On 18th March the Society held a Beginners' Barn Dance in Trefusis, at Cecil Sharp House. This was ably M.C.ed by Anne Leach and Maggie O'Reagan to the exciting music of 'Jacob's Ladder', led by Michael Gilbert. Thank you to those of you who attended the dance and especial thanks are due to Caspar Cronk who organised the dance on behalf of the Committee. I am sorry that I wasn't able to attend the function myself but I gathered that a good time was had by all!

It was nice to see all the participants at Birmingham on March 26th when Frances Horrocks put us through our paces for our Romanian item for the 'Spotlight on Dance'. Observers said that they could see a vast improvement in the item by the end of the afternoon. I'm sure that on the day it will look very colourful, authentic and very 'folky' with our cross-section of the Society - young and not so young, short and tall, thin and not so thin - dancing and creating the potentially effective patterns of Frances' choreography. We will try to do Frances' ideas justice. I do know what hard work it is producing these sort of items, so thank you Frances for the work so far, and thanks to all the members for their enthusiasim.

A large vote of thanks is also due to Nick Green for organising the Society's efforts, under the CCPR banner, at the 'Dance World' in Olympia, which was held from 31st March -2nd April. If you remember, the event was held last year at the Barbican, which was very congested, so this time the commercial organisers hired Olympia. Apparently the event overall was better organised but the venue even worse because of the noise. Anyway we did our best to publicise the Society which involved manning a stand for the three days - thanks to Caspar Cronk, Eleanor Gordon, Helen Ezra, George Sweetland and Alex Beauclerc for performing this duty. We held four dance workshops (only 2 last year), in Israeli, South-Eastern European, Childrens' and General International Dancing which were well attended. Thanks to the teachers who represented us on this occasion - Roberto Haddon, Leslie Haddon, Janet Woolbar, Anne Leach and Jeanette Hull. We only had one dance display slot this time (5 last year) which was performed very well (so my spies tell me) by 'Martisorul' on the Main Stage. I'm sorry I wasn't able to be at Olympia to support the event, I was in the U.S.A. and it was too far to pop back! Thanks again Nick for all the work you did on our behalf and to all those who helped to promote our kind of dancing.

The Eastbourne Festival was held from May 5th - 8th where we had a very strong presence. It was good to see so many members there 'dancing their socks off', despite the heat, in a wide variety of styles offered by the Festival. Once again The Society organised the International workshops and social events, as well as one of our associated groups - 'Martisorul' - taking a high profile in the dance performance side of the Festival. Thanks to all the callers, leaders and musicians at so many successful events. (I'll leave the more detailed thanks to Helen - see page 4) Thanks also to those who manned the SIFD shop, helped to decorate the gym, stewarded, set up or packed up amplification equipment, or helped in some other way to contribute to a happy and

smoothly run festival. The largest vote of thanks must go to Helen Ezra who made sure of everything in her quiet and efficient way. She worked incredibly hard during the Festival, but also before the event, attending meetings at Eastbourne, building on the sure foundations that Jeanette had put in place as her predecessor. Thank you Helen.

I know that this note is too long already. (That is because I missed the April News.) I would, however, like to point out, as I did at the last AGM, that I will be resigning as Chairperson at the end of this year, after four years in post, so now is the time to think about my replacement and to start twisting arms.

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Dear Lily,

I am delighted to announce the first visit to Britain by a highly talented Bulgarian dancer - Ventzi Sotirov. Ventzi is stopping over for a few days en route to the Koprivshtitsa Festival from his present home in Chicago.

His credentials are "top drawer". A native of Sandanski, he was a lead dancer with the world-renowned Pirin Ensemble for ten years and, for four consecutive years, was voted best dancer in Bulgaria by his peers. Since his arrival in the U.S.A., Ventzi has taught at major Balkan dance camps, toured Japan, choreographed and danced in the Bulgarian segment of the World Cup opening ceremony, and still finds time to conduct two weekly classes in Chicago and run his own performing group, "Dance Bulgaria". An accomplished tapan and tarabuka player, he has earned a reputation for humour and high spirits in congenial company.

Full details of all the teaching sessions will appear next month, but I can disclose that his first workshop will be for Balkanplus on Sunday, 16th July (10.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. at Studio 10, The Place, Duke's Road, London W.C.1). Ventzi is likely to show up at Balkanplus (Working Men's College) on the previous evening to give us a small taste of his wide repertoire.

SUTTON DAY OF DANCE

Many thanks to all the dancers at Cecil Sharp House and Balkanplus who donated their loose change towards Radio Lollipop, who provide entertainment and activities for sick children during their stay in St.Helier Hospital (formerly at Queen Mary's Carshalton). It all added up to £21. Radio Lollipop provided all the technical equipment and expertise for the Day of Dance at Westcroft Leisure Centre on 30th April where there was a sizeable queue waiting for the doors to open at 10 a.m.

Galina Turker's Egyptian class was fully booked seven minutes later, and many people had to be turned away, while the morning International class was full a couple of minutes after that. These two classes took place in a squash court so numbers had to be restricted, not so the viewing balcony above, where would-be participants crowded in to watch.

We gave a short demonstration of three contrasting Bulgarian dances during the afternoon break, led by Delyan Demirev, with team members all being regular Balkanplus supporters. My thanks to all the team who helped in the class which followed in the large hall upstairs and was attended by 70-80 people with a very wide age range.

About 1,000 people attended the Day, and all the local children I have spoken to since have said how much they enjoyed it. I'm sure the adults did too, judging by the many complimentary remarks I received following the Bulgarian demonstration, so if you missed it this time, watch out for next year.

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AN EVENING OF FRENCH DANCING

We had a most enjoyable evening of French dancing recently. Four members of Loidis attended an evening of French dancing held at Mytholmroyd, near Hebden Bridge, West Yorkshire. This is quite a distance from home but it was worth the journey.

The evening was taught by Casimir Potomski. During the 2½-hour workshop a number of couple dances from the South West of France were taught, and time was spent in learning the bourrée step as danced in the region of Berry. He was a good teacher and imparted the style of the dances well. The two main bourrées taught were those that we know already, i.e. Bourrée Droite d'Issoudin and La Bourrée Tournante des Grandes Poteries. We felt that Casimir did well to get a fairly complicated bourrée over to many who were total beginners.
