves. This is good news that they are determined to keep the rich and varied Folk Art alive in Poland.

WEST MIDLANDS MOVEMENT AND DANCE ASSOCIATION FESTIVAL/SHARING DAY 19TH NOVEMBER 1994, SOLIHULL

Every two years or so, the W.M.M.D.A. organize an occasion when all "musical activity" groups and classes enjoy a Festival at which they, and the public, can see each other's work. In years past, the Central Hall in Birmingham was the venue, with massive audiences of 3,000 plus. (The most memorable occasion being the night of the Birmingham pub bombings in 1974). Over the years, finance and a change in interests has forced the Festivel to be reduced in size and outlay. This year, in the lovely theatre-hall of Langleys Comprehensive School, the West Midlands Branch of the S.I.F.D. "flew the flag" for our Society. We were asked to open the event and also to be the first to perform after the interval, so that both parts of the programme started with FolkDance. Our two items, of six minutes each, and the R.S.C.D.S. item at the end, certainly produced lovely contrasts to the leotard-ed movement and K.F. groups!

The first item was a group of twelve girls and women, in costumes of five different regions of Hungary, who danced a linked sequence of girls' dances from Kalocsa and Somogy. The item was most successful....shapes opened and closed as they should, feet emphasised the walking beat at the start of the second part, and the compère made much of difficult steps being made to look simple when danced well, and also the fact that many items of costume were antique, and all were genuine!

Our second "appearance" was of eight couples who danced two Swedish dances, Sik Sak Scottis and Födeldags Vals, in a multitude of lovely costumes to make a truly International impression. This was prefaced by the compère who had bothered to translate the title of the second dance into Birthday Waltz, and dedicate it to a performer in another team whose birthday it was! How she found out, I don't know! These two six-minute appearances were intended to show two different aspects of our activity....the formal and the less formal, and this they did, most successfully.

It's not easy drawing a team from three different groups in the Branch, with only one team rehearsal beforehand. It means all the groups have to work hard at the basic material before members volunteer to join (or are press-ganged into) the team for the performance. On the day in question, a full morning Dress Rehearsal was held, so that all performers had a chance to see each other's work, which was not possible at the afternoon's performance.

Although we had some last-minute changes to the two teams (due to work commitments etc.) the teams danced exceedingly well and our own Society "parent body" can be sure the standards of the S.I.F.D. are being well maintained, and exposed wherever possible here in the West Midlands. A very big "thank you" is due to all the team, and to our supporters who loyally bought tickets and enjoyed the performances. One or two new members now see what they're aiming for!

WORKSHOP & PERFORMANCE AT THE HELLENIC CENTRE

Anyone who has ever visited the old L.C.C. gym at 16-18 Paddington Street, London Wl in the past could hardly fail to be greatly impressed with its transformation into a smart, welcoming, beautifully re-decorated and re-furbished home for the Hellenic Centre. From the top floor rooms of wardrobes, through the comfortable lounge, spacious cloakrooms, balcony cafe area, well-equipped kitchens, to the lovely basement ballroom area which lent itself so well to the Leventis Collection Exhibition. The excellent floor has been stripped, sanded and re-varnished, to provide a large all-purpose area, very pleasant for the high-quality workshop given by Maria Koutsoubas. Her specialisation is in Greek Dance and Anthropology as she prepares her PhD from a background of P.E. and Dance, so it was not surprising that her full notes contained a lot of interesting information, even if the lack of step notes was disappointing, but as few could have been helped by Labanotation scripts these were not included (tape and notes still available, £5).

It was lovely to have Natassa Lemos introducing Maria and staying to dance with us. (So glad her fingers are completely recovered). Served drinks, cakes and biscuits in the interval were lovely, as were similar refreshments mid-way in the excellent performance. It was wonderful to see all the Lykion costumes in use again and it brought back countless happy memories for Sula and me. It was a very full, colourful programme which delighted the audience filling the ballroom. A great pleasure to see Natassa on stage again too. It was a kaleidoscope of dances from all regions and met with a deservedly most enthusiastic response. Special mention must be made of the fantastic musicians brought over from Greece to give the performance real lift. My only (very minor) criticism is the very short solos from these talented men. I was expecting that they would be given a spot on stage for us to appreciate them fully. They were indefatigable enough to have enjoyed that, I'm sure. Sotiris Kountenamis (percussion) felt moved to come and join the dancers at one point as the men "showed off" in turn.

The weekend was a christening and window on the Hellenic Centre that Lykion can be justly proud of. Everyone I spoke to was most impressed and full of smiles and praise.
