GRANTS AND "THE RAINMAKERS"

At a recent S.I.F.D. Committee meeting, during a discussion on funding, I mentioned that "The Rainmakers" had received three grants in their $18\frac{1}{2}$ -year history. It was suggested that I write an article on this for the SIFD NEWS in case it would be helpful to other clubs.

In 1982 (six years after our foundation) we received a grant of £200 from the Commission for the New Towns. At this time we met in Stevenage, mainly because of the availability of a cheap hall. The money was targeted to buy a tape recorder/player and some ancillary equipment. We learned that the Commission had some money to distribute before winding up, so it was a question of being in the right place at the right time.

The second grant of £300 came from the North Herts. District Council in 1987. The Council occasionally has money to give away to groups that benefit the community so we pointed to our dancing in old people's homes, disabled centres, youth groups etc. over the years. We heard that because it was coming to the end of the financial year there might be money to spare. Our proposal was for a Coomber tape recorder, which we bought on receiving the grant.

The latest grant we received, in 1993, was from the Arts Council for North Herts. Our proposal was for a speaker and radio microphone, and we received £235 which went towards buying the equipment. Belinda Lansbury (present Chairperson) and the Committee successfully worked for this one.

If our experience is anything to go by, it's certainly worth trying, but so much depends on whether there is money in your area to spare, how well you make your proposals, whether your group is known in the community, and the timing of the requests. I think we have been fortunate but that we have steered luck in our direction. There have been other times when our applications have not been successful.

We also would not have survived in the early days if we hadn't had generous founders who paid for the hall for the first month, held lots of Jumble Sales and ran market stalls to raise funds. We also received (in early 1982) an interest-free loan from the S.I.F.D., just before we received our first grant - Thank You - I hope we were a good investment for the future!

PERFORMANCES IN THE VICTORIA EMBANKMENT GARDENS, L'ONDON

It is amazing, but true, that this summer is the tenth year that the S.I.F.D. have danced on the open-air stage in the above gardens.

It all began in 1985 when the Westminster Council asked if we would be prepared to join in their 40th Anniversary celebrations and dance on their stage. We happily obliged, and most of the teams who then appeared are still performing ten years later. If someone has spotted that ten years including 1985 and 1995 makes eleven sessions, the explanation is that in 1989 the stage was demolished because of reconstruction work in that area, so there were no performances that year.

Our tenth year on stage there began on 20th May, with the Zivko Firfov group presenting dances from the former Yugoslavia, together with songs from Croatia Macedonia and Serbia. Many thanks to Ken Ward and members of the group for starting the season off for us. The inclement weather in the morning fortunately cleared up, and there were no other hitches to contend with.

On 27th May the Martisorul Romanian Dancers had a somewhat disrupted afternoon. At the last moment they were asked to start earlier than planned, but in the event the stage was not open, the Gardens staff had gone off, and after a lot of hassle the performance started fifteen minutes late! In the middle of their fast and furious Romanian stamping and leaping, a Jazz Group appeared to begin preparing the stage for their own show, and wanted Martisorul off the stage. S.I.F.D. members will congratulate Martisorul for continuing to dance and refusing to cut their programme short. Many thanks to Sorin and all who danced with him.

The majority of S.I.F.D. shows take place in July, so we hope that S.I.F.D. members will go to watch and support our Society. Details are in "What's On" on p.12.

LLANGOLLEN 1973

As the International Eisteddfod takes place this month at Llangollen, it seems an appropriate time to reproduce the speech made by Lucile Armstrong, when adjudicating with Professor Pinon in 1973, which may be of interest to members. This is reproduced with Lucile's permission; she kindly gave me several of her writings a couple of years before she died.

"Professor Pinon and I always feel very honoured, yet humble, when we are asked to adjudicate dances and musical instruments at the International Musical Eisteddfod, for two reasons. The first is, of course, the great responsibility to be fair to all alike. The second is the trust laid on us, inherited from our predecessors, who set the standards of adjudication here at Llangollen. I refer now to Miss Violet Alford and her co-adjudicators, Dr. Maud Karpeles and Mr. Douglas Kennedy, whose combined knowledge of folk dance, music and folklore of Europe was unsurpassed.

Those of you who have come here for the first time may wish to know briefly how we set about adjudicating. It is difficult. First we allocate 100 marks to each group. From these 100 we deduct any fault, and the three groups who have the highest marks at the end of the competition are the winners, as we are only allowed to give three prizes. At times we wish we could give more!

The stress is on authenticity of tradition, for which we give 50 marks. That means, 50 marks are the maximum for the dances performed in the traditional style with steps and figures that correspond to the region where the dances come from. We judge each group according to the traditions of its own region. I stress region and not country because there usually exist many different styles in the one country.

Adulterations, embellishments and additions are discounted and marks are deducted from the total for each change, addition or omission. Next, technique is considered, and whether the instruments used are traditional to that part of the country and usual for those dances. We take account of the music, and if that is traditional for the dances performed. Each "change" causes marks to be deducted. For instance, a group whose accompaniment usually consists of a marine conch and drum will get full marks if only those two instruments are used. Whereas another group may introduce guitars, accordeons, piano, or any modern instrument for "effect", but will get appropriate marks deducted, however well played the music may be, because those instruments do not "belong" to those dances. Our aim is to keep to tradition and we do not admit stage effects.

It is our purpose to preserve folk dance, music and costume as authentic as possible here at Llangollen. Why? Because we are convinced that the preservation of these treasures of our inheritance are part of our culture — and I speak here for mankind in general. It is our duty to pass them on to future generations as they were handed on to us. To understand them and study them and what they meant to our forefathers is an essential part of our guidelines for the future. Once stage effects are introduced, folk dances will be valueless, for their purpose will be irretrievably lost. Once lost, our roots will be cut and our inspiration will dry up like a cut flower that will bear no fruit. Everything runs in cycles and we need the past to refresh ourselves and to seek inspiration for the future.

Many of you will have experienced the joy of hearing music of past centuries played on the instruments for which the music was composed. Music was composed for a purpose; a gay piece for a wedding, a lament for a death, and so on. And so it is with folk dance. A dance created for bare feet cannot be danced in clogs. A folk dance was created for a purpose in a particular region. The

style of music was influenced by the instruments. The instruments were made according to what the environment provided. The style of dance was influenced by purpose, music, climate, dress, and examples from various ethnic groups. You cannot mix all these different influences and make "a whole".

Therefore, groups who may aim at showiness and modern "embellishments" for the sake of winning a prize will be disappointed. Stage effects are not part of folk dance.

We ask all groups, therefore, to continue to perform authentic dances of their own region in traditional style. This is worth infinitely more than any temporary qlory of a prize."

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY FOR INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCING

Held at Cecil Sharp House, 2 Regents Park Road, London on 4th December 1994 at 4pm

Item 1 Apologies were received from

Item 2 Minutes of last meeting


The minutes were agreed as a true record of the Meeting, and were signed by the Chairperson.

replied it had been considered but the Editor was not in agreement, as it would be very complicated and would create the problem of deciding when or when not to charge for notices sent in by members. Production costs were reviewed in detail four years ago. While Lily Avery is happy to be Editor it is not the time to change the system which works so efficiently. The subject of distribution of the News was raised and it was reported that, from past experience, the News cannot be distributed efficiently through any means other than the post. The News was stopped in August one year to save money when it was needed. Frank Flanagan pointed out that the number of sheets sent out is the maximum that can be posted for 19p. Jack Richardson added that we are extraordinarily lucky to have an editor and production staff who will do it every month and that we owe them a very strong vote of thanks. Item 10 Any other business

- It was reported that Frances Horrocks has agreed to take on the job of producing an item for the CCPR diamond jubilee show at the Albert Hall She described it as a "big showcase for the SIFD".
