TATRY'S 40TH ANNIVERSARY CONCERT

This was a happy occasion, with a hall packed almost entirely full of Poles plus just a few others including ex Jacy Tacy dancers and S.I.F.D. friends.

There were three other groups helping out with the programme: Zywiec from Ealing, Orleta from Balham and Klosy from Cambridge. Together they made a varied and lively evening of dancing, and much hard work must have gone into preparing it.

The opening number - dances from Opoczno - was especially good, with Tatry showing great ability in communicating to, and incorporating, the audience right away in the joy of the dance. I will not attempt to go through the whole programme but must mention Orleta's dances from Lwow. This extremely handsome and young group "brought the house down" with their vivacious and humorous street dances. The girls' satin "flapper" dresses plus cheeky accessories were complemented by the boys' sharp jackets and caps or trilbies at just the right angles. Apparently this item was much acclaimed at the summer festival in Rzeszow.

The costumes throughout the evening were very good, with Tatry showing, amongst others, those recently acquired from the Sacz area which has, perhaps, the most beautiful and richly embroidered of all the male costumes.

The "train" of Tatry dancers chugging along into the future made a lighthearted and original finale, but it would have been nice to see the other visiting groups come on for a last bow as well. Perhaps they were in a hurry to get changed and homeward!

L'ETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Lily,

The photograph of Joseph Chu on the cover of the November SIFD NEWS, and Jill Bransby's remarks about the different types of Chinese fiddle, set me off on an investigation. I quote first from a fascinating book, "Spectrum of Chinese Culture" by Lee Siow Mong (Malaysia 1988). "All Chinese fiddles are of non-Chinese origin. They are called hu, a name which denotes their origin - the Northern Tartars were called hu by the Chinese. All of them have a hollow cylindrical or box-like body made of bamboo or wood, one end of which is covered with snake-skin or tung wood to provide the sound box. The bow passes between the two strings. The hu is called by different names by adding a prefix to hu depending on the shape and the material that goes to make the fiddle".

I then sent a hasty e-mail to a Chinese barrister friend in Hong Kong. (He used to dance Hopak and Kreuz Konig and various Scottish highland dances in Cardiff 25 years ago, but I don't know whether he has ever played the Chinese fiddle). From his reply, and from my dictionary, I gleaned more facts. Er-hu is the most popular Chinese fiddle, and its name simply means "two-stringed fiddle", even though all hu have two strings. It is also called nan-hu because of its popularity in the South, and its soundbox of hide produces a rather deep, melancholic sound when compared with the higher-pitched jing-hu (so called because of its use in Beijing opera, "jing" being short for "Beijing". Ban-hu looks similar to er-hu but its brighter sound is produced by its thin wooden soundboard ("ban" means a slice of wood); it is often used to play the rowdier sort of music and is also used in Beijing opera and other regional operas in the North. The zhong-hu relates to the er-hu as the viola to the violin; the gao-hu is a high-pitched version of the er-hu ("zhong"=middle, "gao"=high). The 'cello of the hu family is, however, named ge-hu ("qe"=hide or animal skin).

An interesting feature of the Chinese language is that many different written characters may have the same sound; my dictionary lists 53 characters (with 53 different meanings) all pronounced "hu" in one of the four tones. But the hu character meaning "fiddle" (not one of the other 52) also means "moustache, beard or whiskers" which, to the Chinese, must have been a distinguishing feature of the male Tartars.

Whether this was the actual dance performed I don't know as George states that it was a foursome, whereas "deux" is two. (Ed.note: I think the "deux" in this case refers to the step itself, not the number of dancers). Unfortunately, we didn't see the group from Brittany as we had to leave early, but I enjoyed reading the results of the performances and comparing them with my own rough notes.

We managed to get to L'langollen by coach from Bangor but unfortunately in order to get the coach back we had to leave the afternoon dancing performance before the end, but it was better than not being there at all. For once, we didn't run into any of the members from the London area of the S.I.f.D. as we were sitting further forward than we have done in the past. The only person we did meet up with was the lady who ran the sequence dancing class we used to go to when we lived in Corfe Mullen. A VISIT TO CROATIA

After certain travel problems, the less said about the better, here we are in the centre of Split, Croatia, listening to the delightful sounds of "The Dances from Split". Little did we think all those years ago when Nenad and his wife Jasna taught us Yugoslav dances at one of Jack Richardson's weekends that in September 2002 Vic and I would be hearing them played live on a warm summer evening. I asked the musicians if they were local and, when they said Yes, did they know "The Dances From Split". Without doubt they were pleased to be asked and played them for us. The following day a wrong turn found us again in the Cathedral Square and the same musicians were there. They insisted we sat down whilst they played the music again.

Some of you may remember a few years ago when the "troubles" there reared up as a Croatian team from Split were on their way to the Eisteddfod at L'langollen. The B.B.C. featured their group and especially their music, and "The Dances From Split" was played each evening on their review.

Whilst in Split, a shop called "Nostalgia" caught my eye and we went in. The owner was a dress designer of some note and featured the traditional Croatian materials and embroidery, and in some cases the style in her design. The result was stunning. She also had available for purchase "replica" original costumes from various regions. Sadly, we didn't have £400 to spare! On the advice of the designer, we went to the local ethnological museum, where we enjoyed a feast of costumes, some original, some replicas. Thank Goodness they survived.

A week later and a local 'bus has delivered us to Dubrovnik. Two days became four, became six. We were enchanted and had several opportunities to enjoy local culture, music and dance especially. At a "tourist" performance, the group showed dances from all Croatian regions (and one from Slovenia) including Krici Krici Ticek and "The Dances From Split".

One day a tour took us South of Dubrovnik through all the torched villages struggling valiantly to recover. Even the trees and vineyards had fallen to fire. In the province of Konavliat, a village called Cilipi, the buildings were largely restored and here they brought all the villagers together, in costume, and set out stalls and exhibitions for the tourists. L'ocal craft, including a great deal of embroidery and several costumes, were there for our pleasure and of course the inevitable and much enjoyed folkdance display. Some dances felt familiar, some did not. There was one dance however (sorry, no name) that had a "Frances Horrocks" feel about it. A hora with small subtle footwork. Vic and I both agreed that if Frances were dancing with the group no-one would know she wasn't local. We have purchased the music and it's a joy to listen to. It was only after leaving Croatia that it dawned on me that every dance but two had been couple dances, Krici Krici Ticek being one of the two.
