TRADITIONAL DANCE AND THE COURSE OF OUR LIVES by Jan Mulreany

"When we dance sunwise, are we following the course of the months of the year, the year of four seasons, the agricultural cycle? Where are the birth dances as well as the wedding dances, which the puberty dances, the mourning dances? Which dances mark the changes between joy and sorrow?". Some of you, experienced international folk dancers with a wide range of knowledge about the origins and purposes of the international dances we/you do on a regular basis, will have immediate answers to these questions. These are among those I wished to ask for the dissertation that formed the final part of a Masters degree in Life Course Development, a part-time degree from the University of London's Birkbeck College.

The life course development perspective is one in which various strands from society and personality, politics, history, education, biology and upbringing weave together to explain why our lives are essentially the same but different. For the degree's individual research component we were encouraged to consider an aspect of a personal interest that hinged on life course development. As a dancer, I chose to explore the role and place of traditional folk dance in the lives of communities and individuals, now and before now. As a teacher of European dance, especially communal circle and line dances, I knew that I had my understanding of steps and music, literature, and a network of dancers to help answer the questions. Specifically they were about how the dance takes people through transitions, those times of life when change, sanctioned by body and society, happens.

Modern life is a rapid phenomenon and our ideas take longer to change than events dictate. Our bodies and the traditions of family and community are linked together in a way which we can "remember" what might be described as "old ways", through games and stories, work patterns, rituals and rhythmic activities such as singing and dancing. In some ways these memories might help us cope with modern life, psychologically and emotionally.

I wanted answers to how these dances help with life changes <u>now</u>, as well as whether they coincide with the original purpose. I asked questions of dancers, and read - Senate House library in London has shelves of obscure books about folklore and I found many dusty gems - and made connections with the theory of the subject of my degree. When I re-read the summary of research findings in my dissertation, I am aware that many of the conclusions are very specific to the theoretical input of life course development, although I am also proud to say that I introduced an academic team to some of the ancient circle and line dances which illustrate the above life events!

There are many books, especially anthropological texts, which stress the importance of communal dance as ritual in life events. One feature was the position of a dance as the equivalent of a legal act, such as those connected with initiation, marriage - the bride and groom being led by their respective families in a dance from their homes into the married couples dance - or funerals. These dances stress the changes occurring in the life of a single person or within a social group; others stress the divisions in society - by their role in the dance an individual will know his or her place in the community. Women, especially grandmothers and elders, form a supporting backdrop in many Balkan dances, accompanying the musicians with the drome of their voices. Male dancers will dance solo or in pairs in front of this horseshoe-shaped wall of female security, overtly "performing" with the due vigour and panache of the masculine creature, to the pride of female members. And so it is in life - women "hold" the community together in one form, men are active in another (despite greater opportunities for younger professional women in these countries as elsewhere, the form still holds).

Distinctions can be drawn between repertoires of dancers unmarried and married, male and female, children and adults. My performance list includes a Romanian dance for pubertal girls (who, in the actions and steps, are supported by women to learn "elder" secrets) as well as another traditionally danced annually by new mothers for the midwives. On St.John's Day in Macedonia everybody still joins the kolo, and women in mourning may sing for the first time.
