Kathleen Dickinson has written to her local M.P. regarding signing Early Day Motion 331 and has received the following reply. Ed.

Dear Mrs. Dickinson,

Thank you for your letter of 2nd March 2003 concerning proposed changes in the public entertainment licensing laws.

As you may be aware, the White Paper "Time for Reform" proposed that the current exemption from public entertainment licensing that allows two musicians to perform live in premises licensed for the sale of alcohol should end. The reason for the decision rests on the problem that discotheques, or one or two musicians with powerful amplifiers can make more noise and so generate more noise than three or four musicians without.

The use of discotheques and amplifiers has made the two musician rule outdated. The Government were quite right in addressing this problem. However, simply abolishing the two musicians rule would be unsatisfactory for the very reasons that you yourself state. Therefore the Government have proposed further changes to the current legislation that takes into account the interests of folk music.

Firstly, the legislation recognises that musical entertainment with no amplification has a minimum adverse impact on the safety and amenity of local residents. A new "unplugged" music and dancing licence is proposed to be available to applicants who wish to provide musical entertainment with no amplification whatsoever. A reduced fee will be charged, at the level of a nominal fee.

New legislation will also see alcohol and public entertainment licensing integrated into a single scheme. This will remove at a stroke a considerable amount of red tape. It will also reduce licensing costs so as to encourage a number of venues to apply for licences for music where they were previously put off by the cost. Dr. Kim Howells, Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport, will be working closely with the Musicians' Union in developing the new legislation. Their aim will be to balance the interests of all music

groups. However, I sincerely believe that the new legislation does give important consideration to the well being and interests of our folk music.

I hope this letter will allay your concerns to some extent.

Having been the Publicity Officer for three months, I thought I should let people know how I'm getting on. My main task has been trying to decide what the job involves whilst creating a new Publicity leaflet. Following several discussions with George Sweetland and others, I can assure the membership that there will be no upsetting changes. Since nobody is all that clear about what Publicity is, beyond certain specific tasks, the best way is for me, over the next few months, to say what I will be doing and wait for people to point out (nicely) what I've missed! I shall, of course, be passing each proposed task before the Committee and will keep everyone informed as I go.

The most important aspect is that the S.I.F.D. as an organization is made up of individual members running various aspects more or less autonomously. Thus each group or event handles its own publicity quite happily. My long-term aim is to accumulate resources and information that will be available to individuals and events as required.

The new leaflet will make its appearance at the Eastbourne Festival. I hope it will meet with approval but I am aware that a happier solution is to have a variety of leaflets to appeal to different tastes. In most cases this would merely involve a change in the photograph or front design. If people have suggestions, such as phrases, sentences (slogans) that they feel encapsulate the S.I.F.D. I should like to hear them. I am prepared to produce several versions of the leaflet. The "Dance With The World" leaflet (my next task) will revert to being a resource leaflet listing individual groups as well as contact information for S.I.F.D. resources.

Additionally, I am hoping to create cheap and cheerful lightweight displays (A3 laminated paper) which bridge the gap between leaflets and the large S.I.F.D. display boards. As these will be individually made, they can be tailored to suit particular types of event. This leads me to my biggest problem - the lack of photographs (I can't just use any photos because of copyright problems). Most of the photographs in the publicity folders are of people in costumes and I really need photos of people in ordinary clothes as well. I would like photos of people clearly enjoying themselves dancing (in or out of costume) that I can use for publicity purposes. Any contributions gratefully received (please enclose an s.a.e. if you want the photo returned). There could be a little prize for the best photo(s).

I am very much aware that our need is not merely to recruit people but to recruit the right sort of people. The first step is to attract people to our events. This is where you come in because you decide/are the image of the S.I.F.D. Providing me with photos etc. is your opportunity to ensure that I project the right images in my publicity. So I welcome (and feel I need) constructive comment to get it right — especially if accompanied by artwork or photos that I can use. I propose to have a Publicity feedback box in the S.I.F.D. shop at the Eastbourne Festival for that purpose.

THE MAORI HAKA POI

In her interesting article on Maori Cultural Shows in New Zealand (in March SIFD NEWS), Jill Bransby notes in reference to the POI, "that the women had now incorporated the movements in their songs". Though she may not have meant it so literally, the qualifying adverb "now" suggests that the introduction of the POI was relatively recent. There is indeed some debate on when it was introduced into the women's HAKA but it was certainly over 100 years ago.

In an in-depth study of the accounts dating from the 1700s (when Cook explored the Islands), Youngerman (1974) notes of the HAKA POI:

- 1) "Supposedly dates from pre-European times, but there is no reference to it in the earliest literature".
- 2) Other N.Z. Haka types have counterparts in other areas of Polynesia, but the HAKA POI is unique to N.Z.
- 3) The HAKA POI that is performed today derives from a style that evolved as part of a religious movement in the 1880s and 1890s. Unfortunately Youngerman does not expand on this, but perhaps her references do.
- 4) The HAKA was accompanied by a rhythmic chant in pre-European times (? cf.Note 1).

Youngerman also notes that "It is believed that the long Poi was the original form, but because only the high-ranking girls were permitted to dance with it the lower classes invented the short Poi". This may or may not be true, but I have seen sitting HAKA POI with the girls quite close together when surely the long poi would have been impractical!

Some S.I.F.D. members may remember the very enjoyable and hilarious day course we had at Cecil Sharp House when we were lucky enough to have a teacher from New Zealand to teach us Maori stick dances and dances with both long and short pois. We had accurate instructions on how to make the pois at home to bring with us for the day course (large balls of white cotton wool sewn or wrapped in polythene and attached to long strings and short strings). The dexterity of the poi dancers eluded most of us but we had great fun, having a go and endeavouring not to get too tangled up with the person next to us when dancing, swinging the pois and singing all at the same time. We were also shown how to perform the Haka chant (with appropriate gestures) that rugby fans will have seen. A memorable day!

S.I.F.D. PROSPECTIVE TEACHERS' ASSESSMENT

Of the seventeen candidates who attended the course, twelve have put themselves forward for assessment (six on 14th June and six on 6th July). They have been very committed and have made a considerable effort to attend the sessions we have organized in spite of travelling long distances in many cases. I am opt-imistic that we have some potential teachers for the Society among them.

The panel on each occasion will consist of an external assessor (and Diana Campbell-Jewitt who is a member of the EFDSS education department has agreed to join us in this capacity), a member of the course organizers who has observed the candidates during the course, and a respected member of the Society who is knowledgeable of the varied styles of international folk dancing and the skills required to teach it.

The following is a résumé which has been given to the candidates of the practical requirements and advice on what the assessors will be looking for.

Material to be provided before the assessment:

A list of 100 dances they are prepared to teach.
A programme for one term (ten weeks) for a class (ability and make-up specified)

A detailed plan for a single lesson.

Notes on the dances in the term's programme, including:
Dance instructions

Background to the dances

Sources where possible

Structure of the music

Reference should be made to anticipated problems. A list of relevant courses attended during the past few years, including tutors.

On the day of the assessment:

To teach three dances (or parts therefrom) from a short list of ten from their list of 100 dances. The short list will be revealed to the candidates in advance and the dances to be taught will be announced by the examiners on the day. Time will be given for preparation and the candidates will have access to their notes. Candidates will be required to bring music for their short list dances on the day.

To write notes for one dance from their list, to be announced on the day.

A discussion of the lesson with the examiners.

Correct use of terminology
Use of helpful texts and changing them as appropriate

Correct use and timing of commands.
Choice of position in relation to group, and changing position.
Voice: volume, clarity and intonation.
Registering and correcting mistakes.
Encouraging and praising the dancers.
Presenting the dance.
Communicating the appropriate style/quality.
Flexible use of teaching methods.
Relating music to the dance.
Communication with the group.
Creating a good atmosphere.
Stimulating the dancers.
