SIFD Summer School 2000

Readers of SIFD News will already have 29 July to 5 August 2000 in your diaries. If you have not, please put them in now, these are the dates of the next Summer School, to be held again in York. The 1998 Summer School ended with great enthusiasm for the future and the hope that more people, SIFD old hands and newcomers alike, would come and share in this great dance experience. We have already recruited two excellent teachers whom many will already know. Delyan Demirev will be teaching Bulgarian dances. Elsche Korf with her accompanist, Frans Tromp, from the Netherlands will teach Western European couple dances, mostly from Alsace—including their collection of Zwiefacher—and also some others probably including Germany, Austria, Netherlands and Belgium.

We need your advice. The Summer School has traditionally provided courses with teachers from three contrasting styles of dance, with the addition of optional workshops provided each day by participants. At the end of York 1998 a number of people suggested that this could be overloading the programme; there might be advantages in only having two countries represented, still contrasting, of course. To make up for the loss of variety we would then need to make the workshops a more prominent part of the programme, taking care to ensure quality and a balance of styles. We believe that if we chose this option, it would reduce the pressure on everyone's energy and time but still give the chance to learn a wide repertoire thoroughly. It would also help to keep costs down—though not if it stops you coming!

Before we make a decision one way or the other we want to test opinion. Please let us know if you have a strong preference for two or for three teachers. If it is going to be three, we need suggestions for countries and teachers, and we shall have to decide soon so we can find someone good.

DANCES FROM PRESPA, WITH YANNIS KONSTANTINOU

The larger of the Prespa Lakes forms a natural boundary between Greece, Albania and Yugoslav Macedonia, and the village of Ayios Germanos is a tiny village at the foot of the mountains, almost as far North as you can get and still remain in Greece. Time seems to have stood still there and traditions are still strictly observed. The area has a rich mix of humanity, with Vlach, Pontic and Asia Minor families and refugees from Albania living alongside the Macedonians.

Yannis, now in his thirties, is the son of a very respected local dancer and teacher, Simos Kostantinou, who also danced with a National Yugoslav dance troupe "Tanec" along with his friend, Pece Atanasovski, a wellknown name to members of the Zivko Firfov Group in London whom he visited and taught. Yannis has been dancing since he was a child and has danced with many groups. He has been teaching several groups in Athens, where he now lives, for the last nine years and is regularly invited abroad to teach. Five years ago he created his own group, which has performed in France, Sardinia and Spain. He also organizes the annual course in Ayios Yermanos which has now been running for thirteen years.

Yannis is also active in researching the dances and music of the area, visiting the local villages to meet the "ancients". He was the first to invest in a record from this area and helps keep the dance tradition alive by teaching the dances to the local children. The most widespread dance of the area is Levendikos, also known as Pusteno, which we shall certainly be dancing over the weekend. This is a very typical Macedonian dance with not-too-difficult steps but a tricky rhythm. We shall also do some of the Vlach dances, simple and with (I think) infectious music.

Klezmer - The Music of East European Jewry

Klezmer is currently undergoing something of a revival in Europe and, in particular, in the USA and as it is one of my main musical interests it seems appropriate to write something about it.

Although klezmer was originally associated with weddings and other celebrations – and above all with dance – the music nowadays is often regarded as primarily listening music. One reason for this is, I suspect, that Yiddish dances are very easy to do badly and very difficult to do well – they are not technically demanding, but require a great depth of emotion from the dancers. Not easy in England.

However, klezmer in its original setting is dance music and therefore of legitimate interest to SIFD musicians. Even if we never get to introduce Yiddish dance into the SIFD, some of the musical techniques can also be employed in other forms of traditional music.

Klezmer is a highly decorated style, but the original tune should never become obscured by musicians messing around with it. That is, one should not ad-lib in the way a jazz musician would. But equally, one should avoid playing a passage the same way twice.

The most obvious decoration is the trill. Trills can be introduced wherever you think you can fit them in (and often in places where it doesn't seem possible - trills on semi-quavers are common). Trills are normally performed fast and even – avoid the classical trill which starts slowly and gets faster.

Similar to the trill in some ways is the finger vibrator (on wind instruments). Basically, this requires 'trilling' on a part of the instrument which alters the pitch of the note you are playing, but only very slightly. The alteration in quality of the note is noticeable, the alteration in pitch should not by. Lip vibrator and even throat vibrator are also used. But remember, vibrator is easy: tasteful vibrator is difficult.

Altering the pitch of a note (sliding up to or down from the correct pitch at a variety of speeds) can give a variety of different effects, but should be used sparingly. It is possibly this devise which has given klezmer the reputation of being no more than 'wailing out of tune'. However, this, like all the other devices used to decorate a melody are part of an elaborate vocabulary which should be used with sensitivity to be effective.

Perhaps the most characteristic sound is the 'krechs'. This is essentially a pair of grace notes played before the main note (how quickly is a matter of dispute – some early recordings are so fast as to be barely noticeable). Others are much slower. The first note is almost always a semi-tone below the note you are aiming at, the second is often a tone higher (but can be anything). The important thing is that the second note is clipped extremely short, and a gap is left after it. If you think of the note as being fingered but not sounded you will be somewhere near the mark.

The 'ricochet' is another decoration which sound just like a ricochet, but this seems to have fallen out of favour in the klezmer revival.

Perhaps the oddest technique to modern classically trained ears is the way of playing quaver and semi-quaver passages. In a word, you should rush. Play two (or four depending on the phrasing of the tune) semi-quavers as fast as you reasonably can and then wait for the next beat, and do it again. This gives a effect almost like as whole series of Scottish snaps. Used correctly, it doesn't sound sloppy, but gives a remarkable impetus to the music.

This technique can be extended, and you can play slightly ahead of the beat (without getting faster overall) in a variable manner. This again gives an energetic drive to the music.

I hope this is useful. Describing musical subtleties using words is difficult, but if you want examples of what all this means in practice, come to Eastbourne Folk Festival in May where I will be giving a klezmer workshop.
