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This month's cover shows Erkan Serge, a professional solo dancer who combines traditional Turkish folk movements with modern cabaret-style belly dance. He is much admired by the population of his home town, Bodrum, but divides his time between teaching and performing in Turkey and Germany. His dance style varies between extremely masculine with martial arts elements (hence the swords) and sinuous almost feminine belly dance movements. "He moves every limb of his body like a snake", the locals praise him. The swords are wooden. The costume is bright orange, adorned with sequins and strings of beads. Following the modern costume style for Turkish dance performers, the costume has "cut-outs" at the sleeves, and strong assymetrical elements. S.I.F.D. PERFORMANCES AT THE VICTORIA EMBANKMENT GARDENS, LONDON

The S.I.f.D. season at the above Gardens started early, when the Romanian group "Martisorul" took the stage on the afternoon of Saturday, 23rd May. It was a cold day, with quite a wind, and so the audience were mainly passers-by. "Martisorul" is taught by Mihai, a Romanian who is married to one of the dancers, and their programmes are always worth seeing. On this occasion there were three costume changes. During the intervals there was first a violinist who played tunes from Oltenia and the Hungarian/Transylvanian area, and in the next interval Sue and Leslie Haddon did a Hungarian dance. Thank you, everyone in "Martisorul" who braved a cold Spring afternoon.

On the following day, 24th May, "Balaton" (Hungary) and "Philhellenes" (Greece) groups danced on a somewhat warmer afternoon, so there were more people sitting watching. "Balaton" had four men and six girls. The men did a stick dance which involved throwing their sticks across the stage to each other. In the past there has been the odd embarrassing moment when a stick or two was dropped, but the team are pleased to report that this year every stick was firmly grasped at the right time.

The Greek dancers from "Philhellenes" group took turns with "Balaton" to perform but unfortunately I have not been able to make contact with them to give an account of their dances and costumes. Nevertheless, I thank both groups warmly for braving late Spring weather, and shall hope to be able to put a bit in August's NEWS about the "Philhellenes".

URI GERSON

It is with deep regret that we have to announce that Uri Gerson died on 29th May aged 60. Uri took over as leader of the Wycombe Group in 1980 and continued as leader until he died, although in the last few months deteriorating health forced him to take a less active role.

Uri was born in Israel and moved to this country in 1961 where later he graduated in mathematics at Bristol University. By the mid-70s he had moved to the High Wycombe area and taken up international folk dancing. Not surprisingly, Israeli and Balkan dancing became his speciality and, as with all the interests which he pursued, his natural ability combined with a natural sense of rhythm meant he soon became a very accomplished dancer and an excellent leader. For a while, as well as leading the Wycombe club, he involved himself in various aspects of the work of the S.I.F.D.

Uri was a man of many parts which, in addition to dancing, included mountaineering and rock climbing, canoeing, skiing, ice dancing and stamp collecting. For some of these activities he attained proficiency certificate levels. His aim for perfection marked all that he did; thus some five years ago when he taught himself to play the clarinet it was not long before he had reached a high enough standard to play in a small orchestra. His keen interest in wildlife and walking in the countryside was one which, in addition to dancing, he shared fully with Averil.

A lively intellect and an unwillingness to compromise his principles were hall-marks of Uri's character - second best was never good enough for him. He will be sorely missed by Wycombe Dance Group and by Averil and his family to whom we offer our sympathy and condolences.

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All those who knew Uri Gerson are deeply saddened by his untimely death. The large attendance at the very moving service at Amersham, and the expressed regrets of those who could not be there, attest to his special place in the hearts of international folk dancers.

In the 1980s I had experienced the then thriving folkdance scene in California and was ready to make waves back in England. Uri was equally missionary in his need to provide a regular London venue for line and circle dance enthusiasts. Our own clubs in Barnet and High Wycombe were already well-established and both had a high proportion of Balkan dances in their repertoires.

Credit must go to Uri for organizing the first Dance at Cecil Sharp House with a predominately "line and circle" programme. With solid support from such likeminded friends as Fiona Howarth, Frances Horrocks and Dunav, it was not long before Balkanplus evolved. In later years, Uri chose to shun most dancing activities outside his own group but we were particularly pleased that he could join us in celebrating the tenth birthday of Balkanplus in 1996. The birth and success of Balkanplus was, in great part, due to Uri's evident passion for Balkan music and his special talent to dance and inspire.

A favourite Dowsett family memory is of boarding a 'bus in St. Peter Port in Guernsey to return to our hotel in quiet Fermain Bay, and meeting the mutually astonished gazes of Uri and Averil. They had made the same decision as we had to get away for a few days to a peaceful haven. The subsequent evening gettogether was the highlight of our stay. Our thoughts are with Averil now as we mourn the loss of one of the most energetic folkdance leaders of our time.

Dear Lily

Following our Gujarati day course and party in Harrow on May 30th, I'm writing to thank those people from the SIFD who did attend (and I hope had a good time) and to let other people know what an enjoyable event it was. The figures are not finalised yet, but unfortunately it doesn't look as though we managed to raise very much money for Mind in Harrow. Nevertheless it was a very worthwhile day, with some of Mind's service users and volunteers taking part. One Indian lady, who until recently would not go out and meet people at all, came to the party and performed a classical dance solo that she remembered from her childhood.

The course was great fun and quite exhausting. Although the dances are simple, they are by no means easy and they tend to go on for a very long time. Both Raas and Garba have many different variations and the movements involve the arms and the whole body, not just the legs. Relaxation is important, which is often difficult for us Westerners, especially if we don't know what we are doing. Rohini Patel is an excellent teacher and a great enthusiast for the dancing. In fact she couldn't always understand why the older and less fit among us couldn't carry on indefinitely the way she could! The dances themselves are wonderful to do, once you get into the flow of them, and in traditional Gujarati culture they still have a spiritual dimension which has often been lost from European folk dance.

At the party we had the chance to join in the dancing with people who have been doing the dances all their lives. The Gujarati ladies dressed up splendidly for the occasion (as did Frances, in a beautiful sari) and there was plenty of colour, live music and an excellent home-cooked meal. The band was somewhat over-amplified and not as traditional as I would have liked it to be, but most people seemed to enjoy it. Towards the end those who hadn't learnt the dances could get up and have a go at the bhangra, which ended in a general free-for-all that had people dancing who wouldn't normally dream of doing so. Not for the purists, perhaps, but very much an Indian occasion.

I must say I was rather disappointed that so few SIFD members attended either the day course or the party. Those who did were obviously very keen, having come from as far away as Bath and Ipswich, but local members were pretty thin on the ground. I don't know if the date was inconvenient, or whether the Indian flavour didn't appeal to people, or whether members are just not very keen on doing something a bit different. If so, all I can say is you don't know what you're missing. Rohini Patel would be very willing to teach a day course for the SIFD, and she has a repertoire of other Gujarati folk dances as well as Raas and Garba – though there was certainly enough in those two dances for a whole day. So what about trying it, some of you Balkanophiles?

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"BULGARIAN FOLK CUSTOMS", a book by Mercia MacDermott due to be published this summer or early autumn. 240 pages ISBN 1 85302 486 4, paper-back £14.95, or ISBN 1 85302 485 6 hard-back £45.00.

Mercia MacDermott has a longstanding association with Bulgaria. She was Chairman of the Society for Friendship with Bulgaria from 1957 to 1973 and spent many years teaching in Bulgaria and was a guest lecturer at Sofia University. She is author of "A History of Bulgaria 1393-1885" and of three biographies of Bulgarian national figures. (Ed. note: Older S.I.F.D. members may also remember Mercia as one of the dancers in Danny Lumley's Bulgarian group).

The book provides a wealth of information previously unobtainable in English, or in one volume, exploring the history and continuity of Bulgarian traditions, beliefs and lifestyles, the development and preservation of folk customs. Part One gives an introductory overview of Bulgarian history and looks at the background to traditional Bulgarian society, costumes, music and dance. Parts Two and Three detail the various festivals and customs that are related to almost every aspect of Bulgarian life.
