

S.I.F.D. HUNGARIAN DAY COURSE, 13TH FEBRUARY

How lucky we all are in the S.I.F.D. to have such a valuable group of teachers who give so much of their time, expertise and information at the various Saturday day courses. Do we always avail ourselves of these opportunities? A case in point was the Hungarian Day Course which was, sadly, not that well attended but was in fact most interesting and instructive. Hungarian may not be your scene, but what a wealth of knowledge one gained.

Balkan and Israeli courses always fill the hall but the majority of courses based on couple and the more formal dances from Western Europe do not. Folk dance is like a jigsaw; one never hopes to complete the puzzle but another valuable piece fits into the overall pattern. Those who did attend the Hungarian course had a wonderful session; a really, happy, friendly day, much appreciated by everyone.

If you are a folk dancer, whatever the course, there is always so much to be gained. No knowledge is ever wasted and adds to the whole folk pattern, and makes better teachers and dancers.

Your opinions about Day Courses

39 people kindly returned completed questionnaires to me, giving their ideas and opinions about day courses.

A few sheets were still arriving after Christmas, but I decided they were probably the very last, so proceeded to collate the results and handed them - with a summary of all the suggestions - to the Badge and Day Course Committee for their perusal.

When analysed, the answers showed that most people who replied came only infrequently to Day Courses, mostly because of the distance involved to get to them. They like a balance of both SIFD and foreign teachers, and the majority would be happy to pay more for a specialist foreign teacher. Revision Days and days teaching standard repertoire dances were greeted warmly by most people, with many suggestions about which dances they would like included, and also which country or topic they would like taught in the future (enough to keep the B&DCC busy for quite a long time.) Only a few more people voted against 2-day courses than for them, but feelings ran more strongly about the venue - car parking, or the lack of it, featured highly in the off-putting list.

Travelling difficulties, young children and a busy life-style also came up several times, as did the comment that as one gets older one needs more time to absorb new dances, so please don't teach

Several people mentioned that they would like to be given as much notice as possible about the date of a day course, with more details about the contents. A few teachers' names were also suggested.

I'm sure the B&DCC will find it really useful to have all these ideas and opinions, and will try to act on them. It obviously isn't possible to please everyone, but if a few more of you can be pleased after this survey, then it will have been worth it. Thank you very much to all of you who responded.

Playing Sprötzer Achterum

My previous articles have concentrated mainly on theoretical issues illustrated with examples from various tunes. This month I though I would start with a tune and describe how Jacob's Ladder approached it when we added it to our repertoire. As always, the ideas expressed are my own (and the band's) and are not intended to imply that this is the only way to approach this particular tune or folk dance music in general

Sprötzer Achterum is a tune that Jacob's Ladder first encountered some years ago. On paper there is nothing much to it, but it sounded horrible when we played it. Looking at it now, it is difficult to see what the problem was but we did consciously have to look at a number of things before we got it right.



The piece is obviously divided into three section with the first two divided into 224 224 bar patterns. The third is a bit different at 422 44. This more or less plays itself, but can and should be emphasised by the use of dynamics. Aim at the G at the end of the second bar, and the A at them end of the sixth bar in part A. This will give this passage, which is musically very plain, a definite shape. A similar emphasis in part B and an emphasis on the top Gs in part C will give this sections a bit of shape as well.

However, the piece was still sounding dull and not very German. Articulation proved to be vital here. The opening sounds as if it should be played on brass instruments. This effect (if you don't have brass in the band) can be imitated by giving a very crisp attack to all the notes and playing them staccato (even where not marked). We gave this tune to the clarinet and flute. The dotted quaver, semi-quaver pattern should be played very precisely. The passage a third below the melody can be played an octave higher if the instrument playing it is lighter in tone than those playing the tune. At the bass end, the accordion, piano and guitar also have to imitated brass instrument articulation to avoid the passage sounding woolly

Part B can be played similarly to the A section, or can be played in a contrasting fashion with longer notes to give a more relaxed sound. The violins took this part to give a contrast to the A passage. Playing it totally legato would, to my ear, sound a bit over the top and too lush, but the rhythm instruments can afford to be less crisp and brassy than in part A.

Part C was now sounding okay, but could be improved. Playing exactly as written, with a very heavily accented minim, fading very quickly to almost nothing, a very pronounced staccato where marked and long crotchets helped, but finally we decided to give the clarinet a counter melody. This was partly a fanfare and partly a comet solo type of tune. A simple example is shown below.
