LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Mrs. Avery,

I have performed Kodaly's Dances of Galanta, Bartok's Romanian Dances, the dances of the Nutcracker of Tchaikovsky and many other so-called Classical folk dances on numerous occasions as an orchestral violinist. However, I have a compulsion to get the audience on to their feet and into the aisles. Once, on the Isle of Harris, with the Scottish Chamber Orchestra, we managed this in a castle, following Mozart with Strathspeys and Reels, and again in Stavanger with the Waltz.

I have, therefore, begun a project to take live music and dancing especially Celtic, English, Balkan and East European circle dancing into schools. So far, I have discovered some excellent books on European folk dance, notably Joan Lawson, whose recent death I was sad to hear of. What an informed and interesting authority! I found myself continually chasing library assistants to find her book, "European Folk Dance", and writing out page after page. This led me on to a personal research of ancient history (e.g. Robert Graves' "The Greek Myths" in which he tells us that the Labyrinth of the Minotaur was a dance floor laid out for the Easter Maze Dance, a dance also found in Wales and N.E.Russia (also performed in Italy and Troy) (Book I 88.8). I diverge.

In order to take this further, I need more information, and a letter to Alan Morton produced a helpful response from Richard Mellish. Amongst other ideas he also suggested I write to the SIFD and ask if any of your readers can give me information or advice on the following:-

- 1) Are there any Celtic circle dances apart from Sellingers Round?
- 2) Where can I find music and steps for the ploughing dances of Portugal and Czech/Slovak as mentioned in Joan Lawson's book?
- 3) Is there a book specialising in work dances?
- 4) Is there a book of international folk dances titles and resource references?
- 5) What are the steps and movements of the Sailors' Hornpipe?
 Amazingly, everyone seems to have forgotten the whole fourteen measures (Jaffe). I know it begins by facing NSEW and I assume it is danced in a sailing order of tasks, but hereon I am up a crow's nest.

A lot of questions I know but I will be very grateful for any help in solving them.

BALKAN MUSIC: ITS NOTATION

A remark often made about Balkan dance music is "Some of the rhythms are extremely complicated. Many are in 7/8, 7/16, 11/16 and similar rhythms". This type of remark is unsatisfactory. There are two reasons: firstly, the author of such a statement is making an elementary but common mistake. The fractions quoted are not rhythms; they are time signatures. Rhythms and time signatures are related. Times in certain rhythms can only be written in certain time signatures. This first error then can be easily corrected. The statement could be amended to "many Balkan dance tunes are in rhythms which when written require the use of time signatures such as 7/8, 7/16, 11/16 etc.".

The second unsatisfactory point is one that the member or visitor to a Balkan group will notice. He or she, after dancing, say, Kalamatianos, or Pajduska, or singing Jovano Jovanke, would wonder when the complicated rhythms are going to appear. They have already appeared! Kalamatianos and Jovano Jovanke are both 7/16 (or 7/8) and Pajduska varies according to region or musician between 5/16, 5/8 or 3/8. The complexity is put into the tunes by the way they are written. The actual rhythm is often simple. In Kalamatianos, the dancer hears a clear triple beat and dances with the beat just as if following the one, two, three of a waltz or the slow, quick, quick of a quickstep. What he is doing is just half way between the two. In a waltz, the first beat is the same length as the other two; in a quickstep it is twice as long; in Kalamatianos it is one and a half times as long.

Now the standard music notations were evolved in Western Europe, where the beats are all equal or some twice as long as others, or occasionally some were three times as long as others, but never so-many-times-and-a-fraction as long as others. Where this is the case, the standard notation can cope. Where this is not the case, as with Kalamatianos, it is not as effective. To accommodate two main pulses of different lengths, a notation has to work in terms of what a mathmetician would call their highest common factor; that is, a unit of time small enough that both pulse lengths are whole number multiples of it. Thus, to accommodate two pulses one half as long again as the other, the shorter has to be two units and the longer three. Then the triple beat of Kalamatianos takes 3+2+2=7 units, giving a time signature of 7/16 (or 7/8) etc. Thus, to anyone who confuses time signature with rhythm, the simple triple pulse time appears as a complicated septuple.

All this does not mean to say that a different notation should be used for Balkan but that the dancer, musician, or collector should ignore the time signature and study the melody. In many cases, the rhythmic skeleton based on two unequal pulses, one half as long again as the other, will easily be recognised. If these pulses are denoted by Q(quick) S(slow), many apparently complex tunes will be found to have a simple rhythm, often either triple of quadruple, e.g. Psila stin Kostilata 7/8 = SQQ; Prsten mi Padna Male 8/8 = SQS; Od Iljada Devetskota Cetrta Godina 11/8 = QQSQQ; Duj-Duj 9/9 = QQQS; Pajduska 5/16 = QS.

A NOTE ON MALTESE PEASANT COSTUME

An interesting feature in some peasant women's clothing in Malta is that the overskirt (several layers of skirt are worn) is lifted up over the shoulders and draped over the head. The Maltese women did this at a time when the island was invaded by French soldiers, and the women thought they would evade the attentions of the French if they covered their heads and partly their faces in this way.

The fashion stayed and later was exaggerated by the grand ladies who had cloaks made with a very large hood standing up around the shoulders and head, pulled to one side. If you see any Maltese costume dolls, you will often find they have this large hood, nearly always in black, and that it has been stiffened with cardboard to stand out away from the head almost like a parasol. The ladies, with their bouffant hairstyles and liking for exaggeration, apparently went in for this elaborate stiffening material to make the hood even bigger.
