LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Lily,

I thank wilf Horrocks for giving us another Polish dance tune in the October SIFD NEWS. He named the region from which the dance comes, Wielkopolska (all one word), but omitted to name the tune. This is Ceglarz (The Brickmaker) and was used by Jacy Tacy Group for a very lively arrangement based on this dance, taught to the group by Bill Martin. We called it simply Wielkopolska Walc. In this arrangement it was one of the dances taught to those attending our Jacy Tacy Day on 5th November 1994 at The Place.

In my piece for the July NEWS I referred to Tramblanka, a dance created for the Mazowsze Song & Dance Company and based on Polka-mazur, and I observed that this was not a polka, being in 3/4 time. It is called plain Tramblanka even by some Polish folkdance books. However, its correct name, as witness Mazowsze gramophone record labels and programmes of their shows, is in full Polka Tramblanka. Perhaps their preliminary "Polka" is in acknowledgement of the rather quaintly named source. Elsewhere in Poland, tramblanka per se is found to indicate a polka in slow tempo.

Can anyone offer any explanation of why the Estonian dance Vandra Polka (see SIFD NEWS August 2000) is so called? Again, it is clearly not a polka, being in 3/4 time, and the steps being what they are one might have expected it to be called rather Vandra Mazurka. Could this hark back to the theory that the term polka once meant simply any Polish dance, without implying the specific 2/4 type of step that we associate with it today?

Dear Lily,

This year, in our romantic Moorish castle under the light of a full moon, we had our first Folkloric Festival with traditional dances of the region of Campo de Gibraltar. To explain briefly: the old people of the surrounding villages came up to dance their Fandangos and Chacaras to the music of guitars and singers, dressed in traditional costume. They were family groups and their children and grandchildren followed their example. There were other local Spanish songs sung and a group from Cadiz who specialize in traditional music from all parts of Spain, including the Celtic North, played while the women cooked the fried pancake-type bread typical of the poor Franco era. Nips of Anis were handed around freely, and the atmosphere was magic, friendly, informal and very happy.

Next year it is hoped to have a week of festivities including a medieval market and the more traditional music and dance the better. A date has yet to be fixed but it is likely to be August or September. It would be wonderful to have a Morris team to dance here and although our small council would not be able to pay the fare over I'm sure local hospitality would be rewarding - it may also be a good excuse for a holiday in Spain. Could any teams interested in coming over please contact me so that I can talk to the council. Other folkies are welcome too! I'm sure this festival will grow as it has radio and T.V. coverage, and in my experience the first years are always the best so first come best served. I hope to see you next year.

DANCEFEST 2000

I should like to offer very many thanks to all who took part in this dance festival on 30th September at the Royal Albert Hall. There were twenty-four groups taking part, giving a most varied and interesting display of all different kinds of dance and movement, involving over 400 performers and organized by the dance division of the Central Council of Physical Recreation.

We had dancers from Barlow, Selpar, Heart of England, Sheffield, Rainmakers, Newport, Bristol and Balkanplus, totalling 48 people in all. Ages ranged from ten years old to those whom I didn't like to ask and included several different nationalities apart from the U.K.

We were allowed 5 to 6 minutes to dance and started the programme with "Gajda", a dance in 2/4 from the Pirin district, followed by a rather rapid "Dajchovo" in 9/16 from Severnjaško, and finished with a "Makedonsko Medley" in 7/8. We were accompanied by the Dunav Balkan Group who had previously recorded a special practice tape for us. On the day, we were one of the few groups (all folkdancers) who had live music, which makes a tremendous difference. We also had the last-minute advantage of a lovely Bulgarian singer for the Makedonsko Medley whose voice soared when all the dancers were out of breath.

Everyone put in a great deal of hard work getting all the costumes together - begging, borrowing, buying and making, providing a wonderful display of eye-catching colour. The overall effect was stupendous. Thanks to all those who offered to lend precious costumes, whether complete or the odd pair of shoes. Every little bit was much appreciated.

Apart from the dancers, we really couldn't have done without our selfless little band of helpers who came armed with hair grips and safety pins, applied in all the right places, who looked after our valuables and really saw very little of the show. So far I haven't mentioned names, but thanks must go to Garry Wingrove from Sheffield who has taken so many great photographs (see September SIFD NEWS cover) and to Maggie Kaye from Birmingham who arranged the hall bookings and dealt most effectively with the school caretakers.

The various team leaders were most supportive in their liaison role, and especially in teaching the dances to their groups. In the final performance everyone blended in so well with everyone else you would never have known there had only been three grand rehearsals. It was a fantastic joint effort, and watching the performance I felt really proud of you all. So many people said afterwards that although it had taken up a lot of time they really enjoyed themselves and, above all, it was fun.

The five band members play a variety of instruments: violin, viola, clarinet, recorder, harmonium, percussion, and they also sing! MACEDONIAN SONGS

The new cassette issued by the Zivko Firfov Group of Macedonian songs from the former Yugoslavia plays for about 85 minutes and consists of popular versions of the songs, except for a few that are of a more traditional nature. The songs are sung in a kind of "crooning" style which originated around the turn of the century when many songs were arranged by professional musicians and were popular in cafes in Bosnia and Serbia. Later on, when radios were available, more Western influences and the use of modern instruments updated the style and sound.

Most of the recordings date from very early in the 1960s to the 1980s and are well recorded. The earlier discs were of inferior quality but I have been able to remove most of the surface noise and I think the quality is very acceptable.
