SIFD Summer School 2002

St Aidan's College, Durham, 27 July - 3 August 2002

The news you have all been waiting for! Well, not all of it yet, but it's time to put dates in your diary.

A new venue

After five summer schools at York your planning team felt it would be worth looking at other sites, and we have found a beauty. St Aidan's is an attractive modern campus on a hill looking across the River Wear to the historic city of Durham. Its big advantages over York are that it is cheaper (for equivalent accommodation) and that it can offer a wider range of accommodation—single or double rooms, standard or en suite, half board, bed & breakfast or self-catering all on site, plenty with level access. Families with children are welcome.

Expanded programme

There will be a varied and balanced programme as at York in 2000, with two main, 6-session, courses in the mornings and a choice of 2-session courses in the afternoons. With the encouragement of the SIFD committee, we are also offering a general course aimed at those new to international folk dance and those wishing to build up a general repertoire for teaching (including school teachers who wish to offer dance in their national curriculum programmes). Maggie O'Regan and Anne Leach have already agreed to organise the general course and they will probably draw on the services of other specialist teachers during the course. Naturally there will be the usual social dances in the evenings in the college's beautiful dining room.

Beautiful surroundings

Durham is a fine old city with its castle and imposing Norman cathedral set on a hill in a horseshoe bend of the River Wear. It is a pleasant 15-20 minute walk away from St Aidan's to the cathedral. County Durham, Weardale, Teesdale and the north Pennines offer historic interest and spectacular scenery not far away. So there will be opportunity for excursions and short breaks away from dancing for those who wish them as in previous years. Durham, on the East Coast main railway line and close to the A1(M), is readily accessible from all directions.

IN MEMORIAM

Marion Morris, past Secretary of the Iberian Folk Dance & Music Society, died on 16th October 2000.

When our former dance teacher retired, Marion graciously took over all the secretarial work and also the organization and preparation of all our dance performances. She loved dancing and showed much enthusiasm and artistic flair in her dancing. She also participated in other folkdance events. She loved art, attended art classes, and even exhibited her work at art galleries. She spent much time visiting galleries or attending music or dance events. She was also a keen member of the Theosophical Society.

Martion was a dedicated person in all ways. We sadly miss her and were greatly shocked by her sudden death. We endeavour to carry on in her memory.

CECILIA and the Iberian Dance Group

Juanita Martin, former teacher of the Iberian Folk Dance & Music Society, died on 6th November 2000 in France, where she had been living with her daughter. She was born of a Spanish mother and English father. She grew up in India.

At 34, after the birth of her second child, she became crippled with rheumatoid arthritis and after years of therapy and medication doctors declared there was nothing more they could do for her. One day she went to a class of Lucile Armstrong, world-famous Spanish dance expert. The music triggered something in her and she could move. She learnt the dances of Lucile and went on to form her own group, the Iberian Folk Dance & Music Society. At 66 she felt and danced like a 40 year old, whereas at 40 she felt like a 70 year old (quoted from "Weekend", 17th September 1988).

Juanita was still nursing at night when she started the classes at Swiss Cottage after Lucile had retired. Lucile often used to teach her dances and sing the music at these sessions. It was free because it was a community project, aiming to bring in the local Spanish and Portuguese people. Very few of them came.

Juanita was a great humanitarian and used to keep open house at Christmas for lonely people. We appreciate the contribution she made to our group and offer condolences to her family.

JUNE and the Iberian Dance Group

FESTIVAL OF TRADITIONAL DANCING AT CECIL SHARP HOUSE

Vineet Vijh, a man with a vision!! Out of the blue, on his own initiative, he made contact with all the dance groups he could find in London and invited them each to contribute as they chose, at Cecil Sharp House, on Sunday, 21st January - performance, workshop, join in, musical workshop, with space to display whatever each group chose in the way of posters, literature, flyers, photographs etc - and then to enjoy the rest of the day with other people's performances etc. A very modest £5.00 for the day if you were not in a performing group. Splendid little programmes in colour, with all manner of details (e.g. telephone numbers to contact the groups) were handed out free, with little quizzes inside too to pinpoint the variety and width of offerings.

The whole of Cecil Sharp House pulsated from 3.00 to 10.00 p.m. from basement to changing rooms on the first floor. A memorable Sunday, characterised by the universal good humour and sense of enjoyment throughout. The colourful costumed performances included colourful Seqa dancing from Mauritius, Lucile Armstrong's torch-carriers with a very mixed selection of Spanish dances, Leslie Haddon's spectacular Hungarian in a variety of stunning costumes, Zivko Firfov group sang and danced, and found an overwhelmingly keen join-in with hardly anyone sitting out. The general S.I.F.D. class chose some interesting well-presented dances not so often seen, then the Emashi dance group regaled us with dances and drumming (including a very talented youngster) from Ghana - what fierce energy! Next on were the Martisorul group presenting a most colourful arrangement of beautiful and exciting Romanian dances, again in gorgeous costumes, non-stop in vital, lively style. The Philhellenes, in Cypriot costume, contributed a range of Greek dances after a highly successful workshop. There was a very large group from "On Bouge" presenting intriquing little Breton dances which were very popular. Enthusiastic Circle dancers encouraged everyone to join in. The Irish group were very popular, as were the stylish Caribbean Quadrille group. The Cubans ended the performances with a most stylish fast-moving set.

As well as all this continuous performance in the main hall, workshops in Trefusis and Storrow (both dance and music) were on-going all day and very well supported indeed. The bar/canteen did a roaring trade. Altogether everyone there agreed it was a spectacular success and one worth repeating. So much good humour, interaction and mingling. Such a high standard throughout, with the organization unfaltering and so unobstrusive, e.g. as the permanent tiered seats started filling up, little clusters of chairs appeared to cater for later comers, so there was never an ugly glut of empty chairs to dampen the atmosphere or clutter up the space but no-one arriving unable to see a free seat.

A totally joyful occasion and a huge triumph for Vineet Vijh, who is talking of a repeat in the summer, with an even wider range of contributions (Galina Turker and belly dancing already booked) and a large marquee on the grass outside so that more people and offerings to delight could be catered for. EASTBOURNE FESTIVAL, 4TH TO 7TH MAY 2001

Have you booked yet? We hope we've arranged a further exciting time for you this year.

Hennie Konings, the Dutchman who is a leading exponent of Russian folk dance. has been booked to teach five sessions over the weekend. Those of you who experienced Marina Wolstenholme's Russian Day Course last year will know that his material is interesting and accessible, and he has well recorded CDs from which he teaches. We're also welcoming Dalila Heath for the first time to the Festival. She taught Armenian dances at the S.I.F.D. Summer School last year. Dalila, who is Armenian, was born in Cyprus and came to England in 1974. She was a founder member and principal dancer of the Arax Armenian Dance Group run by the Tekeyan Cultural Association in London. Having taken a break to bring up her two children. Dalila is now getting back to dancing and teaching. She is currently administrator and rehearsal director of the recently formed Armenian Dance Theatre. Jan Mulreany is returning to take two sessions of French Folk Dance and, by popular request, she and "Borborygme" will repeat their very successful French Bal on Sunday night in the canteen. We have had verbal confirmation that "Salcioara", a group of sixteen dancers and four musicians are coming from Babadag, Romania, so, visas permitting, we're expecting them to play an active part throughout the weekend. They will be taking a share in the Balkan evening on Sunday with "Vuhpross" (Bulgarian word for "question"). This group began in 1995 and have since built a considerable repertoire of traditional social dances from Albania, Bulgaria, Macedonia and Romania, "Vuhpross" has a mixture of traditional instruments such as a large drum (tupan), smaller darabulka and tamboura, with melody lead on sax, clarinet or accordion. Julian Sinton will act as M.C. for the evening, co-ordinating input from several dancers, tutors and friends. Martin Butler and "Cloudburst" are returning to play for the Dances on Friday and Saturday evenings. Their repertoire increases every year, providing a lively accompaniment for the two Dances. "Cloudburst", "Vuhpross" and "Salcipara" musicians will be taking music workshops for anyone interested in playing their instruments in a folk contest. Jill Bransby and "Cloudburst" will also provide a joint music and dance session for some "tricky" rhythms. Nick Green and friends will take a session of some of their favourite dances to be included in the Balkan Evening.

Several of you staunch Festival supporters offered your help in "stewarding" in the gym. If you're still interested, please would you let me know on 01942 831141; it does not preclude participation in any session. Finally, we should appreciate help in decorating the gym on the Friday evening from any of you who arrive early, starting at approximately 4.30 p.m.

It should be an energetic weekend. L'ooking forward to seeing many of you then.
