These are all simple, social dances, very accessible. He will also teach a Korean and a Japanese dance.

S.I.F.D. COMMITTEE NOTES AND COMMENTS

Annual General Meeting

The full minutes of the AGM will follow later. This is a very brief summary.

Motion 1 was passed, so the following objective is now part of the Constitution: "3(d) To encourage playing and performance, research and collection of International Folk Dance music with respect to traditional style."

The committee was elected unopposed and the accounts accepted. See the SIFD organisation chart in this News for the Committee's names and roles, and a list of some of the other people who keep the Society going.

The debate on issues of authenticity and choice of Summer School teachers was interesting and constructive, giving those who plan courses, books and news-letter articles some useful guidance on what members would want.

WANTED - Chairperson and Minutes Secretary

The post of Chairperson is still open, but the Committee is still meeting, planning events and generally trying to run the Society.

The Secretary is finding it increasingly difficult to take minutes as well as participate in meetings and keep up with the SIFD's correspondence and, due to changes in work commitments, has less time than when she originally volunteered. Is there anyone who can take notes and type and would be willing to attend a 3-hour meeting once every two months? If you have use of a word processor but no easy access to a good printer, don't worry, the Secretary can take most types of disk. Call 0181 640 5267 to offer your services.

JEANETTE HULL Executive Secretary

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In our fiftieth year the Society is in a critical situation. For the first time it is without a Chairperson or even the prospect of one. Since, in the SIFD it is an executive position, this lack could be disasterous. At times our Secretaries have undertaken some of the Chairperson's work, but one person cannot be expected to fill both positions.

As I read it, the problem is largely that of a falling membership in the London region, which is not uncommon in other societies. Whereas once we had a total membership of some 200 to 300 in their twenties and thirties living, more or less exclusively, in London, we now have a London membership of around 100, many in their fifties and sixties and even older, most of whom live on the periphery of the area.

Out of that number must come the two dozen or so who are currently involved in running the Society and a further large proportion are those who have done more than their share in the past. A commitment of 1 in 2 is very high, so that while the above figures are not precise, it must be clear why we have problems in administration.

Four years ago, when these first began to become obvious, we were very lucky in that Jill Bransby was prepared to step into the breach, and this is perhaps the right place for me to express my own appreciation of the fact that not only did she have a particularly heavy workload during her term of office, but she was also prepared to face the journey of some 60 miles to and fro from Hitchin so often.

To me, it would seem that the long term solution must be to make our primary aim an increase in London membership of some 100 or so, with additional groups to cater for them. I am aware this is a hard task but it must be simpler than working out a complex plan of devolution, the only other possible answer.

But the most pressing problem is filling the vacancy of our Chairperson for 1996. Do you not know someone, living within reasonable distance, who would be suitable and willing to take the job? He/she does not necessarily have to be the best dancer or teacher in the Society, and it is my opinion that it is to our advantage if he/she is not, since good teachers are thin on the ground and should be left to do what they excel in.

Harry Whitaker springs to mind as a good model of a capable Chairman though, as he was the first to admit, he was not even a moderate dancer. He ran the Society efficiently for a number of years.

Administrative and organisational abilities together with having the welfare of the Society at heart are surely the chief requirements at this time. So, I repeat, do you know someone who has these qualities and could rescue us?

ORIENTAL DANCING WORKSHOP WITH CHRISTINE HALL - 16th MARCH 1996

In a way Christine does not need any introduction as she has been writing bits in the Newsletter before, but I thought people would like a bit more information. She is a member of the SIFD as well as the Great Britain-China Centre and the Arabic Dance network. She has lived and worked in N.E. China for many months and while there studied many of their traditional dances, in particular those of the Han and Manchu peoples. She is an experienced teacher.

This workshop will be organised on a taster basis to offer some flexibility and allow it to meet majority preferences:

Belly dancing (and the men are not excluded from this!) is a good effective way of toning those tummy muscles and much more fun that boring old sit-ups, etc. This will include a focus on variations of the Egyptian Camel Walk. Bring a large scarf to tie round your hips to enhance the effect and put you in the mood.

Egyptian veil dances. Christine will show you how to whirl the 3-yard long veil to achieve some stunning and mysterious effects with consummate grace. If possible buy and bring your own veil - about 3 yards in length and 1 yard wide. Choose very thin, soft, fluid material, which can be transparent, such as georgette.

Chinese ribbon dances are lively and breathtaking when performed by a group and could be a very unusual extra to your group's next performance! Again bring your own ribbon if possible - 6 yards long and half a yard wide. Choose a thin glossy material in a bright colour, preferably red or pink.

Manchurian dancing is performed gracefully with one or two large silk fans. Paper ones are no good for this as the paper is not strong enough. Christine will bring some for you to borrow OR BUY AT £6 EACH IF YOU PREFER (red, green and dark pink). Place an order now if you like!

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VEIL

Dancing with veils is a tradition which dates back to at least 2000 years ago. Just think of Salome's famous performance! Today's dancers wonder how she managed to dance with seven veils; one in each hand, one in each foot, one in the mouth? More likely is that she wore free-swinging layers of transparent fabric attached to a hip belt and a band around her chest or neck.

Veils are used in folk and belly dances in many North African and Asian countries, from Algiers to Malaysia. Today's dances involve a single, large veil. For group dances, the veils are shorter than for solos. The minimum length is the distance between your hands when you stretch out your arms to both sides. For a really stunning effect, buy a length of at least 2.50 metres.

The ideal material is very light, thin, soft, and "flowing". A thin silk or chiffon would be fine. Transparent fabrics are very effective. You may want to embroider your veil with beads and sequins. Don't glue the decorations on; glue stiffens the fabric and prevents the harmonious flow.

Each veil has its own personality. You, the dancer, have to adapt to its characteristics. When performing a group routine, it's a good idea to choose the same fabric for all, and keep the veil to a length of about two metres.

Veil dances are usually performed to slow music, especially to the Egyptian taksim rhythms. However, there are lively fan dances as well, for example in Jordan and Lebanon. Veil movements can be dignified, mysterious, sensuous, or passionate. You can even use your veil to keep eager admirers at a distance!

The Americans like to claim that they invented the veil dance. This is nonsense, of course; there is enough historical evidence that Oriental women danced with the veil before the Americans discovered the art. However, it is true that the Americans did a lot to enrich the repertoire of veil movements. It is also true that European and American women are often better at dancing with the veil than their Arabic counterparts. The reason is probably psychologica.; for many Arabic women, the veil is a symbol of oppression and restriction. They like using it just for an effective entree to the stage, then discard it as quickly as possible. Western women are not inhibited by such associations; they can enjoy using the veil to dress up and play.

Veils are essentially a female requisite of dancing. It is rare to see men use one in folk dances. However, some men, especially from Iran, are highly skilled at using the veil in innovative ways. Watch them if you ever get a chance.


