EASTBOURNE FOLK FESTIVAL, 1ST-4TH MAY 1998

Unfortunately, the Armenian teacher, Eddy Djoloian, is unable to attend; also the French group. I am therefore endeavouring to obtain replacements. I have approached Jan Knoppers, but have not yet received his confirmation. More news when available.

EASTBOURNE FOR MUSICIANS

May is rapidly approaching and, with it, Eastbourne International Folk Festival. It may be too late to book a season ticket (although it is still worth trying) but this year for the first time music-only season tickets are available. International-only season tickets may also be available for those who do not want to attend the English dances. Music sessions will be running continuously throughout the festival, covering many aspects of playing for dancing. In particular, "Jacob's Ladder" will be running two sessions on playing specifically for international dancing.

Anyone who ever tries to play music for the international repertoire will quickly find that, although the notes can often be very easy, making them sound like a piece of music, let alone a piece of dance music, can be more difficult. In our workshops we will be looking at various techniques which can be used to turn a series of notes into a dance and, if possible, a dance authentic to the tradition from which it comes. The workshops will concentrate on what to do with the music beyond just playing the notes and will be suitable for all levels of experience from beginners upwards. Even those who have been playing for many years may find some new ideas to work on (8b parts will be provided for any clarinet players who want them).

YORK INTERNATIONAL SUMMER SCHOOL - 25TH JULY TO 1ST AUGUST 1998

AT THE COLLEGE OF RIPON AND YORK ST. JOHN

The college is in a very pleasant campus, a few minutes walk from the centre of York. The newer residential blocks are built around a large grass quadrangle. The main hall is just the right size for the evening Dances and has a good wooden floor. There are smaller rooms suitable for day-time classes. The food in the past has been excellent, and we expect the same standard this year. The course fee and residential fee are two separate items, as usual. This means that you can take advantage of camp sites, hostels or any other accommodation in the area. Non-residents can book dinner at the college any night they wish. There is also a snack bar open at lunchtimes, providing soup, sandwiches, baked potatoes, lasagne etc.

You will see, if you compare the college prices for 1996 and 1998, how much they value our custom. The college has given us a very special rate for the week.

Bed & breakfast was £181 for the week last time, this year it is £147. Bed, breakfast & dinner was £254 for the week last time, this year £223.

Having your own room in the college can seem a very attractive proposition at the end of the evening Dance, or the late-night song session. It's also very handy if you need to change shoes and clothes during the day - or just have somewhere quiet to go.

There have been problems finding teachers this year but the Committee are still determined that the Summer School should be an opportunity for intensive work on dance styles less familiar to many S.I.F.D. members, with the best teachers we can find. We are discussing final arrangements with three teachers at the moment, all of whom have been recommended to us by S.I.F.D. members who have seen them teach:-

Istvan Nagy from Hungary, whose repertoire includes line/circle dances and couple dances.

Ramaute Gaucaite from Lithuania.

Eddy Djololian, who taught a very successful day course in January.

We are inviting the teachers to do music and/or singing classes as well as dance classes. At the time of going to press the teachers were not all confirmed, so if you would like more information before the next SIFD NEWS, please send an s.a.e. to Jeanette Hull or Alison Scrimshaw for more information about the teachers. Booking forms (enclosed herewith) should go to Dawn Webster.

The Committee feels very strongly that the Summer School benefits the whole Society, as those members who attend then pass on what they have learned. For this reason we want to keep the costs as low as we can. The price of £80 covers dance classes for the whole morning plus six evening Dances. As usual, there will be optional afternoon workshops in other dance styles run by course members. There will be no additional charge for these. There also will be no additional charge for any music/singing workshops as these are intended to increase the repertoire and skills of the musicians who play for us throughout the year.

With reference to George Sweetland's letter in the February SIFD NEWS; since the inauguration of the W.M.M.D.A. shortly after our first group started at Selpar (I believe the first of such bodies operating through the Sports Council), our branch has regularly been represented, with very few gaps, first by myself then with JWLiet McIntosh as our second rep., and we both attended regularly until her sad death. Thereafter I continued as our rep. and am now joined by Grace Pittman.

A few years ago, to encourage a representative from the London area to do likewise, I wrote to the NEWS extolling the advantages of membership, so those points need not be repeated, but I would ask if "OUT-TAKE" is always to be considered to be more important than "IN-PUT". Our membership of W.W.M.D.A. goes way back, to before the three groups of the West Midlands were granted "Branch status", as Selpar was for many years represented as a viable member of the Association. Over the years we have gained much from the Association, not least being contact and exposure with other groups. Without this, we would exist in isolation from other dance activity groups.

As far as W.M.M.D.A. is concerned, no member group gains <u>financially</u>, nor was this ever the intention. The intention was, and is, one of co-operation and mutual interest. Our £15.00 annual membership fee helps us to maintain this contact and we have a recognised and valued contribution to make. I'm not sure what financial assistance George refers to, but when Festivals were well attended, all participating groups received a portion of "profits" from the Festival. The most recent Festival we took part in, at Leamington Spa Arts Centre, was a great success, gave us further exposure <u>and</u> an opportunity to exhibit a high standard, and gave the public a most enjoyable day.

Our Executive Committee meetings are held every two months, and the S.I.F.D. is <u>always</u> represented, either by both Grace and myself, or by one of us. I write these notes in an effort to persuade both London <u>and</u> our local Committee that our membership is a worthwile thing! Incidentally, it seems the Sports Council has already divided into National Councils, ours now being called the English Sports Council, or at least that's what it says on the office door!

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Lily,

Re cost cutting on SIFD NEWS; whatever the S.I.F.D. decides to cut costs or raise additional funds will not be popular. That's inevitable. Regarding some of the suggestions already put forward; personally, I enjoy reading travel articles, especially those by people who have travelled to areas in which I'm particularly interested, such as Asia, North Africa and the Middle East, but I do appreciate that to someone who likes only, say, Scandinavian or Central European dances the articles written by Toni Page and myself are not "relevant". I also admit that they do take up a lot of paper.

I like the workshop reviews too. They give me an idea of what was going on, and sometimes I make a note to try to get to a workshop with a particular teacher. But, it's true, some reviews contain more unspecific praise than information.

The cover pictures do carry information and I would be sorry to see them Actually, I have copied some of them and filed them in my archives. The cover pages in the anniversary year, however, did not add anything and we could indeed have used the space for something else.

All the suggestions so far have been about how to save a bit of space and maybe reduce the newsletter by one page per month. This would not constitute a major saving. I'd like to put forward a different suggestion. It's radical, it won't be popular, but it would save a considerable amount and I would ask you to think it over and discuss it. DO WE NEED A NEWSLETTER EVERY MONTH? Yes, it's nice to get it monthly, but all the other societies, networks and associations I belong to have only three or four newsletters every year. I find that three or four issues are not sufficient, especially for the events listings, but what about six every year - one every other month? Each issue could be slightly bigger than the current ones. This would reduce the cost not only of paper but envelopes and postage too. The cost of paper would go down to (I estimate) 75%, the cost of envelopes 50%, and the postage to around 75%. This constitutes a much bigger saving than leaving out one page per month.

But I think the original idea behind making people pay for events listings was not to save paper but to create an income. Has anyone any suggestions how else to create income? Accepting display advertising is one option, although I don't know how many people would want to make use of it.

By the way, the S.I.F.D. is almost the only organization to which I belong whose Editor brings out the newsletter regularly, punctually and reliably, without excuses about "computer broken down" and "very busy just now". I think the S.I.F.D. is very lucky to have Lily doing this job, and I hope members appreciate just how exceptional her reliable contribution is.

Dear Lily,

With reference to Christine Hall's and Jacky Webb's letters in the January and February SIFD NEWS respectively, I too would like to add my support to the "What's On" and "Dates for your Diary" pages. I agree that these are very important and a link, as Jacky says, between country members who may not belong to a group and events throughout the country. Re Jacky's other points:-

I also agree with Jacky's opinions on advertising. A lot of hard work goes into producing tapes, notes etc., the cost of which is never recouped, and it would be short sighted indeed to refuse publication or to charge for advertising.

However, the SIFD NEWS is far more than just a calendar. I remember the days when the NEWS didn't have a front cover and very dull it was too. Visitors often remark on the covers, which are eye-catching and certainly should be retained.

If several people write in after a Course, then it must have been a good one and it is good to let other leaders know that a particular tutor might attract people to their group. I'm sure the organisers are personally thanked by a good number more than those who take the trouble to write in.

After a death in the Society, the number of letters could well be an indication of the regard in which that person was held and so be a great comfort to the remaining relatives. Personal remembrances can also highlight different aspects and stages in a life which more recent acquaintances might not be aware of and can be of great interest.

At one time, the NEWS was brought to Cecil Sharp House to be distributed to London members by hand at the Dance. If a member didn't attend that particular month then it was posted, which meant it arrived quite late in the month, especially if the Dance was also later in the month. This could easily mean missing "What's On" for ten days or so, a terrible deprivation, and so this practice was discontinued. Bulk posting means sorting addresses into regional groups, extra packaging, visits to the post office to get these bundles weighed and priced, resulting in extra work, and thus making this monthly chore even more onerous.

I'm so sorry Jacky doesn't like holiday stories, for here I must plead truly guilty, but perhaps she doesn't bother to read them anyway.

I do not like Jacky's idea of "rationing" items. Our Editor's discretion has been good enough for many years and it should stay that way. The same goes for the occasional holiday item which always has a folk connection.

Yes, perhaps the front cover could go or be re-designed to occupy only half or a third of a page, with the remaining space being used for statutory information now occupying the first part of page 2.

Re bulk post; it bothers me every month that I receive two envelopes from S.I.F.D. - one for myself and one for the group affiliation. Surely that could be looked into. Bulk delivery would not be helpful for individual members - ours are too scattered and not necessarily attending each week.

I would like to see added to the statutory list details of the sales goods, including records and tapes, i.e. products and prices as well as contact names and addresses. We in the rural areas have little idea of what is on offer unless we set up shop as I did a few years ago.

Finally, keep up the good work. It really is a very good magazine. Best wishes and happy dancing.

MUSIC

Re the music given by Wilf Horrocks in last month's issue; Jenia Graman has written to say that:

- 1) "Hopak" is not Russian, as stated, but is THE <u>Ukrainian</u> folk dance, first danced as a man's solo, gradually with more and more warriors, at their camps and home festivities, and later with women as partners as well as soloists. The bandura (a Ukrainian, not Russian, instrument) is sometimes used.
- 2) "L'ezginka" is one word and is THE traditional dance of the Republic of <u>Daghestan</u> in the Caucasian Mountains (not Russian). The style is similar to the Georgian.

For anyone who would like more information, Jenia's booklets are available at public libraries and also at The Dance Bookshop, 19 Cecil Court, L'ondon W.C.3. "Russian and Other Folk Dances, Style and Presentation" and "Russian and other Folk Costumes".

& February Committee Meeting &

A request was made for a report of the committee meetings to appear in the News, so here is a brief summary of topics discussed at the last meeting.

- The progress of the Eastbourne festival was reviewed the difficulties being encountered to finalise the teachers and display groups, and accommodate a sudden change of publicity policy (do remember you need to send for your booking leaflet this year), but it should be as good as ever.
- The financial projection for 1998 shows our expenditure exceeding our income, chiefly because of increased printing costs. Although this will be rectified in September when the subs go up, ways to save money were discussed. Calculations showed that pruning the News would only save a comparatively small amount, and the feeling was that ideally it should contain *more*, rather than less. Savings in producing it less frequently, and hand delivery, were both outweighted by the practical difficulties involved, and it was felt that if there *were* to be any changes to the News, then they should be to enhance it and only after full consultation with all involved.
- Better news, though, was that Peter Heath has very kindly left £1000 to the Society in his will.
- A good start has been made on a new "Introductory leaflet", which is being designed to tempt people who already dance, to join the SIFD. It outlines the benefits of joining, and should be available later this year.
- Progress has also been made on a **new tape**, but it probably won't be ready until late '98/ early '99 because of the work involved.
- Organising the York Summer School has involved a few hiccups, but more information will be found with/in this News.

Karin Brennesvik from Telemark in Norway will teach dances from her area. Some of you saw her group perform at the Barbican a few years ago. Karin is a very experienced teacher, travelling regularly to teach at folk camps in America and running her own courses for British, American and Dutch folk dancers in Norway, as well as training a superb performing group in her own area.

The music can be a little difficult to follow at first - but it will grow on you. After six visits to Karin's courses in Norway I am totally hooked on the music and dance. Those of you who want to clutch your partner tightly will be disappointed! In both the Springar (sort of 3 beats to the bar) and the Gangar (two beats to the bar) you hold hands and it won't matter if there are more women than men. It's common for women to dance together in Norway, and it's fun to lead sometimes. There can be a lot of turning, but you are in control of howmuch and how fast. A dance party in Telemark would have this kind of dancing for hours.

We have also asked Karin to teach some song-dance and Gammel dance (Reinlender and Waltz - Norwegian style) but the two main dances are sufficient to occupy more than a whole week's course, let alone one day.
