PROSPECTIVE S.I.F.D. TEACHERS

We had an encouraging response to Helen Ezra's letter in the April SIFD NEWS regarding those interested in furthering their dance teaching skills. If anything, the possible participants are even more widely dispersed, so we are proposing the following arrangements to try to make participation practical but effective.

- The course will be divided into modules. Candidates may choose to participate in all, or to select just those they feel relevant, e.g. experienced musicians may feel they do not need further advice on that subject.
- 2. Information on many subjects can be provided in note form and sent by post, allowing candidates to study at their convenience. At following practical sessions where a meeting is necessary, opportunity will be given to discuss and question these notes.
- 3. Opportunity for practical teaching practice and increasing repertoire will be provided. It should also be noted that at next year's Summer School at Durham it is intended to hold a general course aimed to assist teachers to build up a varied repertoire.
- 4. Assessment and certification will be available upon completing the course but members may choose to participate in the course without putting themselves forward for assessment at the end. We anticipate that external examiners will be invited to make the final assessments.
- 5. There will be a registration fee to cover expenses, but we will endeavour to keep the costs modest.

Members who have already expressed an interest in participating in the course will be informed individually when arrangements have been finalised. Anyone else who wishes to join, please contact Helen Ezra as requested in the April NEWS (at 84 Farm Road, Morden, Surrey SM4 6R8).

THE GAYDA (MESHNITSA) BAGPIPE - BULGARIA

This is a wind pipe instrument composed of a hide bag and wooden parts, turned out of cornel, plum or apricot wood. The bag is made of goat hide with the fur turned inside. The sound pipe, "gaydunitsa", is attached to the neck of the hide. It is conical in shape both inside and out and has eight finger holes. It produces a diatonal major scale in the volume of one note and in combinations with the fingers, chromatic half-tones between the 5th and 6th and the 6th and 7th tones. Gaydas come in three keys: high, "djura", medium, and low "kaba".

A three-section bass pipe is attached to the left foreleg of the hide. It is called "ruchilo", drone, and has no holes. It is from 50m. to 60m. long and there is a reed whistle at its upper end, which is tied to the hide. This pipe produces only one tone. It is always at an interval of a duodecime lower than the basic tone of the "gaydunitsa" and provides a bass for the melody all the time. The bag is blown out through a mouthpiece tied to the right foreleg of the hide.

The bagpipe is a sonorous folk instrument and is used out in the open. The people say, "When you hear the bagpipe, you can tell where the wedding is". It is used as a solo instrument as well as together with other instruments - gadulka (rebek), kaval (pipe) and tupan (drum). The high tone bagpipes are used throughout the country. Only in the Rhodopes are low-pitch "kaba" bagpipes used, the basic tone of whose "gaydunitsa" is in "a" and the drone is in "El" or "1" of the big octave. That is why these bagpipes are used to accompany songs.

FESTIVAL OF SACRED DANCE, MUSIC AND SONG 14TH-21ST JULY AT THE FINDHORN FOUNDATION, SCOTLAND

The Findhorn community is the birthplace of what has come to be known as Circle Dance or Sacred Dance, which has its roots in the traditional folk dances of Europe. The Midsummer Festival aims to merge the best music, dance and song from both the folk dance and circle dance scenes, with a large international group of participants and an atmosphere of celebration.

The main teacher at this year's festival will be L'aura Shannon, focusing on Balkan Rom dances to the exhibitanting live accompaniment of "Xenos". L'aura will also teach Armenian and Balkan dance, bringing attention to style and detail in each dance and the symbolic language encoded within them.

Australian-based band "Xenos" combine traditional and modern instruments, captivating rhythms, and haunting intertwined voices to create Balkan and Gypsy dance music which is both very much alive and in touch with its ancient roots. Twin vocalists, Anne and Lee, will also teach Balkan songs and singing style.

Other highlights include Peter Vallance teaching Greek and Pontic dance, Kate and Rory O'Connell with their resident band and choir workshops, and Bill Henderson's Scratch Band workshop in which he creates an orchestra (from scratch!) to play for dancing on the final Festival evening. Participants are welcome to bring an instrument and join in.

Minutes of the Previous Annual General Meeting 2

The minutes of the AGM held on 5th December 1999, which had been previously circulated to members, were accepted by the meeting as a true record of the proceedings at that meeting.

Matters Arising 3

3.1 Teaching Fees (Minute 10.1 of 1999 AGM)

Janet Woolbar asked for clarification as to what fee was now being paid.

As published in the April 2000 SIFD News the payment made to SIFD teachers was increased to £20 per hour with effect from March 5th 2000.

Proxy/Postal Voting (Minute 10.3 of 1999 AGM) 3.2

It was pointed out that the motion on the current agenda (item 8) meets the committee's obligation arising from this minute.

4 Committee's Report

The Acting Chairman's report prepared by Mike Gilbert was distributed

at the meeting.

Mike briefly summarised his report and suggested that we should make 2001 the 'Enthusiasm for Folk Dancing Year'.

Jack Richardson said that our main problem was our increasing average age and not, per se, our reducing membership.

Julie Korth remarked that the wealth of choice of leisure activities now available inevitably reduced attendance at any one activity.

Alan Morton asked what was happening in the Netherlands where International Folk Dancing seems always to have been well supported.

Roger Sturge pointed out that in the case of PE teachers we do have a market that is not purely recreational since the National Curriculum does include Folk Dance.

That the report be adopted was proposed by John Walford, seconded by Philip Lloyd and agreed unanimously by the meeting.

Treasurer's Report 5

The report for year ended 31st July 2000 had been circulated to members with the agenda for this meeting.

In response to the Treasurer's request for comments and for ideas for possible uses for the recently received legacy the following were mentioned: -

Bursaries for particular dance-related study Scholarships for students at our Summer Schools or other courses Outreach into Universities. Technical Colleges etc.

The adoption of the Treasurer's Report was proposed by Fiona Howarth and seconded by Frances Horrocks and was agreed unanimously by the meeting.

6 Independent Examiner's Report and Consideration of Accounts

The Independent Examiner's Report and the Accounts had been circulated with the agenda for this meeting.

Roger Sturge commented that the Society must be vigilant as to our financial reserves pointing out that the 2000 Summer School was profitable by only a small margin. In fact it was just the sale of video recordings that made the difference between profit and loss.

Fiona Howarth asked if the Society's artefacts were sold at classes apart from hers and Philip Lloyd's.

That the accounts and the Independent Examiner's report be adopted was proposed by Roger Sturge and seconded by Helen Ezra and agreed unanimously by the meeting.

7 Appointment of Independent Examiner

The treasurer indicated that Denis McCarthy was willing to continue as Independent Examiner for the current financial year and proposed that he be so appointed. The meeting agreed unanimously.

8 Motion

The following motion was proposed by Judith Payling and seconded by Alan Morton:

That the Constitution of the Society be amended so that the Articles of Association parts B9 to B19 are changed as follows: -

- 1. Part B9 is renumbered to become part B9(a)
- 2. The following is inserted and becomes part B9(b)
 If the committee so determines the Agenda shall be accompanied by a Postal Voting
 Paper in respect of all motions on the Agenda.
- 3. The following is inserted and becomes part B9(c)
 The Postal Voting Paper shall take the form prescribed by the committee from time to time, and be returned to a person nominated by the committee by a date specified by the committee, duly completed, if votes thereon are to be counted. The Chairman's decision as to the validity of an incorrectly completed voting sheet shall be final.
- 4. Part B10 is renumbered part B10(a) and the following inserted at its beginning If the Postal Voting provisions have not been implemented....
- 5. The following is inserted and becomes part B10(b)
 If the Postal Voting provisions have been implemented a motion as it appears on the Agenda may not be amended.
- 6. Part B14 is changed to read
 - If the Postal Voting provisions have been implemented
 - (a) The General Meeting vote on each motion so covered shall be by a headcount of all members present and voting, to which shall be added the postal votes.
 - (b) A member who has voted by post may change that vote by attendance in person at the General Meeting. The member shall declare his/her wish to withdraw the postal vote before the headcount commences.
 - (c) A member who has voted by post and not withdrawn his/her postal vote may not vote in person at the General Meeting for any motion for which they have recorded, and not withdrawn, a postal vote.
- 7. Parts B17 and B18 are removed
- 8. Part B15 is renumbered as part B17 and the following added as part B15
 If no postal votes have been received in respect of a published motion, and in the case of any other motion or resolution to which postal voting provisions do not apply, the matter shall be decided by the meeting by a show of hands unless a poll is (before or on the declaration of the result of a show of hands) demanded by at least two members present. Unless a poll is so demanded, a declaration by the Chairman that a resolution has on a show of hands been carried unanimously or by a particular majority, or lost or not carried by a particular majority and an entry to that effect in the Minute Book of the Society shall, when signed by the Chairman at the next General Meeting, with the

approval of the members there present, be conclusive of the votes recorded in favour or against that resolution.

9. Part B16 is renumbered par B18 and the following added as part B16 On a poll demanded by members in General Meeting, votes must be given personally and not by proxy. Every member present shall have one vote.

Part B19 is changed to read 10.

No member shall be entitled to vote by any method unless all monies presently payable by him/her have been paid.

The proposer explained to the meeting the significance of the motion which had been produced as instructed by last year's AGM. (See minute 10.3 of 1999 AGM minutes).

Mike Gilbert commented that a Society which is national rather than local should allow postal/proxy voting.

After some discussion it was pointed out that because the motion changed the Constitution amendments to it could not be accepted from the floor.

On being put to a vote the motion was carried unanimously but for one abstention.

Announcement of New Committee 9

Mike Gilbert has agreed to serve as Chairman. The position of Secretary is vacant. Judith Payling has agreed to continue as Treasurer. Caspar Cronk, Helen Ezra and Richard Mellish have all agreed to continue as Committee Members. Judy Ingram has resigned from the Committee.

The meeting approved the appointment of the new committee.

10 **Any Other Business**

10.1 Publicity

A discussion of many aspects of the Society's publicity activities took place. Speakers stressed the overriding importance of general SIFD and specific event advertising and urged that every member should do his or her bit in promotional matters.

10.2 Photographs

Alison Scrimshaw reported a good response to the appeal for photographs of groups, members and activities for the millennium album and thanked all contributors. Marshalling of the material is in progress.

10.3 Storage of SIFD Amplifying Equipment

Caspar Cronk reported that he had successfully negotiated space for the storage of our equipment at Cecil Sharp House. This will save a great deal of the effort that has been required in the past to transport and store this equipment and the meeting was appreciative of Caspar's work in this.

10.4 Certificate of Safety

It was suggested that if the Society's amplifying equipment is to be available for use by members and groups then it should perhaps be tested for safety and certified as safe. What is the legal position here? Also are safety checks a condition of our insurance?

10.5 Seating Arrangements at AGM

Mona Graham pointed out that while the number of members attending the AGM remained small then a semicircular seating arrangement would be practical as well as desirable.

There being no further business the meeting closed at 5.50pm
